Funeral services were conducted for J. L. Belote, 95, Saturday afternoon in the First Baptist church, with Rev. Homer Thompson, pastor, officiating, assisted by Rev. Paul Carter of the Valley View Methodist church.

Mr. Belote died early Friday in Wichita Falls after several days illness. Jonas L. Belote was born Oct. 10, 1861 near Junction, Tenn., son of Mr. and Mrs. John S. Belote. He was married Dec. 22, 1895 to Miss Cordie Dawson in Stidell. They moved to this area in 1901 and settled on the Ferguson ranch southwest of Iowa Park. In 1907 they moved to town and established residence where the Fair grounds are presently located.

In 1908 Mr. and Mrs. Belote purchased a farm east of town (now occupied by the Gale Lowrance family). The Belotes and their daughters—Alma and Ruth lived there for many years until both girls were married and had homes of their own.

In 1946, after retirement from farming and dairying, they bought a home on East Bank street, where they resided at the time of his death. Last October, Mr. and Mrs. Belote were honored with an open-house given by their daughters. He was celebrating his 95th birthday, she her 84th, and their 61st wedding anniversary.

Surviving are the widow and two daughters: Mrs. E. C. Hall of Wichita Falls and Mrs. Swan Reaves of Valley View. There are eight grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.

HOME ON THE MONTH
Mrs. Curtis Hill, chairman for August, reminds us that the Home of the month contest will continue through November; so here are a few tips to insure pretty flowers and grass for fall yards.

Zinnias planted now will bloom in three or four weeks and until the freezes. Marigolds planted now will bloom in 45-60 days and until it freezes. To have beautiful roses in the fall, feed them rose food now, and blooms will be larger. Chrysanthemums will grow taller, bloom larger and prettier if grass cuttings are used now as mulch. If bugs and worms molest, spray with insecticide. Geranium will have brighter blooms in the fall if mulched now with small amount of soluble plant food.

Many people cut lawn grass too close during hot weather, which causes grass to turn brown because the tender part has no protection from the severe heat. Lawn grass should be cut higher and more often now, fertilized and watered for beautiful fall lawn.

WEEDS AND GRASS
Soon the tall weeds and grass on vacant lots will be dry. If they are mowed now the fire hazard will be lessened. Someone the other day remarked that in some places weed stalks are like small tree trunks which will burn like timber if left standing to dry. So, if there are vacant lots near you that need to be mowed, consult the owners or call the City for help.

The fireboys appreciate all the co-operation they can get, thus causing less danger of fire to the buildings on your premises. Keep weeds and grass mowed around buildings to help prevent fire.

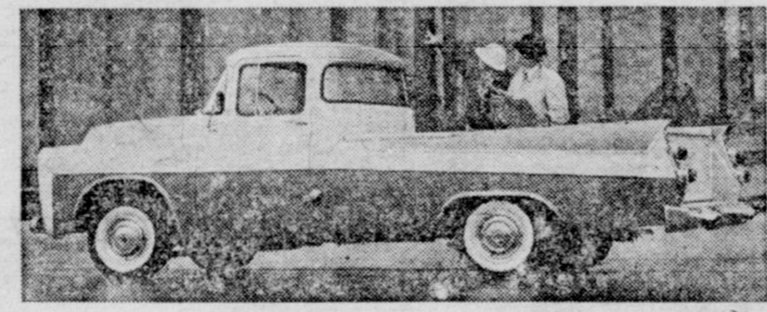
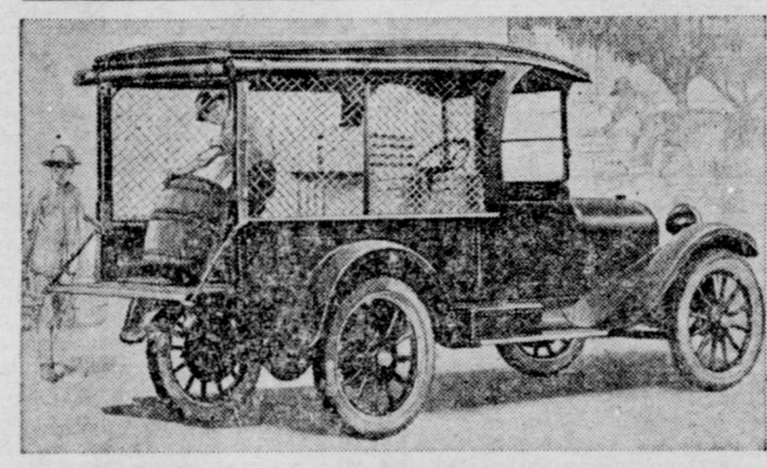
