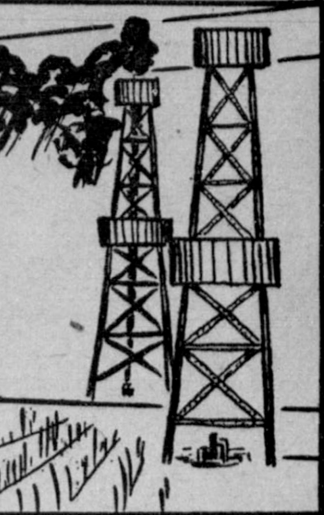

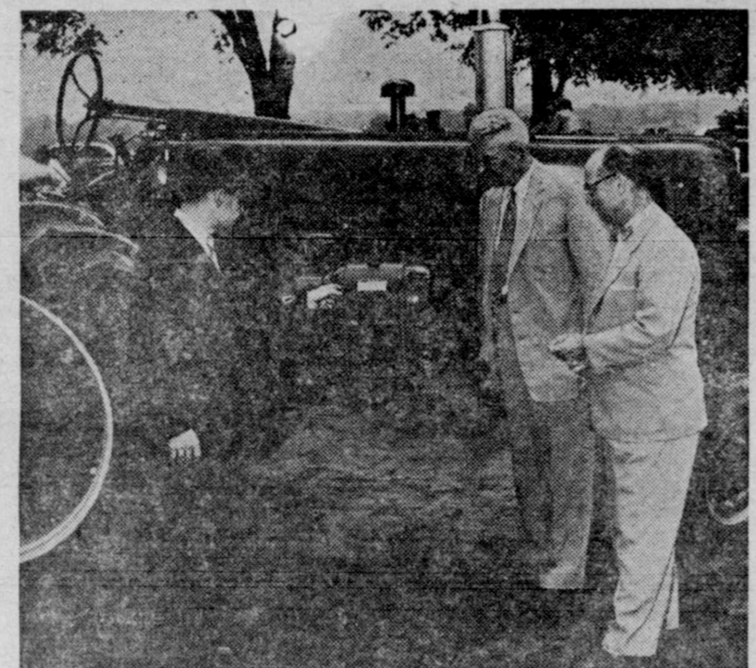

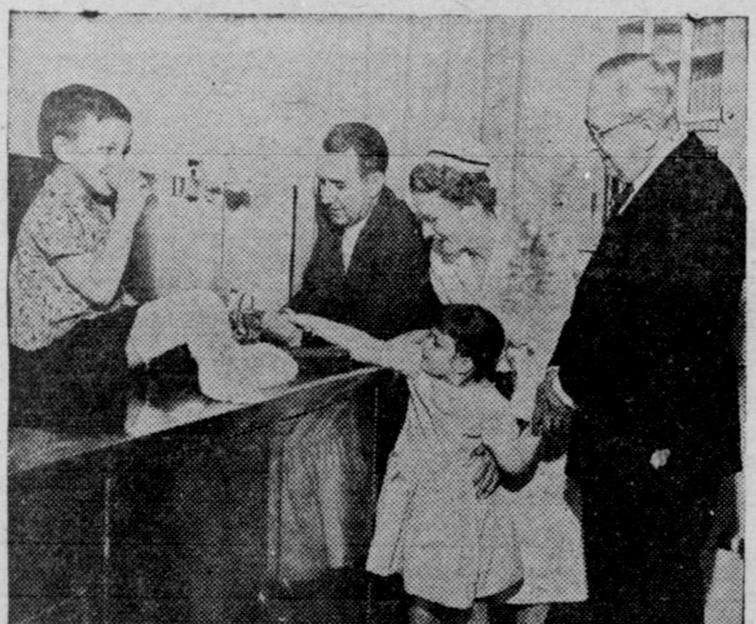

The generator can furnish electricity for such chores as sawing wood, post-hole digging or welding. In an emergency, the generator would be invaluable for running milking machines, incubators, refrigerators, deep freezers, water pumps and lighting.

## Reflections from the Bible

The story of how a good deed by Miss Chapman touched off nationwide observance of Spring Clean-Up is told in the Spring issue of the Junior Fire Marshal magazine, now being distributed to 3,000,000 elementary-age school children. The magazine is part of the year-round Junior Fire Marshal program sponsored as a public service by the Hartford Fire Insurance Company. Now 82 years old and retired, Miss Chapman "accidentally" started Spring Clean-Up Week in 1909 when she presented a blue pinafore to an unkempt little girl in her class at Miles Park School. The child's mother was so impressed, she started tidying up around the house—removing trash and other combustibles. Soon, the neighbors and ultimately thousands of communities followed her example. Junior Fire Marshals are cooperating in Clean-Up campaigns from coast to coast.

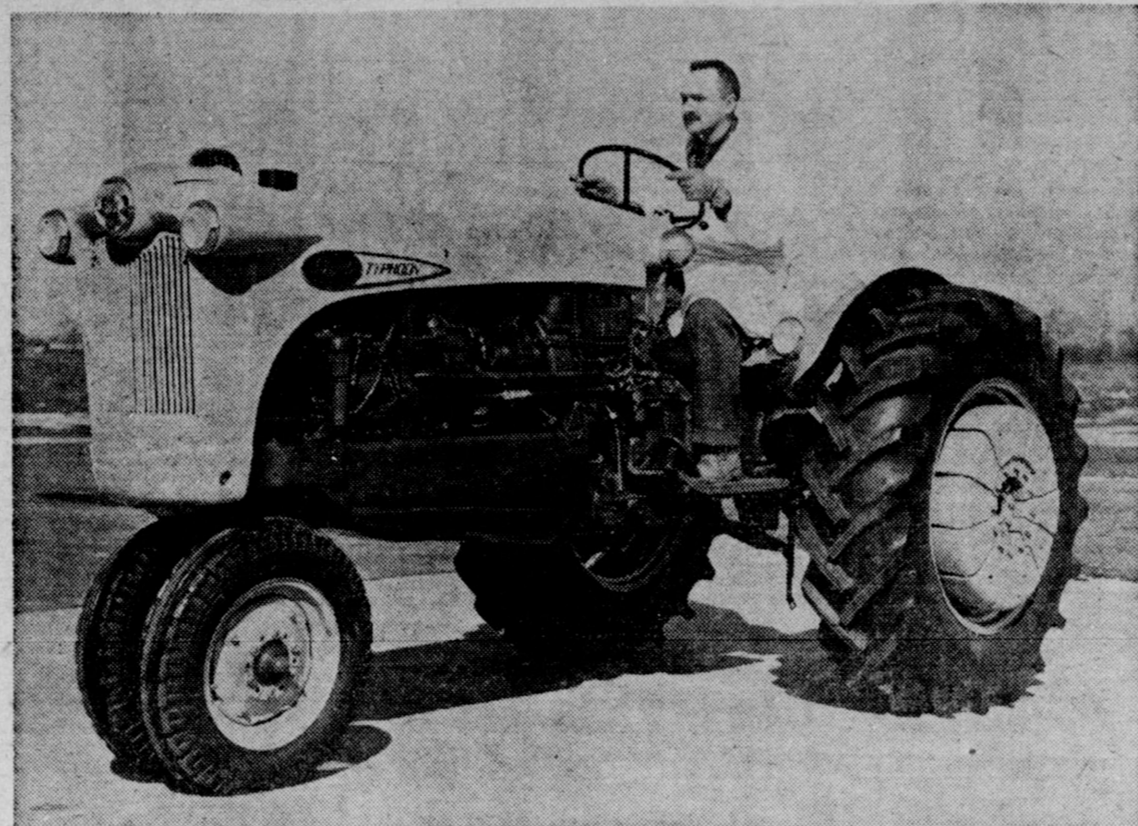

## First Free Piston Tractor



The first known installation of a free piston turbine engine in a tractor is announced by Ford Motor Company's Tractor and Implement Division. Strictly experimental, the Ford Typhoon tractor is powered by a single cylinder engine having two free-moving pistons. The pistons produce gas under pressure which drives a turbine, providing smooth power with greatly reduced vibration. The Typhoon now utilizes about half of the 100 horsepower which the engine is capable of producing.

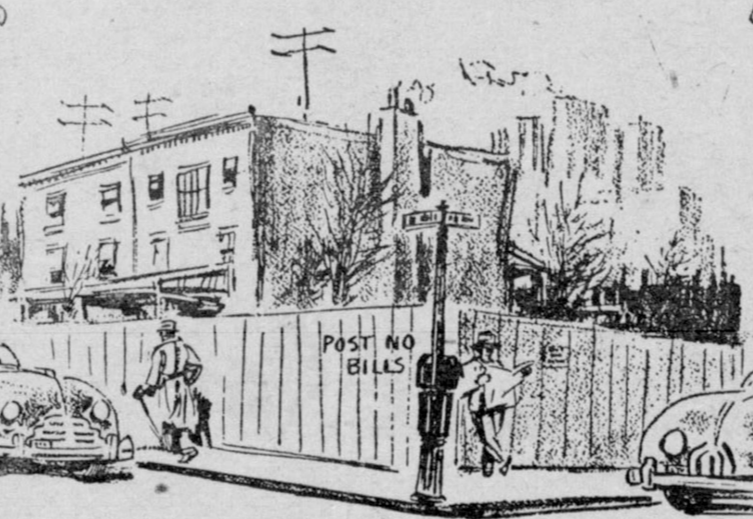
Troop 36, sponsored by the Presbyterian church, will have a soil conservation display. Virgil Woodfin is scoutmaster and has 15 boys in the troop.

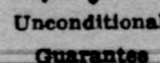

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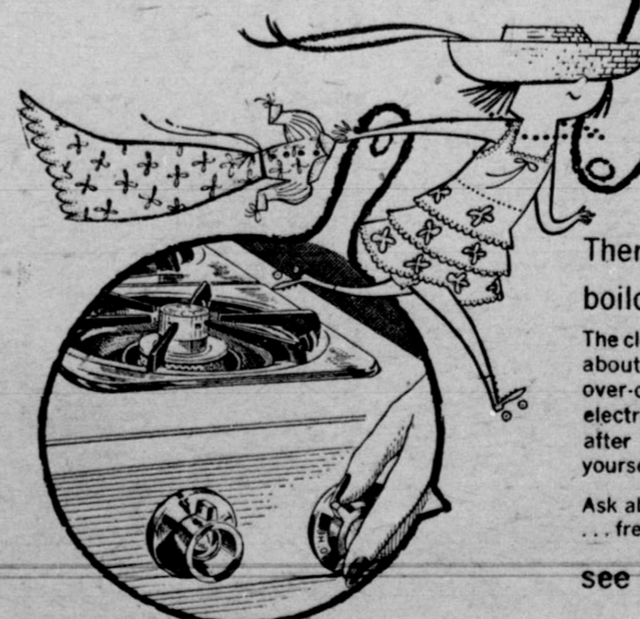

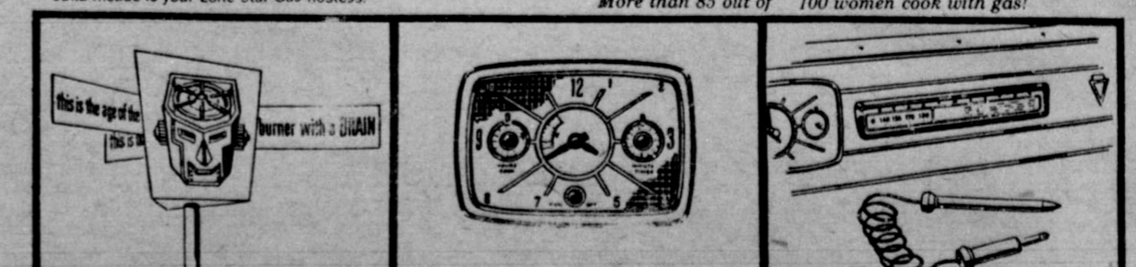
