**ALMOND CHIFFON PIE** 

2 egg yolks, slightly beaten 1½ cups milk	1/4 teaspoon almond extra 2 egg whites
1/4 cup sugar	1/4 teaspoon salt
1 envelope (1 tablespoon)	4 tablespoons sugar
gelatin	1 baked 9-inch pie shell
1/2 cup whipping cream	Coconut Crust

Blend egg yolks with 1/4 cup of the milk in sauce-pan. Add remaining milk, 1/4 cup sugar, and gelatin. Mix well. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture begins to thicken and coats a dry metal spoon. (Do not boil). Remove from heat. Chill until mixture thickens slightly. Whip cream and fold into thickened mixture. Add almond extract; blend.

Beat egg whites with salt until foamy throughout. Add 4 tablespoons sugar, 2 tablespoons at a time, beating after each addition until sugar is blended. Then continue beating until mixture will stand in stiff peaks. Fold into gelatin mixture. Pour into pie shell. Chill until firm. Garnish with additional whipped cream, toasted coconut and salted almonds, if desired.

**COCONUT CRUST-2** tablespoons soft butter

11/3 cups (about) Baker's Angel Flake Coconut

Combine butter and coconut. Press evenly into lightly buttered 8- or 9-inch pie pan. Bake in slow oven (300°F.) 15 to 20 minutes, or until golden brown. Cool.

How large should the budget for defense be?

Should the ceiling on the na-tional debt be raised? Will a tax increase be necessary

to finance defense spending? How much, and what kind, of foreign aid? What about the business slump

and growing unemployment? Shouid a new farm program be adopted?

Congress already has been given positive evidence that Russia has made tremendous military gains, even that she has in some respects surpassed the United States and our allies.

The majority opinion in Wesh-ington seems to be that Russia will attempt to bargain for an easing of the cold war only on her own terms, and that those terms will be unacceptable to the Western Na-

Our answer to Russian threats more probably will be a quick effort to build Western defenses. There is, of course, no assurance that Russia will not provoke a war if she is convinced she could win quickly. That is the chance we have to take.

Time is more important to the United States than it was only a year or two ago. We were ahead then in military strength. Then, it was Russia that wanted time to build long-range missiles to give her the advantage.

A quick recovery from our lag in missiles will require substantial in-creases in defense spending. To meet that increase, Congress must either increase taxes or raise the ceiling on the national debt. #### SCIENTIST CATAPULTED TO FAME

When Sputniks I and II were catapulted into the stratosphere, the United States and the rest of the world were startled into the realization that the Atomic Age had been replaced by the Space Age.

Many scientists and educators, who had previously remained in comparative anonymity, were flung on to the front pages of the country's newspapers and important magazines. Most of them shied away from the spotlight; others went front and center.

One scientist, who has earned a reputation over the years as a rocket expert, received a great deal of attention by the press. He is Willy Ley, one of the first men to shoot a rocket off the face of the earth. For the past 20 years, he has been an American citizen devoting his life to writing esoteric subjects in layman's language. Since his many contributions to the bet-ter understanding of objects in space are too numerous to be listed here, suffice it to say that, through the years, he has become one of the outstanding authorities in that field.






Quotations of John Wesley continue: "With regard to the name 'Christian' I would like to say there is none like it; give-it to me, and in life and in death I would glory God in this name."

Martin Luther, according to Michelet (page 262), said: "I pray you, leave my name alone; and not call yourselves 'Lutherans,' but 'Christians.' Who is Luther? My doctrine is not mine. I have not been crucified for anyone. St. Paul (I Cor. 1:13) would not that any should call themselves of Paul, nor of Peter, but of Christ, Now, then: does it befit me, a miserable bag of dust and ashes, to give my name to the children of Christ? Cease, my dear friends, to cling to these party names and distinctions. Away with them all, and let us call ourselves only 'Christians,' after him from whom our doctrine comes.


It may be in the 90's outside, but these students don't seem to mind. In fact, the windows are even tightly shut. The answer: This new school, recently opened in Vero Beach, Florida, is one of the first in the state to have provisions for year 'round air conditioning

Today educators and architects agree that schoolroom air conditioning offers definite advantages in counteracting the traditional "warm weather slump" in learning. Many authorities recommend that all new school construction either include air conditioning now or at least have provisions for its addition at a later date.

They base this opinion on the fact that school-room temperature, air movement and humidity have a direct bearing on learning and development. That's why modern school planners emphasize year-'round temperature control. The ideal way to provide the

optimum temperature range and to protect any proposed new school building from early obsolescence is to provide for immediate or, at least, eventual installation of another source for cool air when it is not available from nature. This means air conditioning as well as ven-tilation. Both can be accomplished

readily and inexpensively by the Amervent units, manufactured by the American Air Filter Company, Inc., Louisville, Ken-tucky. An advantage of this




school, is that air-conditioning can be provided initially or added in the future when the budget allows. Only the installation of a chiller in the boiler room is needed for complete, automatic hot weather air con ditioning.

This is particularly significant cost-wise, because it means that the school can be air conditioned at any time - without disruption of normal activities without expensive alteraand tions. In addition, installation and operation expenses are far less than for separate heating and air conditioning systems.

According to Thomas D. Bailey, Superintendent of Public Instruction for Florida, this new school could very well indicate a trend in the future planning of school facilities in the Southern states, making school build-ings comfortable for students and faculty in any season. This, Bailey maintains would promote greater efficiency of both stu-

dent and teacher, and allow for the greater potential utilization of the entire school plant.


PAPER COMES INDOORS
