

At that time Faith church had
375 resident members. That num-
ber has grown to 670. The church
has purchased the parsonage, the
residence and a half block north
of the auditorium. A new \$87,000
educational building was dedi-
cated Sept. 11, 1966. The Sunday
school has grown to the present
educational plant for 450 mem-
bers.

The church started a bus route
in 1965 and an average of 25 to
35 persons ride the bus each Sun-
day.

During the past 7 1/2 years the
church has had 300 professions
of faith and baptisms.

Mr. Klappenbach served as
substitute teacher in junior high
and high school. He and his fam-
ily are loyal Hawk fans and he
has spoken at pep rallies on sev-
eral occasions.

Mrs. Klappenbach has served
as assistant organist and pianist.
For the past 3 years she has been
superintendent of Junior I Sun-
day school department. She has
been interested and helpful in
every phase of church work.

She worked as secretary to the
high school principal one year.
She resigned recently as vice-
president of Modern Music Study
club.

Iowa Park. He is an eighth grade
student. He played quarterback on
the 8th grade football team and
was member of the starting
basketball team. He has belonged
to Cub Scouts and Boy Scouts.

Tammy Lynn, 9 months, came

of happiness in their lives and
home.

The Klappenbachs stated that
their work here has been most
enjoyable, and that their friends
in the church and community will



Iowa Park Hawks started their
playoff game with Granbury last
Friday night at Abilene with a
long drive. They punched and

ends of the Pirate line, and finally
reached the 1-yard line, without
possession of the ball!

The Pirates could not make a
first down and kicked. Then the
Hawks started again, but fumbled
away the ball.

The Pirates hit a few passes
and made some good runs, and
with 10:47 left in the second
quarter pushed across a touch-
down.

Again the Hawks started their
catch-up drive which failed to
materialize. Granbury got pos-
session and with a long drive
aided by a 50-yard scamper, put
