

Callahan County Farmers Co-op. **Expanding Service Facilities**



The Callahan County Farmer's Co-operative, Inc. has under con-struction now in Baird a new ad-dition to increase production ef-ficiency. Because of the use of large quantities of cottonseed hulls in mixing feed formulas, it was nec-essary to construct the hull house on a site accessible to nearby Texas & Pacific railroad lines, where boxcar loads can be easily handled. The hulls are blown a-cross the street by powerful blow-ers installed in the building and are controlled by a push-button system. Ray Alderman, manager, estimates that during the past season, the Co-op used the equiv-alent of 203 boxcars of hulls. This latest addition to one of on a site accessible to nearby

This latest addition to one of Baird's fastest growing concerns will cost approximately \$25,000 and should be ready for use in August. The building will accom-modate 700 tons of cottonseed hulls, or if necessary, it can be used to store 35,000 bushels of grain. With the prospects good for a broken drought, storage facilities for the increased grain yield in this area will be avail-

The Farmer's Co-op recently celebrated its tenth anniversary of operation in Callahan County. The organization was incorporat-ed at Clyde in May of 1947 and has seen considerable growth since that time. In 1952 the pre-sent mill was constructed in Baird in order to better serve its numerous farmer and rancher patrons. In the ten-year period the Co-op has increased in total annual sales from \$51,000 in 1948 to an expected \$900,000 for the fiscal period ending July 31, 1957.
