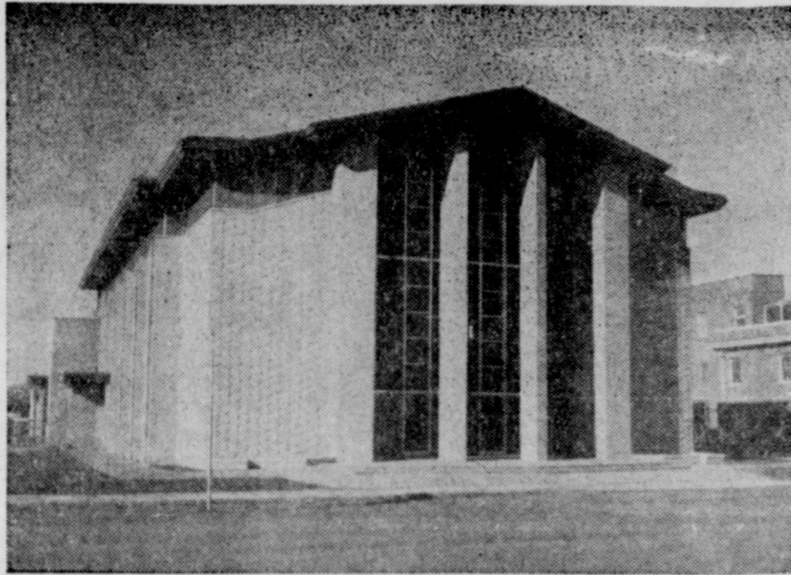

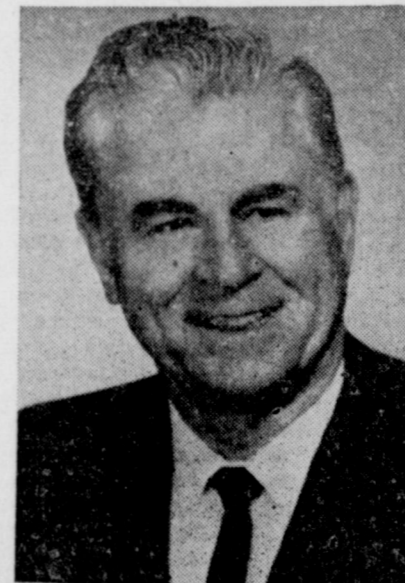

Mrs. Earle Denny was hostess for a meeting of 23 Study club last Thursday afternoon. A talk by Mrs. H. L. Berngen of Chillicothe, a volunteer of the Amigos de las Americas, Inc. project highlighted the meeting.

Mrs. Berngen, a native of Iowa Park, is a graduate of Baylor university and is a world traveler. She has spent six weeks in the jungles of Honduras the past two summers helping to give medical aid to the needy and destitute.

The Amigos project is under supervision of Guy Beville of Houston. During the summer of 1966 more than 200 volunteers from the USA went to Honduras under this project to work. Headquarters are in Tegucigalpa, the capital city, and Mrs. Berngen worked in an area 90 miles from there.

Volunteers pay their own plane fare there and back. Food, and lodging, such as it was, were furnished.

Mrs. Berngen said medical supplies for the project are provided by pharmaceutical companies in the USA and Ford Foundation has given \$5000. Motto of the workers is "Patience Is Golden."

Mrs. Berngen says 70 per cent of the deaths in that country are preventable, and that is the fact which motivates volunteers as they work under extreme handicaps to alleviate human suffering. Her group gave as many as 875 medications in a single day.

Faith and Hope Endure was the theme of a meditation given by Mrs. L. E. Brooks. Mrs. James A. Sewell rendered two piano selections: "First of the Six Bagatels" by Dr. Frank Hughes of TCU; and "Prelude to a Young Musician" by Norman Dello Joio.

During business conducted by Mrs. Taylor George, officers for 1967-68 were elected:

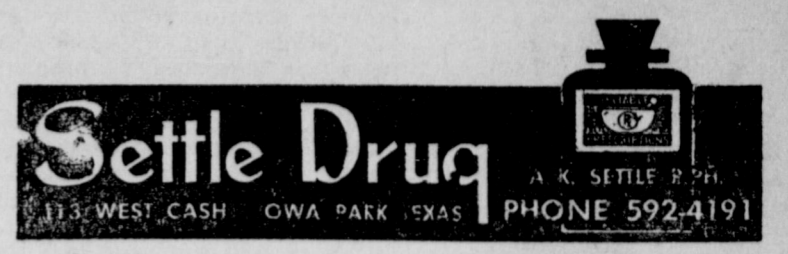
