Loyd Lewis in Space Program

Loyd Lewis of Arlington, a native of Iowa Park, son of Mr. and Mrs. George A. Lewis, left May 26 on a 30-day business trip to Rome, Italy.

A lead electronics system engineer for Ling Temco Vought of Dallas, Lewis has been assigned to work with the Italian space commission in Rome as technical adviser for launch control equipment on Project San Marco.

The project is a joint venture between the Italian commission for space research and the American aeronautics and space administration to place an Italian built satellite into equatorial orbit. It will provide high altitude measurements of ionospheric characteristics in a region of the atmosphere not previously explored.

Loyd's activities are in preparation for the launch later in the year which will be conducted from a sea based platform located near the equator on the continental shelf in the Indian Ocean off the eastern coast of Africa.

Lewis was graduated from IPHS in 1954 and received the BS degree in electrical engineering at Texas Tech in 1959.

Mrs. Lewis, who accompanied her husband on the trip, is the former Joyce Stephenson, also a graduate of IPHS. The couple have two children: Laura 7 and Kevin 4.

Youth Recreation Begins Monday

Iowa Park summer recreation program for young people from 1st grade through high school will get underway Monday, June 6. High school gymnasium will be center of activities. Supervisors will be Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Combs.

The program will run for six weeks and will be open Mondays through Fridays from 9:00 until noon and from 2:00 until 5:00 p.m. It is designed to provide boys and girls leisure-time activity.

Iowa Park school will provide the center, playground area and most of the equipment. Combs stated that more games are needed. He asks citizens who have games to donate or to lend to get in touch with him. There will be no charge for use of the school facilities.

Activities will include all types of indoor and outdoor games. Some of these will be: ping pong, 4-square, shuffleboard, checkers, chess, pick-up sticks, dominoes, volleyball, basketball, dodge ball, soccer, softball, badminton, tennis and track.

Each Friday will be special events. These will be pet shows, bicycles, rodeos, track meets, tournaments and open house.

A special feature of Wednesdays will be art classes conducted by Mrs. Combs.

A membership fee of 25c will be charged to buy ribbons for the tournaments. In the event any out-of-town trips are scheduled, parents will have to sign a permit for their children to go. Every precaution will be taken to prevent injury, but the Recreation department will not be responsible for injury sustained through participation or car accident.

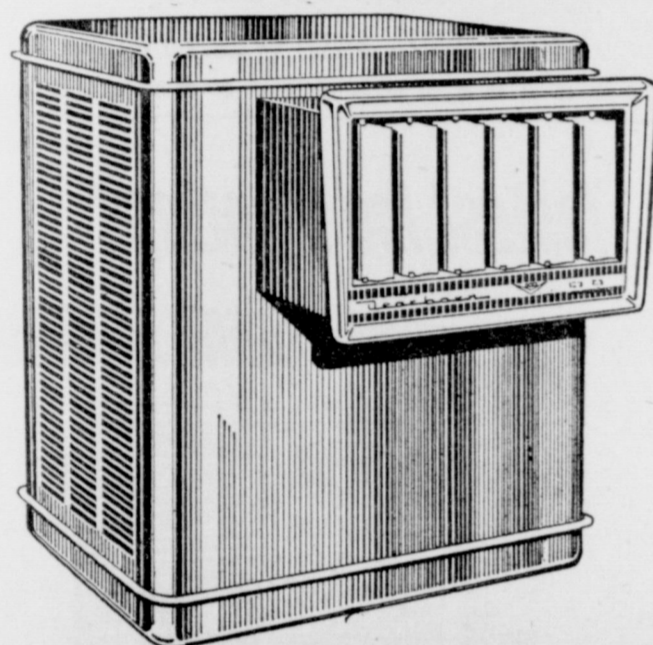
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Sewell Students Present Recital
