**Harvest in Last Stages Here**

Wheat harvest is at its peak in this area. Holder Grain company and Johnson and McCandless Grain Elevator report the wheat is coming in fast. They look for 90 per cent of the harvest to be completed this weekend in this area.

The crop is running 8 to 13 bushels an acre with a few fields yielding around 20 bushels. The hail storm last Monday didn't help any.

Local farmers had been quite lucky until then, with severe weather alerts out for six days we did not receive rain or hail until Monday. This gave farmers a chance to get a large portion of the grain harvested.

Some large hailstones fell in Iowa Park proper, and we received 0.75 in. of rain, the first in several weeks.

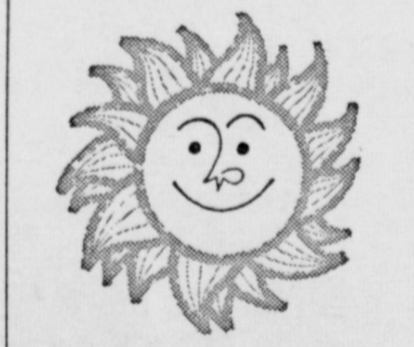

### Lobbyists Jubilant Over Tax Vote; Some Solons Cheer, Others Sulk

Austin (UPI) — Sales tax lobbyist Tom Sealy stood jubilantly in the Capitol rotunda and cried "Peace" to passers-by.

It was indeed "peace" for Sealy and his Citizens for a Sales Tax organization. The tax package would raise \$319 million with a 2 per cent sales tax on most items costing more than 24 cents.

Lobbyists were jubilant.

Victors cavorted in the House chamber, where the tax measure passed, 83-62.

Losers charged they were denied their constitutional rights. They harangued Speaker James Turman in personal privilege speeches, and charged the Legislature with selling out the people.

Some argued, others sulked and many slumped dejectedly in their chairs.

The largest budget and largest tax bill ever passed by the Legislature.

Lobbyists were gleeful over escaping a heavy load of business and industrial taxes.

Some lawmakers were riled for violence.

The present sales tax with its inequities was passed only with the pressure of the large lobbies in Austin. We need a man in Place 2 who will work for the people, not the lobbies. Let's have more effective, more imaginative, and more active representation in Place 2.

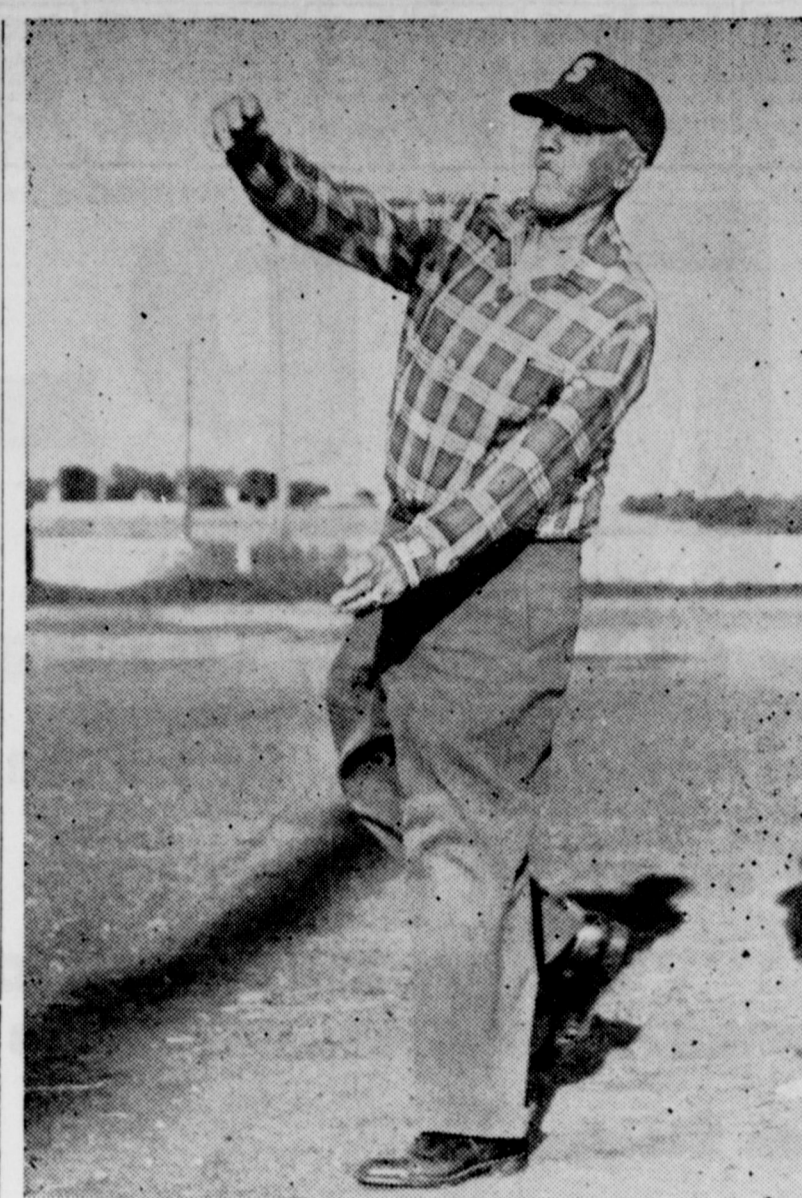

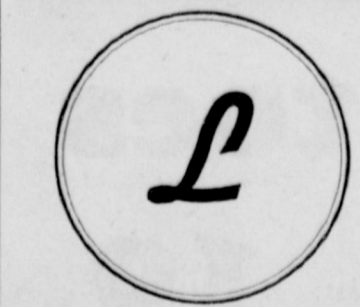

## Receives Degree

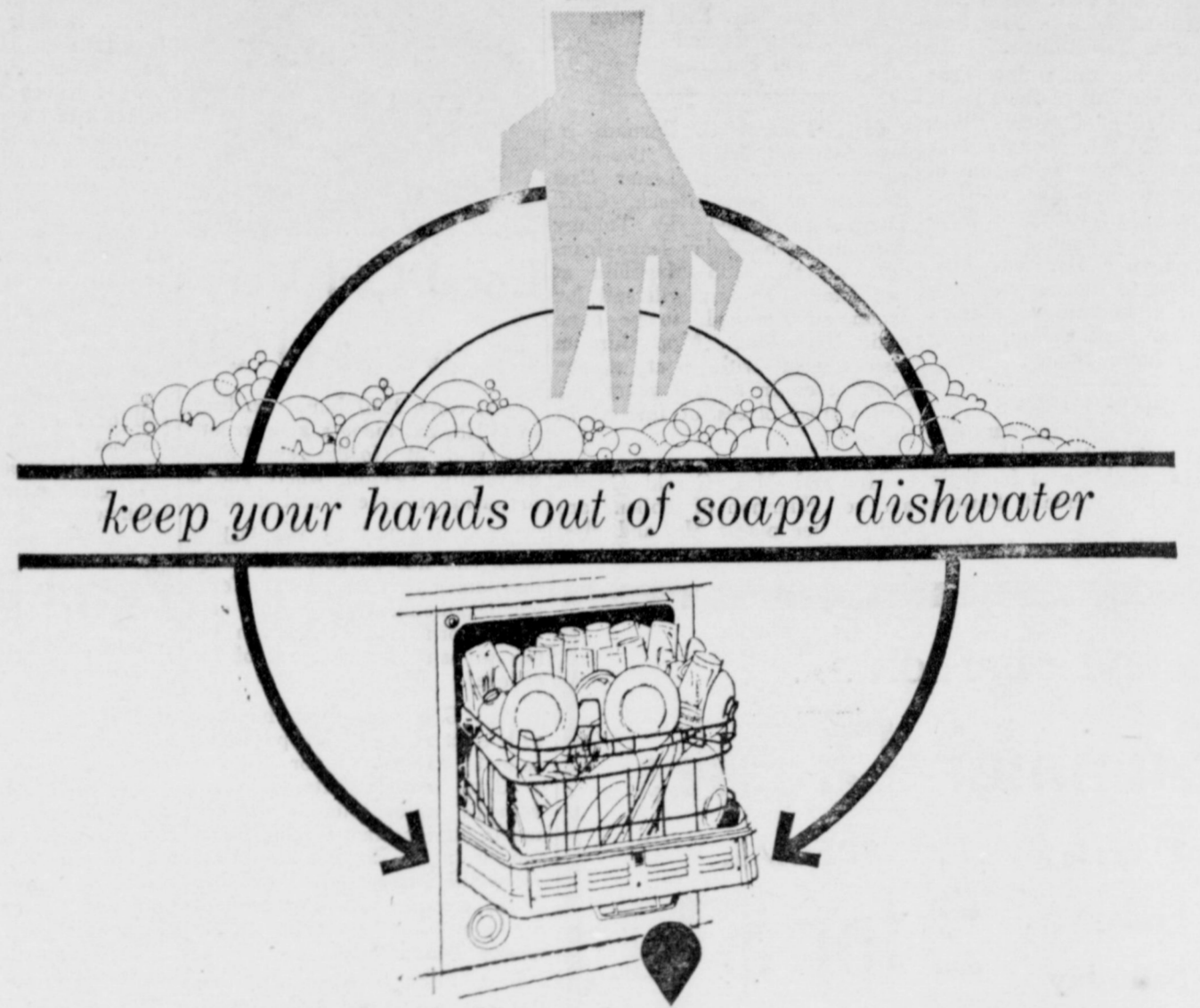
