Now 82 years old and retired, Miss Chapman "accidentally" started Spring Clean-Up Week in 1909 when she presented a blue pinafore to an unkempt little girl in her class at Miles Park School. The child's mother was so impressed, she started tidying up around the house—removing trash and other combustibles. Soon, the neighbors and ultimately thousands of communities followed her example. 

and an apple pie.


