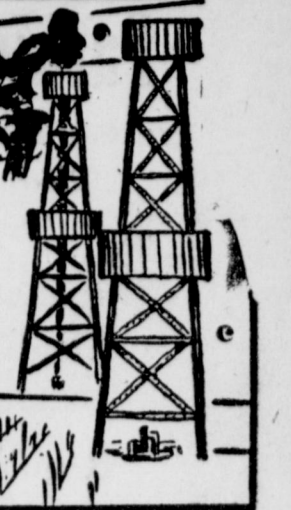

## Blood

Red Cross Bloodmobile will visit Iowa Park again June 16.

In discussing urgency of Iowa Park people's giving blood, Luther Wakefield jr., chairman of the local blood project, said this week that 32 pints of blood were collected when the Bloodmobile was here March 31. And that 41 pints have been withdrawn from Red River Red Cross Blood Center for this community's needs.

"Lack of blood collected means a lack of blood at the hospital for someone critically ill. It could be a member of your family," said George Cleveger, administrator of the blood center, in a letter sent to chairmen of blood projects.

A 26-year-old man, father of two, has received 160 blood transfusions in Wichita Falls, and receives from 4 to 6 transfusions daily in an effort to stop his loss of blood. This could happen to an Iowa Park resident.

Blood centers have been asked to collect 250,000 pints of blood to meet a serious shortage of serum albumin and gamma globulin for American fighting men in Viet Nam. No blood for defense quota has been assigned any local Red Cross chapter. Any amount designated would have to be over and above the civilian quota.

Gamma globulin is a disease-fighting substance extracted from blood and administered to our boys to help protect them from illnesses they encounter.

Serum albumin is used in treatment of shock caused by wounds. Red Cross blood program is a regional service in which a group of chapters pool their efforts to provide adequate, available, safe and economical supply of blood at all times in all types for all hospitals participating in the program. This requires a continuous supply of blood.

Each Bloodmobile visit is of importance for this daily supply. A failure one month cannot be rectified at the next visit. Blood is a perishable product, transfusable for only 21 days after it is drawn.

Wakefield says it is vitally important for our citizens to realize that on "Bloodmobile Day" we are responsible for supplying our minimum share of the needs of hospitals in the region. When there is an emergency, an accident, or a scheduled operation, the blood must be there.

Please come to the Iowa Park Christian church on Thursday, June 16, from 1:00 to 7:00 p.m. and donate blood.

"How to Get More Blood Donors" will be subject of a workshop in Wichita Falls next Wednesday from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Miss Beth Sprague, regional administrator, will be present.
