Clothing Drive Starting Friday, Need Is Great

On Friday, October 15, the Iowa Park Council of Church Women will start their fourth clothing drive for overseas relief, according to Mrs. Gordon G. Clark, president of the group. The need is as vital now as it has been at any time, Mrs. Clark says.

"In 1945 we sent a million diapers and thousands of layettes. "In 1946 half a million kiddie kits were made up and sent to children under five years of age.

"In 1947, half a million 'boxes and bundles' for 6 to 12 year olds were sent.

"And now the call is for 500,000 'Pack a Towel for a Teen Ager' (14-21 years) in displaced persons camps in Europe, in refugee camps in Asia," Mrs. Clark explains.

"No group in Asia or Europe has suffered more, physically and spiritually than the young people. Stabilizing influences of home, community, church and school have been denied them. Yet in their hearts is the same zest for life, the same love of fun and gaiety, the same dreams for tomorrow, that we know in our own youth. So the United Council of Church Women proposes that we should each send a gift to one of these boys or girls.

A gift to bolster their youthful spirits and let them know that the Christian people in America appreciate their dreams and problems and that we love them."

Specifications for the kits which are to be made up call for: a nice bath towel 22 inches wide; soft bed-room slippers (no hard sole shoes); a few materials for a dress, or yarn, sewing kit; soap, comb, toothbrush, hairpins, handkerchiefs, socks, stockings, neckties, scarfs, wash cloths; writing materials.

Besides these kits for displaced persons, the need is still great for clothing. They must be clean and in good repair.

Containers will be on hand in the churches of Iowa Park and all are requested to help in this worthy cause.

YOUR CHAMBER OF COMMERCE —

Of all the works of art on display in the Museum of Ethnology in Santa Fe, thousands of vacationists each year smile more over one carving than all the other art objects put together.

The sculptor has portrayed in wood the scene of an Indian having his picture taken by a tourist. The title of the carving is How the Tourist Looks to the Indian.

The Indian, his tall form swathed in thick folds of a blanket, stands motionless, erect, looking straight at the tourist. Behind her husband the squaw peeps shyly out from beneath his arm, evidently torn between a desire to be in the picture and the fear of being seen.

Despite the seemingly stoic expression on the Indian's face, the artist has hidden among his features the hint of tolerant amusement at the situation an deoescension toward the photographer.

Normally the photographer would have command of the situation, but studying the scene (and not being able to prove a thing), you felt that though the Indian was just standing there, the sculptor had given the dignity of command to the Indian and the tourist was the spectacle.

Now the tourist was Mr. Average Citizen, both in physical appearance and dress, but this is what the Indian saw: A large bulky, bumpy, lumpy, out of proportioned man, sloppily attired in outrageous sport clothes, his flat feet spread fan-shaped to balance his over-weight, and with a large red nose, loose lips, pasty face and bleary eyes squinting into the camera sight.

Knowing Indians as we do, we believe that the sculptor really jumped overboard in his imagination, and that the Indian was much more charitable in his thinking than the scene would imply.

However, we get so used to looking at ourselves front view that we forget that the other person seldom sees our front view, in fact, they more frequently see us from every other angle, and it is not always a flattering picture we leave in their minds.

We get a superior feeling over the oddest things. If we are old residents, we look on new comers as if they were from another world. If we have that good Southern drawl, we consider others' tones short, brusque and uncultured. If we are members of the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce we wonder why in the world all our neighbors aren't members, too (so does Your Chamber of Commerce). And if we are native Texans everyone who isn't a Texan is beyond the pales of society and should hardly be allowed to live.

Remember the classic that goes something like this? What a strange bird the frog are When he walk he jump When he stand he sit He ain't got no tail almost. Well, next time we begin thinking of how funny the other fellow looks, we'll recall How the Tourist Looks to the Indian.

Cleaning of Wool Labels Explained by Specialist

Homemakers and other consumer buyers often wonder just what such terms as "reused wool," "reprocessed wool" and "virgin wool" mean when they are found on the label of an article in a store.

Extension service clothing agents explain that these are terms provided in the wool products labeling law, enacted seven years ago by congress. Here are main provisions of the act:

All fabrics or their products of wool or containing wool (except upholstery and floor coverings) must bear a label showing the percentage of fiber content and indicating the percentages of wool, reprocessed wool or reused wool.

"Wool" must refer to fleece wool being used for the first time in the complete manufacture of a wool product. It may include new fleece wool that has been previously processed up to, but not including, weaving or felting.

"Reprocessed wool" includes scraps and clips of woven and felted fabrics made of previously unused wool. These remnants are "garnetted"—that is, shredded—back into a fibrous state and used in manufacture of woolsens.

"Reused wool" also is called shoddy. It is made from old wool which has actually been worn or used—including the rags and other old clothing collected by rag dealers. These are cleaned and shredded into fibers again and then blended to make utility fabrics.

"Virgin wool" is wool that never has been processed in any way before its complete manufacture into the finished product. The highest quality fabrics are always made of virgin wool.

Aged Persons Increasing, Population Figures Show

A high percentage of the U. S. population always has been in the younger age groups, but the proportion of older persons has been increasing steadily.

One useful measure of the age-trend of a population is its median age at various periods. Using this measuring tool, the median age of U. S. population has risen from 16 years in 1800 to nearly 23 in 1900 and to 30 years in 1947. The three main reasons for this increase are the long-term drop in the birth rate, the limitation of immigration and a lowering of the mortality rate of infants and young adults. All these factors are expected to continue to alter the national age pattern in the future, continuing the unbroken trend toward an older population, according to National Industrial Conference board.

The proportion of persons 65 and older has risen steadily from 3 per cent of the total population in 1870 to 7.5 per cent in 1947. By 1975 the U. S. may have 18 million aged, compared with 11 million at present. Thus, more old people mean more markets for goods and services for the aged. A greater number and percentage of older persons in the labor force also may require some adjustment in the policies toward employment of older workers.

Ben Franklin as M. D.
By profession, Benjamin Franklin was a printer and publisher. Much is known of him as Franklin, the statesman, the inventor, the engineer, the agriculturalist, the oceanographer, the meteorologist, the botanist, the physicist and a host of other talents. But one of the least known facets of Franklin's multi-sided nature is that of the medical scientist. Yet his contributions to the field of medicine were important and one of his chief interests was the study and cure of disease. Although he had no formal medical education or title, his researches on the common cold, lead poisoning and other ailments were outstanding. Some of his contributions to medical literature, such as his letters to Dr. Cadwallader Evans and Benjamin Vaughan, upon the causes of Colic Pictonum ("dry stomachache") and his numerous papers on catarrhs and contagious colds have become classics.

Mealybug, Fig Tree Pest
Chief enemy of the fig tree is the mealybug. Mealybugs become numerous on branches, leaves and fruit of the fig tree. They multiply very rapidly in the spring and early summer, and before maturity of the fruit might cause a total loss by completely defoliating or causing the tree to lose all of its leaves and shed its fruit. The fig mealybug is a small, soft-bodied insect with a cottony mass of waxy secretion. This insect passes the winter in cracks under the bark and in leaves and other trash at the base of the tree. When the weather warms up in the spring, the overwintered mealybugs come out and establish themselves on the new leaves.

Home Sewing, No. 1 Hobby
High prices of ready-to-wear clothes and the desire to be original in dress have prompted women and "teen agers" to make their own clothes. Some have acquired the knack of sewing easily while others have been, and are being, instructed at the many sewing centers and schools throughout the land. All in all, these sewing enthusiasts number 23 million, one-fourth of them teen-agers, according to the National Needlecraft bureau. The bureau also reports that 20 million sewing machines are owned by the young and old sewing folks and more than two billion yards of cloth were sold in 1947 to be sewn into garments and accessories.
