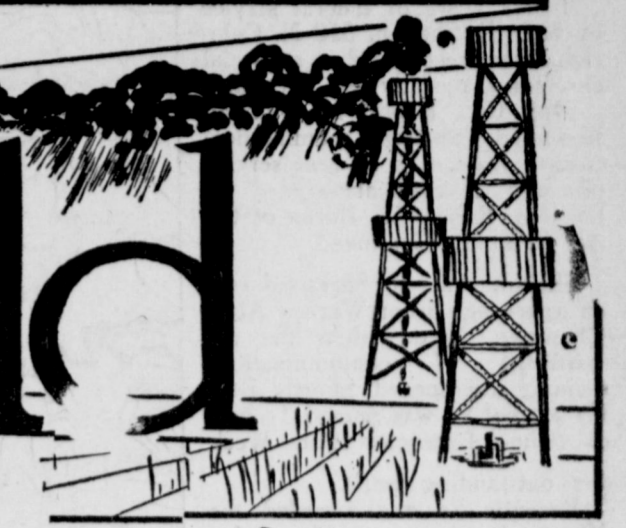

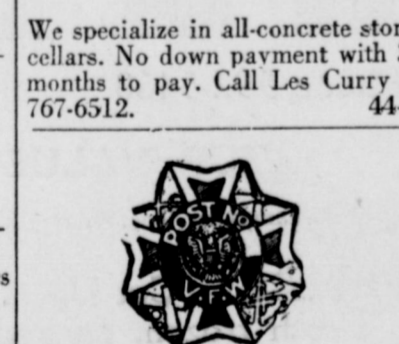

## Will Burnett, Lover of Children, Friend of Many, Died Today

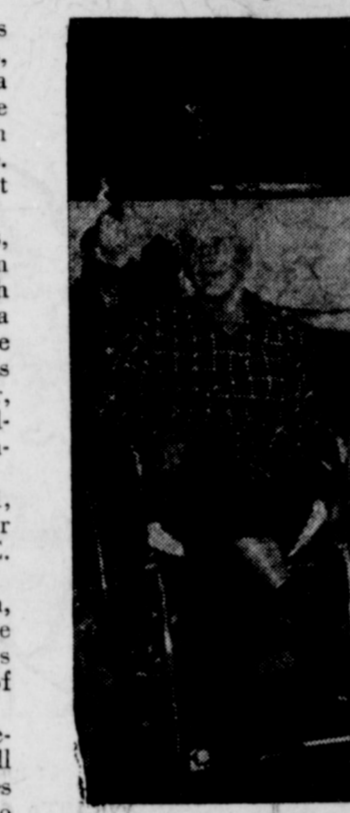
Will Burnett, one of the area's best known and loved citizens, died early Thursday in a Wichita Falls hospital. He suffered a stroke about two years ago and had been in failing health since that time. He had been in the hospital about two weeks prior to death.

Bill was born in Wichita Falls, Sept. 16, 1884, and with exception of four years on the 6666 Ranch at Guthrie he lived in Wichita county. His parents were the late Mr. and Mrs. Clabe Burnett. His mother died when he was four, and he was reared by his grandmother the late Mrs. R. E. Humphreys.

He was married Jan. 1, 1911, to Miss Maggie Denny, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. L. C. Denny, pioneers of the area. Burnett, cattleman and oilman, has left an indelible mark on the memory of all who knew him. His keen interest in the welfare of youth merits emulation.

His interest in cattle had its beginning when Bill was a small boy caring for motherless calves belonging to his father and two cousins, the late Burk and Tom Burnett. He started in the ranching business in 1908 with capital of 1,974. At time of death he had ranches in Texas and Oklahoma. Burnett was quick to pay tribute to the host of friends who extended kindness and consideration to him during the depression days when he was in financial straits. A host of folk can pay the same kind of tribute to Bill Burnett today.

Bill was an avid baseball fan. His interest began many years ago. He was pitcher for the Iowa Park team when it was first organized. In 1912 he built a baseball park where Thompson Tool Co. now stands. The Will Burnett Field across from the Youth Center attests to his interest in sports for youth. He has purchased suits, equipment, and donated cash and trophies many times to afford the young people an opportunity to play his favorite game. For many years Mr. Burnett



donated the beef to feed boys and girls participating in the Junior Livestock division of Texas-Oklahoma Fair. He was presented several plaques and gold pins by county and state FFA chapters and was proud of honorary memberships in FFA chapters. Even though Bill was known far and wide as rancher, oilman and philanthropist, his character was summed up in his own words: "I like children, good friends, good horses and cattle."

Funeral service will be Friday at 3 p.m. in First Baptist church, Rev. Homer W. Thompson will officiate. Burial will be in Highland cemetery under direction of Tanner Funeral Home. Surviving are the widow; four sisters: Mmes. Marguerite Epperson of Ryan, Okla., E. V. George of Norman, Okla., Harold Evans of Ft. Worth, Jane Bartling of Waurika, Okla.; three brothers: Bruce of Ft. Worth, Clabe and Roy of Ryan.

### Winner

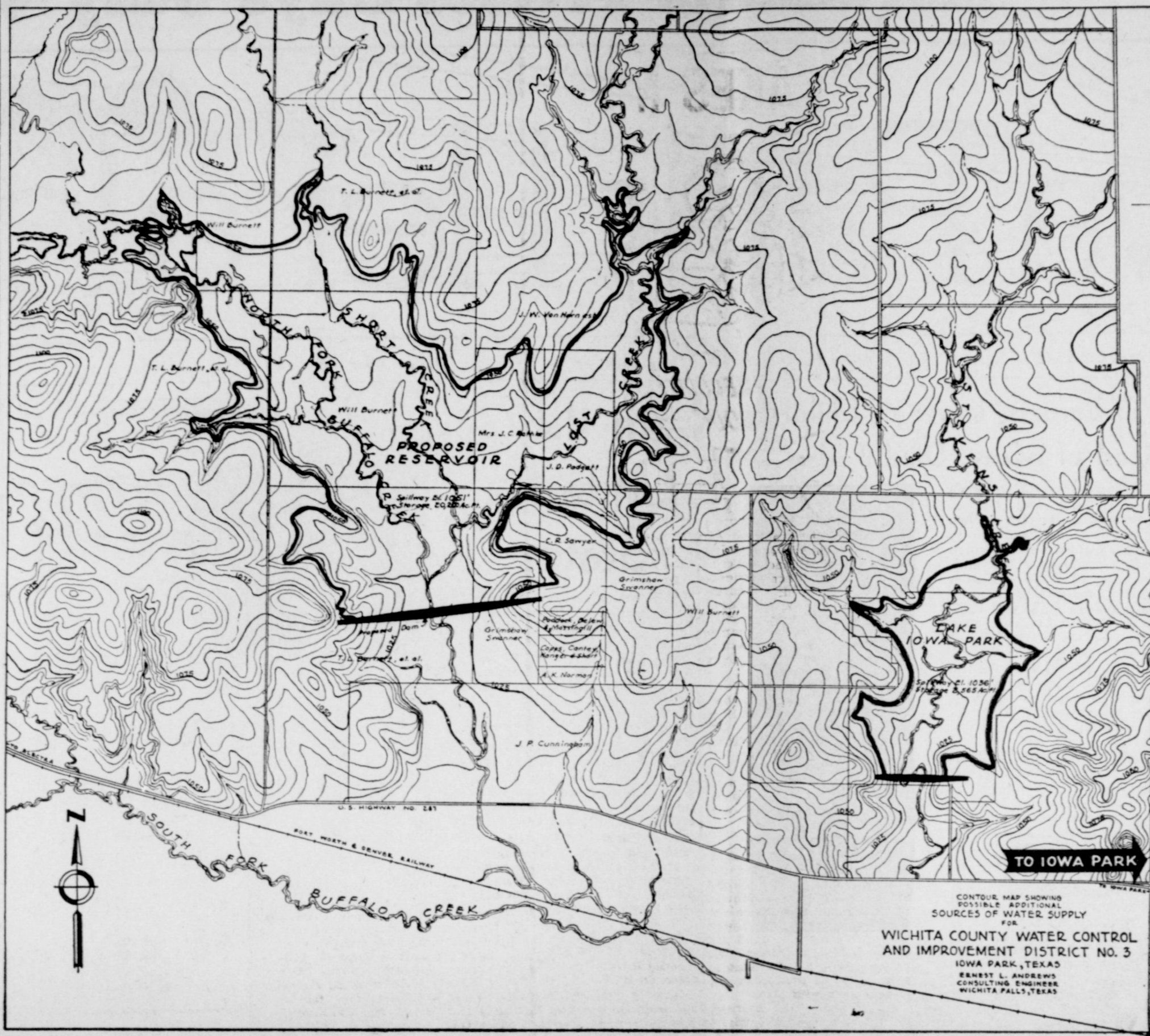

Work on the North Fork Buffalo Creek dam, new Iowa Park city lake, is running ahead of schedule, according to H. E. Workman, superintendent for Brown and Blakeney, who have the contract for dirt work.

He estimates 25 per cent of the dirt work and 50 per cent of the concrete work have been completed. The dam will be one mile long and 14 feet wide on top.

Workman said about 50 men are working on the job at present. They are moving approximately 9,000 yards of dirt per day. Riprap is now being placed on the side of the dam.

If weather conditions continue favorable, work should be completed by Sept. 15 to Oct. 1, the superintendent said.

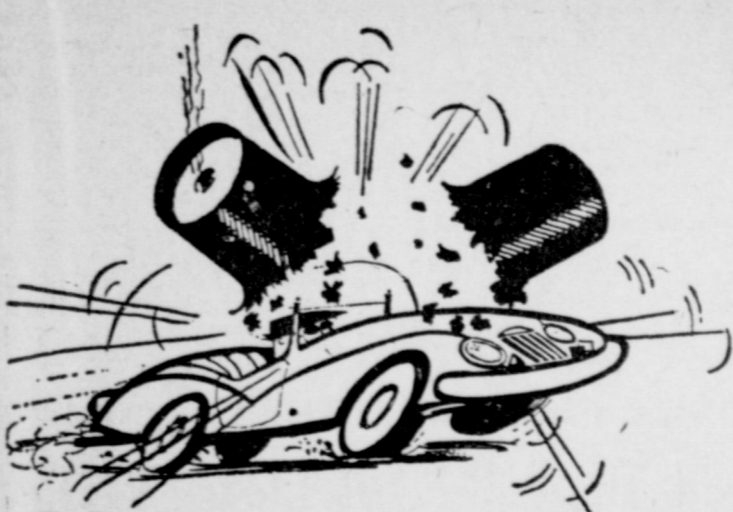

The Texas Department of Public Safety appeals to all drivers to mark this Fourth of July weekend as a time to review their driving habits in light of the fact that traffic accidents are at an all-time high. Serious accidents are more frequent in holiday periods, and it is estimated that 32 persons will be killed in traffic from Friday, July 3, through Sunday, July 5. This doesn't have to happen! Tragedy can be averted by remaining constantly on the alert for dangerous situations, by not taking chances and by driving in accordance with laws of safety.

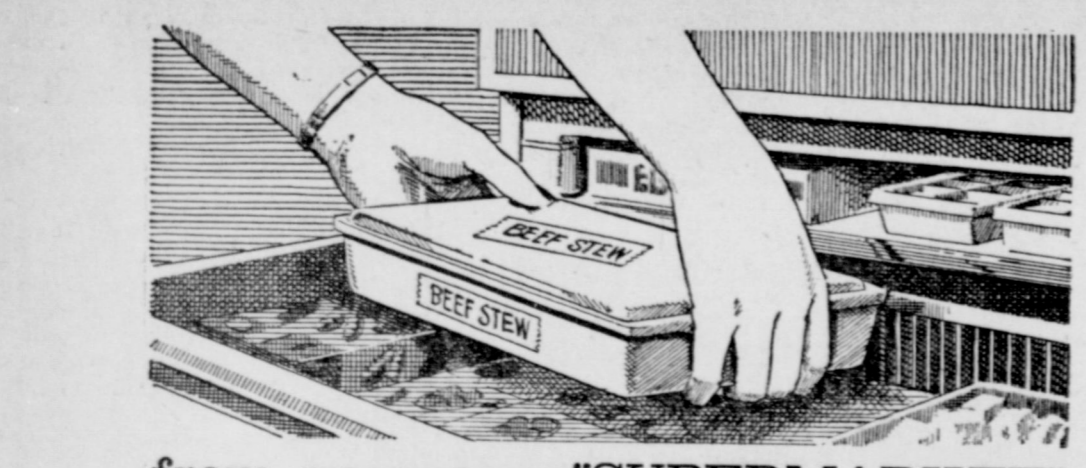

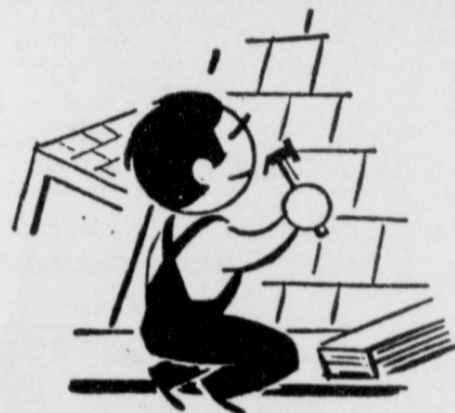

In Russia there are no 4-H  
Clubs to teach boys and girls a  
better way of life and work; no  
agricultural extension service to  
show better methods for raising  
crops and livestock; no special-  
ists to help improve homemak-  
ing skills; no business men to  
support this "massive, informal,  
educational program" which in-  
cludes 4-H.

However, Premier Khrush-  
chev did learn something about  
the Cooperative Extension Ser-  
vice during his visit to the U.S.  
In a Pravda article, Khrushchev  
revealed a "secret" to the Rus-  
sian people. He admitted that  
certain extension practices were  
"borrowed" when the Soviet  
agricultural system was over-  
hauled recently.

**Explains Service**  
"I have in mind," he said,  
the introduction of scientific  
achievements. In the United  
States of America a farmer's  
service exists under the univer-  
sities and colleges. The agents  
meet with the farmers and per-  
suade them to introduce this or  
that method, help them in  
organization of production and  
furnish them with plans."  
He got most of the extension  
picture, but apparently missed

the role of extension for the last  
50 years in developing the 4-H  
Club program.

In the early days of 4-H, the  
trained extension agents worked  
with the children of farm fam-  
ilies. The plan provided the  
wedge that opened the door for  
the agents to reach the farmers  
and their wives.

**No Free Enterprise**  
It has been suggested that  
Khrushchev might further im-  
prove farming under commun-  
ism if he also had initiated a  
program for youth patterned  
after the 4-H Clubs. Seventy  
other foreign countries have  
"borrowed" when the Soviet  
agricultural system was over-  
hauled recently.

**U.S. industry has backed 4-H  
work right from the beginning.**  
It provides technical know-how,  
financial aid and recognition.  
More than 55 leading business  
firms cooperate with the exten-  
sion service and the National  
4-H Service Committee in spon-  
soring individual projects.

Today there are at least three  
dozen areas of 4-H Club work.  
Some of the newer programs  
and their sponsors are: Photog-  
raphy, Eastman Kodak; Con-

servation, John Deere; Foods-  
Nutrition, General Foods; Alu-  
mini Recognition, Olin Mathieson;  
Dog Care and Training, Ralston-  
Purina.

Fifty years ago there were  
only a few projects: growing  
tomatoes and canning them;  
growing corn and raising pigs  
to eat the corn.

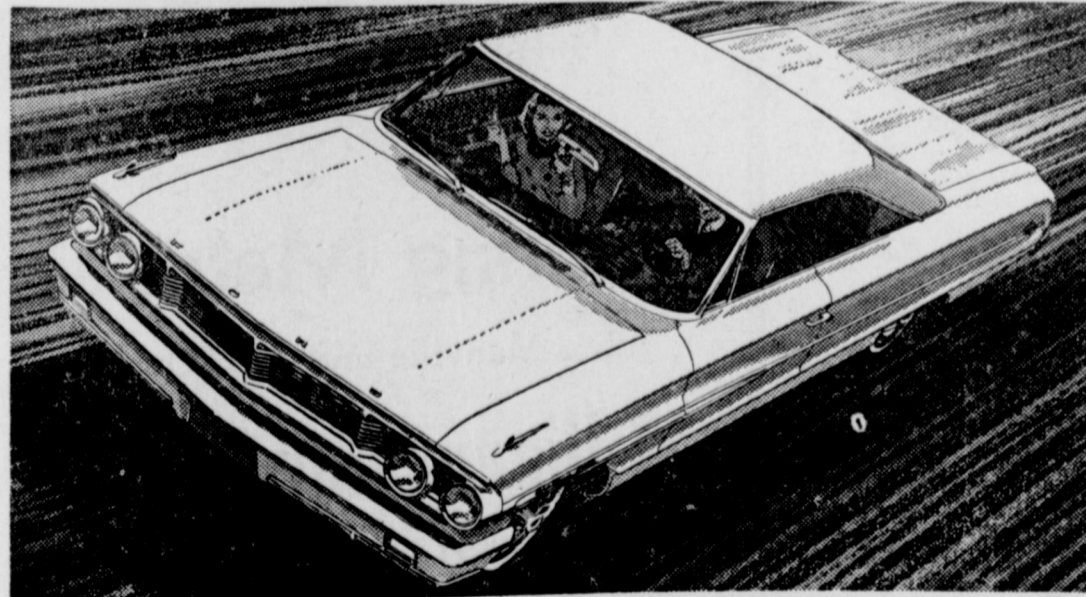

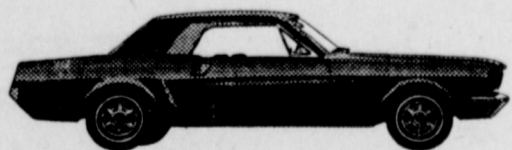

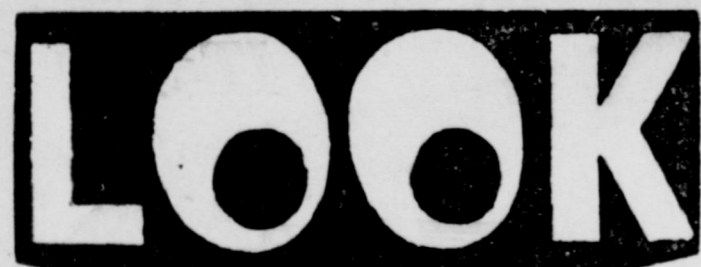
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
