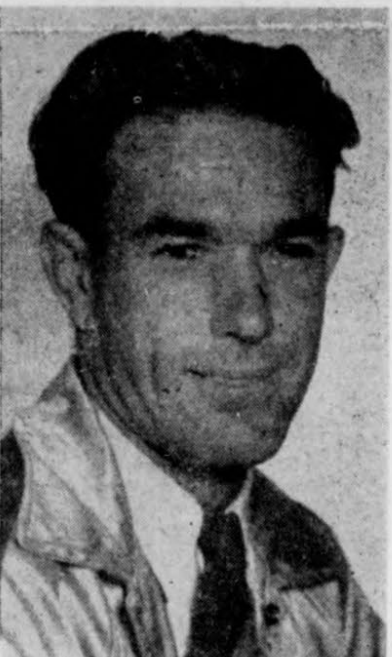

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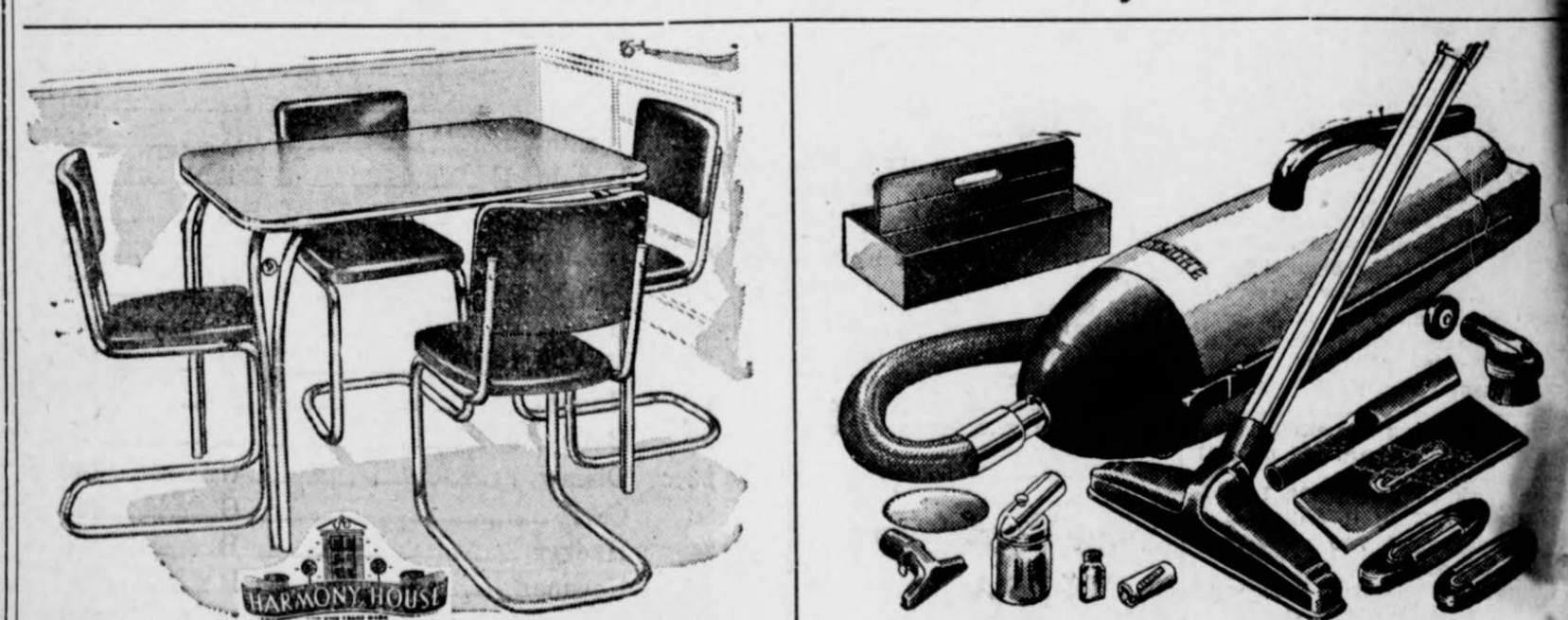

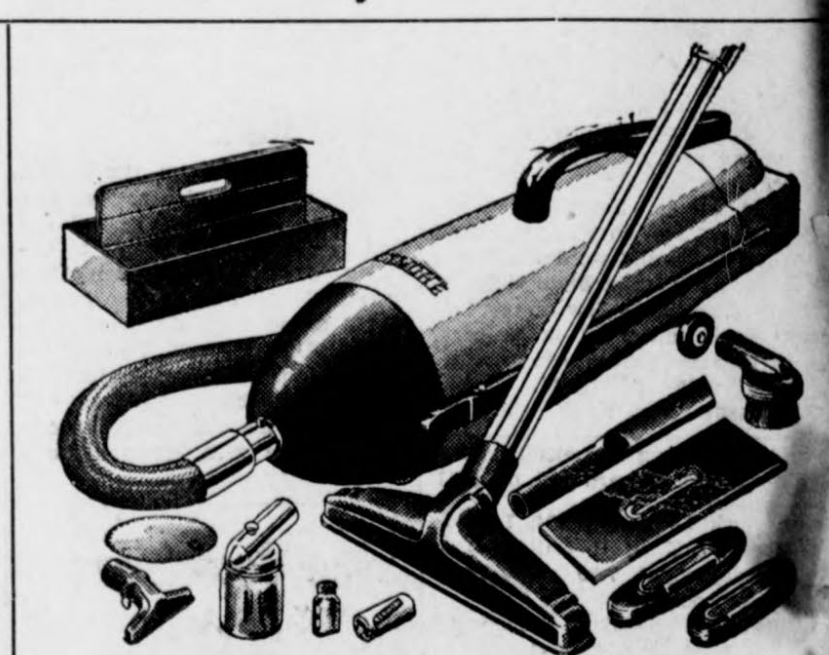

Malabar Farm Signs Put Up by Chamber

The Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce has just completed and erected two large signs on Highway 287 reading "Iowa Park welcomes you to Louis Bromfield's Wichita Falls Malabar Farm." The signs are 10 x 14 feet and are supported by 4 inch drill stem.

The official name of the farm is the Wichita Falls Malabar Farm. It is run by Louis Bromfield and Bob Hoge, using similar methods to those used on the Malabar Farm at Lucas, Ohio.

The Malabar farm, southwest of Iowa Park, has 410 acres, Mailing address, "Route 1, Iowa Park."

The farm is in the process of having irrigation laterals, borders and leveling done on 90 acres. Tile turnouts and checks have been installed in laterals already finished.

Eighty acres are planted to alfalfa and grasses for hay and grazing. The alfalfa is already up to a good stand. Maize and cane were planted this summer for silage for dairy cows. This silage will be put in trench silos and some of it will be chopped up and stored in hay barns for dairy cattle use this winter.

The dairy program will be used extensively. Cattle will be Holsteins. A modern milk parlor is under construction and the new type self-feeding hay barn has been completed.

Two dwelling houses, a hay shed, tool shed, trench silo have already been completed. Actual improvements were started on Malabar less than four months ago.

THE BOBWHITE QUAIL

The sportsman's methods of gunning the bobwhite are for most points the same as they were when your granddad broke his setters and pointers to handle the quail. There was a time, too, when quail were so plentiful that in some regions the hunter didn't really need a shooting dog.

In this day, however, it is desirable to have bird dogs of two calibers: the well broken, retrieving animal of medium or short range but well paced to suit the walking hunter; and the well broken pointer or setter, fast and long ranged for the mounted hunter, that handles well to voice and whistle.

There are still some areas left in the United States where prime quail shooting may be had, and the bag limits are lowered to such a point that a day's quail shooting can often be had from the rise of two or three coveys.
