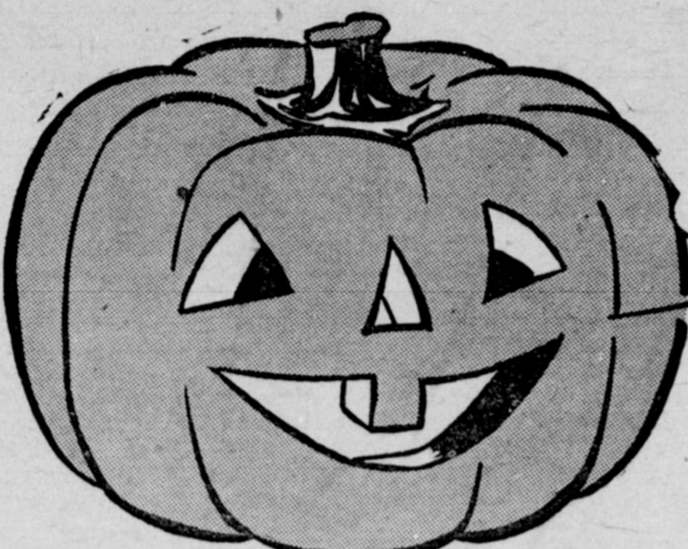

Cecil N. Brown, 54, suffered a heart attack Wednesday afternoon, Oct. 23, while visiting with Mrs. Brown's sister and brother in law Mr. and Mrs. Lester Wooten in Lorenzo. He was dead on arrival at the doctor's office in Idalou.

Mr. and Mrs. Brown were on vacation. He was employed with Wichita county Precinct 3, having worked for the county about eight years.

The body was returned to Iowa Park for funeral services conducted Friday afternoon in the Presbyterian church. Rev. Harold Dykstra, pastor, and Rev. Homer Thompson of the First Baptist church conducted the rites.

Burial was in Highland cemetery under direction of Tanner Funeral Home. Pallbearers were Roy Stegall, Bud Patterson, J. D. Morrison, Pat Allen, Claude Boren and Ray Williams.

Honorary pallbearers were the remaining County workers and the Iowa Park Odd Fellows lodge, of which he was a member.

Born in Marshall county, Tenn., June 20, 1903, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Brown, he was married May 13, 1933 to Miss Hattie Hooper in Hastings, Okla.

The Brown family moved here from Oklahoma 17 years ago.

Conviction, Concern and Commitment Suggested to Resolve Race Problems

Delegates from Seymour, Olney, Jacksboro, Wichita Falls and Iowa Park attended the eighth annual meeting of District 17 United Church Women of Texas, held at the Methodist church here Wednesday. Theme of the all-day session was "Christ, the Church and Race."

Mrs. T. R. Horine and Mrs. Homer Blalock, president and secretary respectively of the local unit, were in charge of registration. Mrs. W. G. Steele provided preliminary music.

The worship service presented by Mrs. Rollins Woodall was opened and closed with vocal selections by Mrs. C. L. Vaughn.

The welcome was extended by Mrs. Horine and the response was made by Mrs. George Davis of Wichita Falls.

During the business session of the morning conducted by Mrs. W. R. Cooper of Seymour, it was announced the Texas Assembly of United Church Women would be in Amarillo next Feb. 25.

Mrs. W. J. Durham of Jacksboro described and urged subscriptions to the Church Woman, monthly publication of UCW, and explained the work of the Fellowship Fund.

Reports from local presidents were also given.

Main address of the day was by Rev. Bryan Rose of the Jacksboro Christian church. With the theme for the day in mind, he stated the movement of Brotherly Love was begun by Jesus about 2000 years ago. He cited patterns that Jesus and his apostles set in overcoming racial distinctions and hatred.

Defining the church as Christ's body, the speaker observed that one of its greatest hindrances has been exclusiveness and partiality in choosing members. Briefing the church women on what they can do to help overcome racial hatred, he suggested personal conviction, concern and commitment.

Interest center for the meeting was arranged by Miss Ethyle Kidwell and Miss Helen Reed. It featured figures representing people of Formosa, Africa, Syria, Arabia, Korea, American Indians and of America grouped around a world globe.

With Mrs. Otis Gay at the organ, the afternoon session opened with group singing.

Mrs. E. A. Spears of Olney had another message on the theme for the session. She also gave a brief outline of the book "The Kingdom Beyond Castles" by Dr. Liston Pope.

Mrs. Clarence Stephens and Mrs. J. H. Barham, both of Seymour, showed the filmstrip "Our Newest Neighbor."

Mrs. Gordon G. Clark installed officers for 1957-58. They are Mrs. Cooper, president; Mrs. Horace Green of Jacksboro, vice-president; Mrs. R. N. Smith of Seymour, secretary and treasurer.

A nominating committee was elected to include Mmes. Samoung of Wichita Falls, O. McDaniel of Seymour and Woodall.

Reflections from the Bible

Jesus was often misunderstood. His mission was misunderstood. Men though he came to establish an earthly kingdom and reign as an earthly King. However he refused all earthly honor, and declared, "My kingdom is not of this world" (John 18:36).

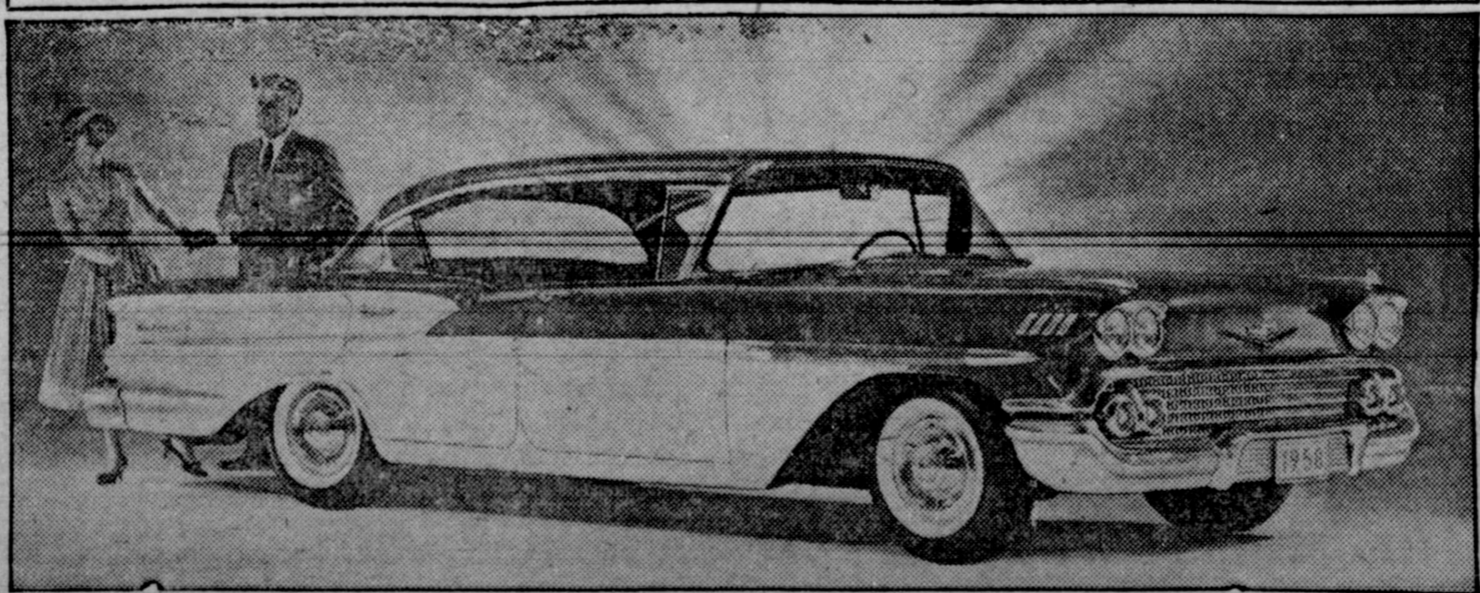
The strongest opposition and the worst misrepresentation was from the religious leaders of the Pharisees and Sadducees which were religious sects among the Jews. As the popularity of Jesus increased, their jealousy became more severe, finally climaxing in the crucifixion.

Christ's church is often misunderstood and misrepresented. Sometimes it is done ignorantly and sometimes slanderously.

We are interested in getting all to understand the truth that makes men free. We want the public to know that there is a church in the land that is following the New Testament pattern. The churches of Christ today wear the same name (Rom. 16:16); teach the same plan of salvation (Mk. 16:16, Acts 2:38); and worship the same way that Christ's church did in the days of the apostles (Acts 2: 42, Eph. 5:19).

We insist on strict adherence to what is plainly revealed in the New Testament; and contend that Christianity can be practiced without denominationalism as it was in the days of the apostles.

ORDINANCE NO. 187
As Amended October 28, 1957
An ordinance requiring a building permit for the construction or alteration of any building within the City of Iowa Park, Texas, where the cost of such alteration or construction exceeds \$25.00; requiring the payment therefor of a permit fee; requiring information concerning the class of construction used and providing a penalty for the violation of this ordinance.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas: Section 1. Permit required—No wall, structure, building or part thereof shall hereafter be built, enlarged or altered until a plan of the proposed work together with a statement of the materials to be used shall have been submitted to the building inspector or designated officer of the City of Iowa Park, who shall, in accordance with provisions herein contained, issue a permit for the proposed construction. Before such permit is issued, the builder, his representative, or contractor shall be required to furnish detailed information regarding the name of the owner, proposed location, character of occupancy, kind of materials, plumbing,

wiring, roof covering, chimney and flues construction, manner and kind of heat to be used, estimated cost of building, estimated time for completion and the name of the contractor.

On securing this information, it shall be the duty of the building inspector or other authorized agent to issue a building permit upon the payment of \$1.00 by said owner which gives the builder the right to erect said building and the right to place the materials required for said construction upon the streets and alleys adjacent to the lot where said building is to be erected provided that in no event shall such materials be placed in any street or alley so that it will interfere with the traffic over and through said street or alley or endanger the public in passing such building. All other applicable ordinances must be complied with.

Permits are required on all buildings erected within the corporate limits of Iowa Park, Texas, with the exception of buildings where the total cost does not exceed \$25.00.

The building inspector or other designated officer shall be required to keep a record of all building permits issued in a well-bound volume that shall be available for the inspection of the public.

Structures hereafter erected without permit or not in conformity with this ordinance shall be removed.

No building shall be moved from one location to another within the City limits of Iowa Park, Texas, until a permit has been obtained herefor. A permit shall be issued only in case the construction is in accordance with this ordinance.

A Surveyor's Certificate must be presented to the City Clerk upon application for a building permit; and anyone starting a structure upon any lot within the City limits of Iowa Park, Texas, without first presenting a surveyor's certificate and having a permit signed by the City Secretary shall be subject to fine.

Section 2. Any person violating this ordinance, upon conviction thereof, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not to exceed \$100.00.

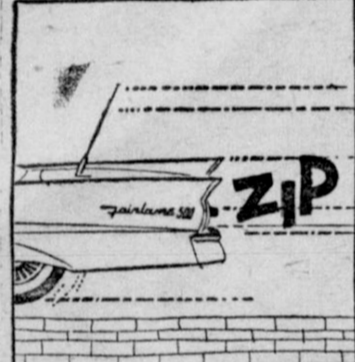

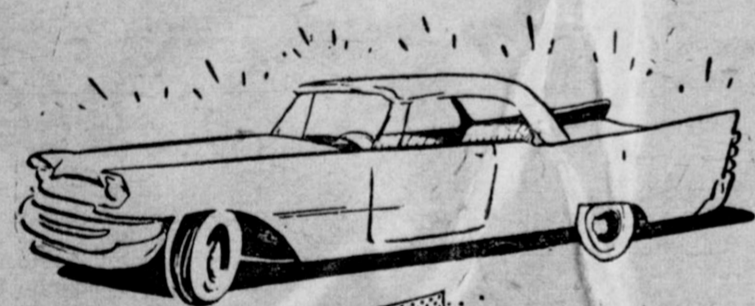

HOW BILL STOPPED FUMBLING THE BALL

The power to believe is the greatest force in a human being. Faith and fear are both a form of believing.

Here's a man whose steps have been dogged by sickness, frustration and failure. Someone tries to encourage him by saying, "Don't be afraid. God will help you." He cries, "No, I don't believe He will. I do not believe anything can help me."

One day early in his career when the center snapped the ball rather hard, he fumbled. From that hour an insistent fear plagued him whenever the ball was to come to him. Always he would think, "What if I fumble, what if I drop the ball?" When he was carrying back punts down the field, the same fear would nag him. And he did begin fumbling the ball often. Finally the coach told him that

if he kept on fumbling, he would have to take him off the team.

But the coach was a rather keen student of human nature. He took young Bill aside, and this is what he said, "Bill, I know that you are not afraid. Your tackling is too hard and you face the biggest of opponents without one quiver of fear. I would rather have you between an enemy ball carrier and our goal line than anyone else I know. Now, tell me why you drop the ball."

Then Bill told him of his first experience and of the awful fear that kept seizing upon him every time he was called to carry the ball—the fear of fumbling. Then the coach said quietly, "Bill, I want to talk to you and then you talk to yourself. You simply have begun to believe that you are going to fumble. Now, I want you to change your form of believing. From now on whenever the ball is coming to you, I want you to say with a determination and believe it, 'I will catch the ball; I will not fumble; I will carry the ball!' Then ask God to help you—and He will."

From that moment on, Bill never fumbled again. He became one of the best players in the state. He changed his believing.

These two master emotions, fear or faith, will control you. You are what you believe is because you turn all the power of your being completely in the direction of your believing. The difference lies in whether you practice your faith or practice your fear. Fear not! Only believe.
