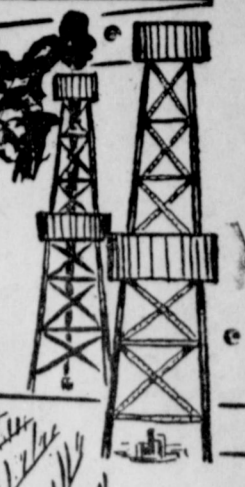

Rev. Olin Tunnell Arrives to Work with Methodist Church

Rev. Olin Tunnell jr. is new Methodist church minister, coming here from Grace Methodist in Dallas.

Born in Cisco, he lived most of his childhood in Abilene. During World War II he lived in Brady, Victoria and Norman, Ok.

Tunnell's father, now deceased, was accountant with a construction company. His mother resides in Dallas.

He was graduated from Sunset high in Dallas and received the BA degree from TWC in Fort Worth with majors in speech and education. He also received a permanent teaching certificate. While a student at TWC he was active in dramatics and belonged to the Wesleyan a cappella choir.

Tunnell was licensed to preach in Jan. 1949 during his senior year in high school. His first charge was the Eliasville circuit in 1950 when he served at Godley.

He received the BD degree in 1957 from Chandler school of theology, Emory university, Atlanta, Ga. While there he had several brief assignments which included minister of evangelism at Trinity Methodist in Atlanta and choir director of McKendree Methodist church. He also served two churches on a circuit in Alabama for six months.

In 1954, Tunnell was selected by General Board of Missions to serve as furlough relief missionary in Seward, Alaska. There he was pastor of the church and chaplain of General hospital, a sanatorium and the Jesse Lee Home.

During the summer of 1956 he worked with the General Board of Evangelism as part of the 70-E program.

Tunnell was pastor of Goodfield circuit in Tennessee during his last year in seminary and he met Miss June Kyle of Meigs county, who became his wife in December 1956.

He went to Dallas to organize the Southwood Methodist church. He accomplished the task the hard way by knocking on doors and making contacts. When he left after four years there were 418 members.

Native Son Returns after 70 Years

The desire to go back to the town where one was born seems to be inherent in mankind. Many persons realize that desire early in life, while others have to wait half or three-quarters of a century.

When Mr. and Mrs. Elwood F. Holmes arrived in Iowa Park via bus from Fort Collins, Colo., last Friday afternoon, he felt a lifelong urge had been satisfied.

He left Iowa Park when he was less than two years of age May 8, 1895, on the 4:30 p.m. train, according to an entry in the diary of his father Eugene Holmes.

Professor Holmes, as he is remembered by some of the old-timers, taught school at Clara and in Iowa Park when the building was located in the south part of own on the lot where the Lee Woods house now stands.

Elwood Holmes did not know a person here when he arrived last week. He had some names from his father's diary and the name of Mrs. Kate Emanuel, a girlhood class and lifelong friend of his sister Jennie Holmes Hodges.

Aighting from the bus, the couple started looking for hotel. They inquired of a local man who earnestly tries to heed the admonition "Be not forgetful to entertain strangers," Heb. 13:2a. He directed them to Park Hotel and assured them they would have a ride to Park Manor and the privilege of visiting with Mrs. Emanuel the next day.

That night, Lockee Lowrance, who was one of Professor Holmes' students, was contacted and he was at the hotel early Saturday, not reminiscing with Elwood Holmes, but giving him information pertaining to the town, school and people when his father taught the three R's here, and also recalling the people who would remember his father.

Shortly after noon Saturday the "ride" which had been assured the Holmes was at the hotel. R. R. Brubaker, who didn't remember the teacher Holmes but knew so many people whose names were in the diary, joined the group and went with them to Park Manor.

The visitors and Mrs. Emanuel had never met, but their meeting was of the nature of a reunion because of the abiding friendship between Mrs. Emanuel and Mr. Holmes' sister. She jokingly told him that at least two girls, Kate Stone and Jennie Holmes, resented him almost to the point of hating him when he was a baby because his sister had to cut her periods of recreation with them short to go home and "help take care of the baby."

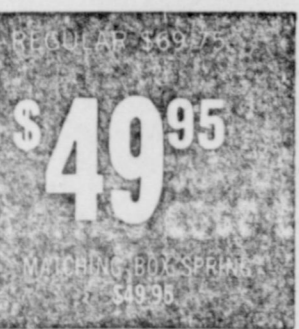

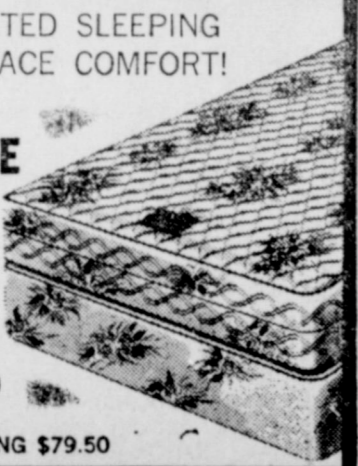

Rev. Homer W. Thompson of First Baptist church performed the ceremony.

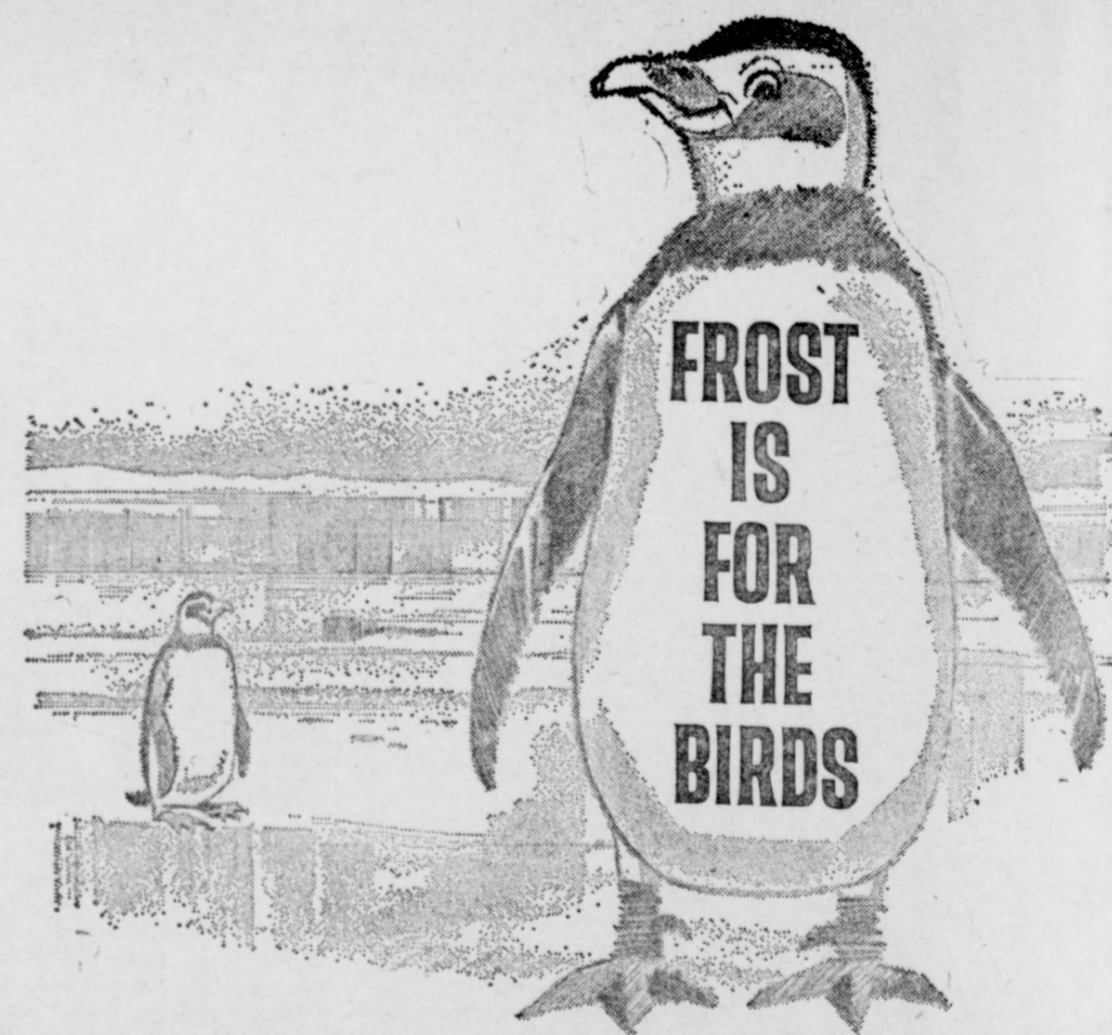
The bride wore a pale pink whipped cream sheath dress and carried a cascade carnation corsage atop a white Bible.

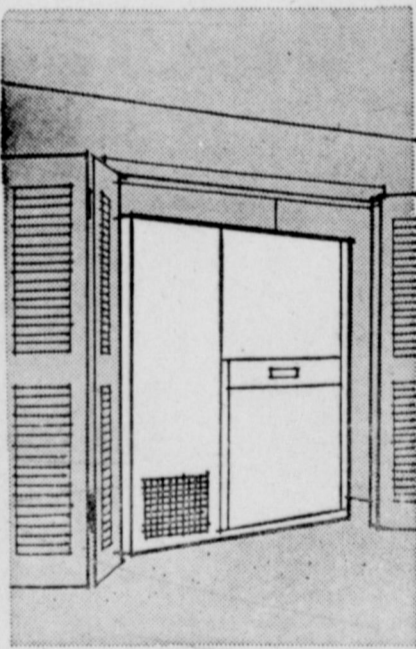
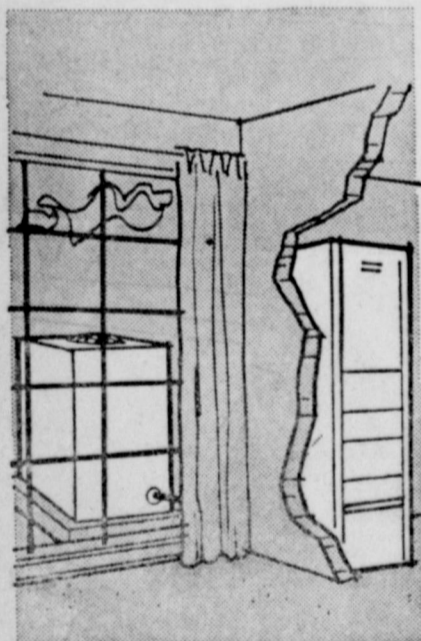
