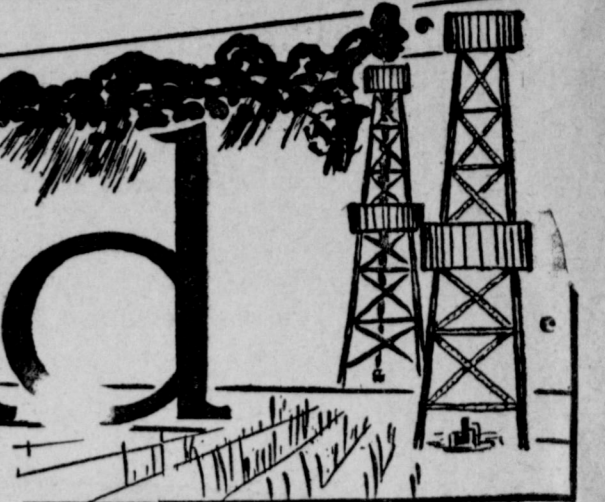

School Board Names Athletic Field for Late Bobby Gilbreath

Iowa Park school trustees met Tuesday night and voted unanimously to name the football field here "Bobby Gilbreath Memorial Stadium" as tribute to one of the most outstanding athletes ever graduated from Iowa Park High School.



The late Bobby Gilbreath, son of Mr. and Mrs. T. E. Gilbreath, brought recognition to our school as a member of the Hawk football and track and field teams.

While a student here Bobby went to state meets with the Hawk track and field teams for three years. Several of his state records are unbroken.

Following graduation here in 1961, he entered Texas A and M college on an athletic scholarship. Last year just before his death in November from encephalitis, he was listed by the National Collegiate Athletic association as having the best time of any freshman in the U.S. for the 440 yard hurdles.

1962 Weather

Total Rainfall-33.68 inches. Normal rainfall is 29.48. Half the rainfall was received during the months of June and September with 9.16 and 8.24 respectively. Greatest amount for any one day was 3.38 on July 26. Sept. 5 registered 3.19 inches.

Temperatures-Highest recording of the year was 108 degrees on Aug. 11. Lowest, 1 below on Jan. 11. Yearly mean maximum was 78.1 which co-incides with the 37-year average. Yearly minimum was 51.6 which is 0.2 below the 37-year average. Yearly average maximum and minimum was 64.8, which is 0.2 degrees above average. We can say the past year was average from the standpoint of temperatures.

Miscellaneous - Last killing frost in the spring was April 2 and first in fall occurred on Nov. 20. Averages are April 1 and Nov. 4.

Length of growing season was 233 days, which is 11 days above the average. Number of days with 32 degrees or below was 70. Average is 71.

Total depth of snow was one inch. Sleet occurred on four days. Prevailing direction of wind was from the southeast.
