



#### Atoms Scientist



The Legislature of Texas, upon two-thirds (\$2/3) vote of the elected Members of each House, may authorize the Board to issue additional bonds in an amount not exceeding One Hundred Million Dollars (\$3100,000,000). The Legislature and sinking funds established for the payment of bonds issue additional bonds in an amount not exceeding One Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000).
