## Pipeline Being Laid to Irrigation Ditch to Supplement I.P. Lakes



Iowa Park residents are mak-  
ing commendable efforts to extend  
the time before irrigation ditch  
water will have to be blended with  
Lake Iowa Park water.  
Jim C. Keiningham, water su-  
perintendent, said Wednesday use  
of water here has dropped almost  
50 per cent since the people were  
asked to conserve water on a vol-  
untary basis. He estimates there  
is enough water on hand to last  
through August.

Meanwhile, the city administra-  
tion has put on an emergency  
pipe laying project to connect  
with the irrigation ditch just  
south of town. An 8-inch line is  
being laid to the Old City Lake  
and should be completed by next  
Monday.

Keiningham says the necessary  
pumping equipment should be in-  
stalled by next Wednesday.

Present plans call for blending  
Lake Diversion water with Lake  
Iowa Park water. Keiningham  
says the blend should not be too  
unpalatable for use, unless the  
drought should continue into the  
fall months.

Through the past 18 years Iowa  
Park has had a plentiful supply  
of fine water. There are three  
lakes to draw from, but the un-  
predicted drought has caught all  
of North Texas in a bind.

The city administration is lavish  
in its praise of all citizens, who  
are taking the water shortage to  
heart and using as little of the  
precious liquid as they can get  
by with.

Noon Lions met in Kidwell school cafeteria Tuesday with Vice-Presidenting Grover Cleveland presiding and presenting the program. He introduced William A. Black an employee of Mobil Oil Co. and native of Iowa Park, to tell of his family's experiences in Europe and Africa.

Mr. and Mrs. Black and their three children have just completed a tour of Europe on their return to Iowa Park from Libya, where he is with Mobil.

The Blacks resided in Colombia, South America, for many years but because of a better high school educational program, he asked to be transferred to Africa near Wheeler AFB, Tripoli.

There was a 7-month wait for a work permit in Africa. During that time William went to Holland to help construct a drilling platform in the North Sea about 20 miles from a small island.

While William was there Mobil brought in a good gas well. In January 1965 the family went to Tripoli.

Black told of the desert and its hazards, but said it is one of the best oilfields in the world. He also described the four seasons here, ranging from severe heat to bitter cold. Tripoli is about due east of Fort Worth.

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**Purcell Approves Bombing of Viet Cong Supply Bases**

Dear Friends,  
The decision to intensify our war effort in Vietnam last week received my full approval and endorsement. I have urged all along that we take the steps necessary to bring the war in Southeast Asia to a quick and victorious conclusion. I will continue to urge that actions which will help bring victory be undertaken at any time it is determined they are essential.

The bombing last week of the fuel depots near Hanoi and Hai-phong make good military sense. We have, in the past, been trying to destroy supplies such as fuel as they were transported from these depot to the areas of military action. To hit the places where 60% of the fuel available to the Viet Cong is stored makes our strikes more effective and lowers the cost of knocking out the lines of supply.

I sincerely regret the positions taken by some of my colleagues in the Congress who have objected to the raids on fuel supplies in North Vietnam, if American soldiers and marines are facing an enemy dedicated to destroying our way of life, then we should use every reasonable means to stop the aggressors and end the fighting. The best way to do this is to make the aggression so expensive that the Communists can no longer afford to fight.

The Administration has hesitated to use the word "escalation" in describing our tougher approach to the war. Regardless of whether or not our action is identified as escalation, the important point is that we are taking the necessary steps to bring the war to an early and successful conclusion.

Secretary McNamara has listed three objectives of our bombing of North Vietnam: (1) To raise the sagging morale of the South Vietnamese forces. This has already been accomplished. (2) To reduce the level of infiltration into the South or to raise the costs of infiltration to a level which will significantly discourage it. The cost has been raised, even though infiltration has been increased. McNamara pointed out that 200,000 persons must now be kept at work repairing supply lines. (3) To show North Vietnam that she will suffer at home as well as on the battlefields in the South if she continues to be the aggressor in South Vietnam.

There has been a good deal of criticism of our action in other world capitals. This should not discourage us. Some of our best allies, the ones who have been sending both men and supplies to help us fight the Viet Cong, have voiced continuing support. Australia is a good example. The nation's Prime Minister arrived in America on Wednesday, the day the raids were announced. He assured President Johnson that we will continue to have his nation's full and complete support.

The entire history of man is filled with events which record the efforts of one group of people attempting to impose their will and their government on another. Today it is the forces of Communism which seek to do this. They will not relax until every nation in the world is ruled by their philosophy, or until they finally become convinced that the desire for freedom is so strong in the hearts of men that they have no chance for victory.

Communism and Freedom is more than a military struggle. It is also a contest between economic and social systems. In South Vietnam the Communists are using a military conflict to deny the right of people to freedom and self-determination.

Our nation has long been committed to protecting these rights for the South Vietnamese. We must and we will honor that commitment.

I shall continue to support the President in his efforts to win this war and drive the aggressors from South Vietnam. I will support the spending of the funds necessary to support our policy, and I will support the necessary military action to accomplish our goals.

I sincerely hope we will continue to put increasing pressure on the Communist government of North Vietnam and on the Viet Cong in the South in order to make the war so expensive in terms of life, will, property and supplies that the aggression will be ended.

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## Ralph says:

Dear Fellow Texans:  
The Fourth of July weekend marked the 190th anniversary of our Declaration of Independence in America from that historic July 4, 1776, at Philadelphia.  
Because of its meaning to Americans, the Fourth has always been a festive occasion. In former days this national holiday was the time when families gathered together in town and country for family reunions, picnics, parades and fireworks.  
Modern living has changed some of these ways of celebrating our nation's independence and its freedoms. But in many communities today, people are turning back to the old ways of family gatherings, of flying the Flag which symbolizes Liberty, and of some reflection upon what it means to be a part of this great nation.  
Perhaps Thomas Jefferson, who wrote the Declaration of Independence and was the 3rd President of these United States, put in

words what our liberty means as well as any other man ever has. Inscribed for all to see, they appear not only in the Declaration of Independence but they are repeated in white marble in the Jefferson Memorial in Washington.  
These words are familiar to every school child: "That all men are created equal, that they are endowed by the Creator with certain inalienable rights . . . that among these rights are Life, Liberty and the Pursuit of Happiness."  
Jefferson wrote these words at a time when this was but a struggling collection of 13 colonies with divergent ways and beliefs. He could not know that they would bear greater significance as this small collection of colonies grew through the years until collectively we have become the most powerful nation on earth—the most powerful nation ever to exist in history—and the leader of the Free World.  
In a real sense, however, America today faces the same tests that it faced in the days of Washington and Jefferson. Freedoms are

always challenged, and Liberty is ours only when we are prepared to save it.  
This is why our troops are stationed around the world, guarding the perimeters of the Free World, in the Arctic and in the desert. This is the reason our diplomats meet around the conference tables with Heads of State and at the United Nations — that the world may know Peace and True Freedom.  
It has been said that "The price of Liberty is eternal vigilance." This freedom-loving nation and its 25,000,000 veterans of both Hot and Cold Wars know this truth full well. Many others paid the supreme sacrifice in the name of Liberty.  
Perhaps it is the meaning of Liberty that we need to recall in this frantic modern world.  
We need to remember what it was that Jefferson wrote about. He was the early champion of the natural and civic rights of the common man, who believed in the simple Democratic form of government . . . in free speech, a free press, and education for all.  
It was Jefferson who wrote that he was "well aware that Almighty God hath created the mind free."  
It was Jefferson who adopted as the heart of his personal philosophy this motto: "I have sworn upon the altar of God eternal hostility against every form of tyranny over the mind of man."  
On that 190th Independence Day, America again affirmed these principles, not only for itself, but for mankind: "That this government of the people by the people and for the people shall not perish from this earth."


