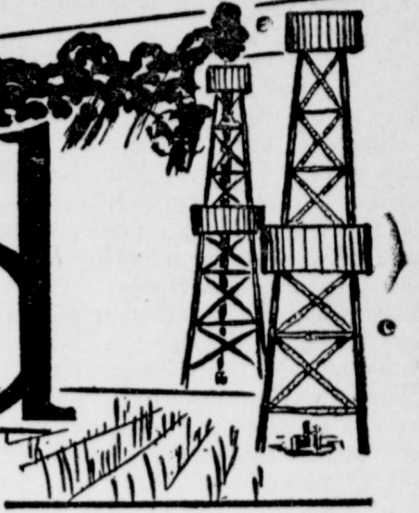

Bertha McDonald Continuing Work with Youth after 43 Years

On December 10, 1945, Bertha Baxley McDonald came as a bride to Iowa Park, two days after she and the late M. J. McDonald were married in Oklahoma City. That site was chosen because it was there they had met.

Bertha Baxley was born in Richmond county, North Carolina; was graduated from Rockingham high; received a normal diploma from the East Carolina Teachers college; and began her teaching career in Rohan school in 1925, where she worked for 18 years.

In 1943 she resigned to go in service of her country, and after basic training was assigned to Kearney, Nebr., airfield as aircraft dispatcher. She served there as a WAC for 30 months, until the close of World War II.

As a sort of bonus for service beyond the call of duty, she was granted a vacation while in the airforce and spent the time sight-seeing in and around Austin and San Antonio, her first glimpse of Texas.

When she arrived in Iowa Park the "story of her life" had preceded her. Sitting in the McDonald living room to greet them when the bride and groom walked in, accompanied by Bob McDonald, newly acquired step-son, and Mr. and Mrs. Miles Hines, who had met them at the bus station in Wichita Falls, was Rev. Floyd Boulware, pastor of the Methodist church. He told her almost immediately that she was to work with the youth of the church.

During the Christmas holidays the late W. R. Bradford, superintendent of schools, called Bertha and asked her to substitute for a teacher who was ill; and after one day's teaching he asked her to sign a contract for the next school year. And thus Bertha began another career that has continued to this day.

Mrs. McDonald is now completing her 24th year in Iowa Park school and will return next year for the twenty-fifth.

Her contributions through the school, church and community functions of Iowa Park have been so varied and numerous that her record reads like a page in "Who's Who."

Teaching social studies has been her major, but her extra-

curricular work has been just as worthwhile. Bertha had been on the debating teams in high school and college, so it is natural that she follows through in that field. Three pupils she coached in extemporaneous speech—Page Morgan, Jeri Goss and Robert Dawson—won first in state.

John Rollins Woodall won a second place rating. The reason he was not given a first was that judges said he did not act or sound scared, but he certainly did look scared! They did not know he was to play the part of Death in another Interscholastic League contest after speaking, and had applied basic make-up for that role before coming on stage.

Another area in which her students excel is the contest on the United Nations. Tests are sent out by UN the day before the tests are to be given. The top two are sent to state headquarters from all the schools in the state. There the top 18 are chosen and entered in the national contest.

Four students have ranked in the top 100 in the nation: Larry Dodd, Mike Dodd, Robert Dawson, John Schmidt. Last year Steve Steech's paper was in the top 14 in the U.S.A.; a girl from Puerto Rico winning first.

Typical of her support as a faculty booster of all extra-curricular activities is the fact that Bertha has missed only three Hawk football games in 21 years. A trophy given her by the Hawks was their State semi-final game ball. Every player had been in the contest and each autographed the ball.

For years Mrs. McDonald has been on the official board of the Methodist church, served as conference secretary of missionary education in Wesleyan Service Guild, was leader of youth from 1945 to 1952 and has been teacher of the Christian Workers class the past 18 years.

Mr. McDonald died in 1955, but the grief at that loss was lessened by the fact she had five wonderful step-children and their families. Bertha says she acquired the best ready-made family that ever any woman could have.

Dean Miller director of guidance in Iowa Park schools, pays her this tribute which summarizes her years of service: A more conscientious, dedicated teacher I

have never known. Bertha McDonald personifies the essence of a master teacher. Her greatest concern is always for her students and their welfare; there appears to be no limit to what she will do for them, be they present-day students or persons she taught years ago.

"She takes great interest in the underdog or the student with less than normal ability or opportunity. She will go to bat for one in trouble equally as fast as she will compliment one who has achieved some high goal.

"I take great pride in saluting one who gives far more bouquets than she will ever receive."

Mrs. McDonald has the distinction of being the first person to qualify for the Master's Degree at Midwestern university, when there were seven candidates in 1953. She anticipates with pleasure future years of implementing knowledge with human kindness in behalf of mankind, especially the mankind made up of Iowa Park students.

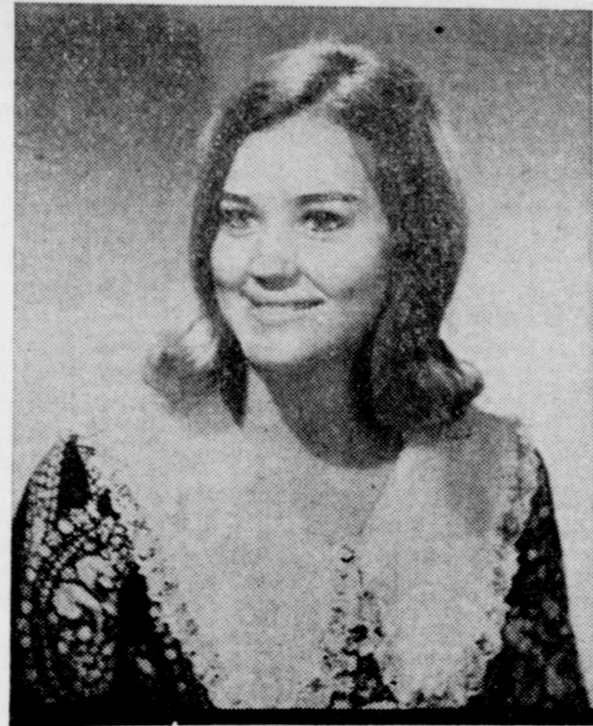
Cash and Pledges Worth \$15000 Added to Stadium Fund in Drive

Careful!

Kite flyers are urged to follow a few simple rules for their own safety, by Wayne House, Iowa Park manager for Texas Electric Service Co.

He warns of the danger of flying kites in the vicinity of power lines. Some kites or kite strings are made with metal parts and a hazardous situation could develop should this type of kite come into contact with a power line.

"If you kite gets caught in electric wires, call TESCO," says Wayne. "Someone will come get it down for you."

He lists safety rules for kite flying: Use dry string, not wire or anything metallic; use wood and paper in your kite, not wire or metal; fly your kite on days when there is no rain; avoid busy streets and highways while flying your kite.

Don't pull on the string or climb a power pole to loosen a snagged kite; fly your kite far from TV and radio aerials; fly your kite far from electric lines.

Speaker was Bill Collins of the Lone Star Gas Co. He works with area development for a great portion of the state and part of Oklahoma.

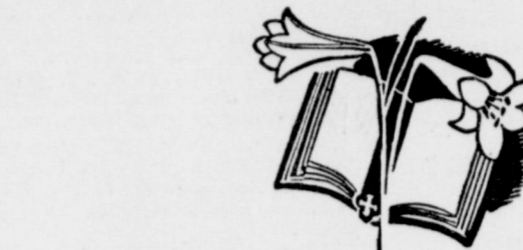
He announced a training program will be offered here next week for businessmen and others interested securing more industry in Iowa Park.

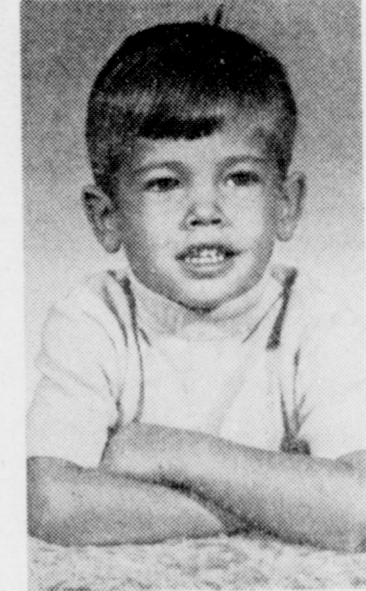
profit from the Sale-o-Rama conducted by the club last weekend. Members decided to have the place open again this Saturday.

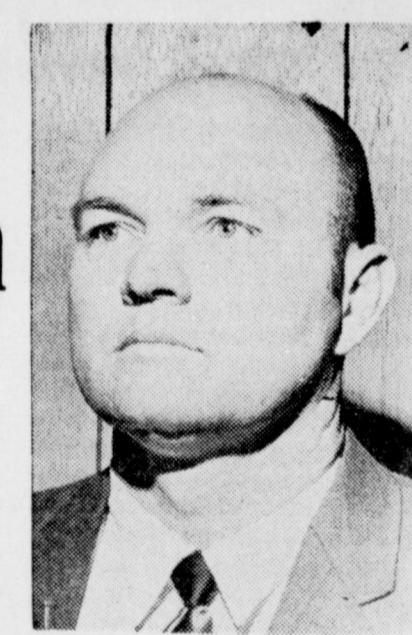

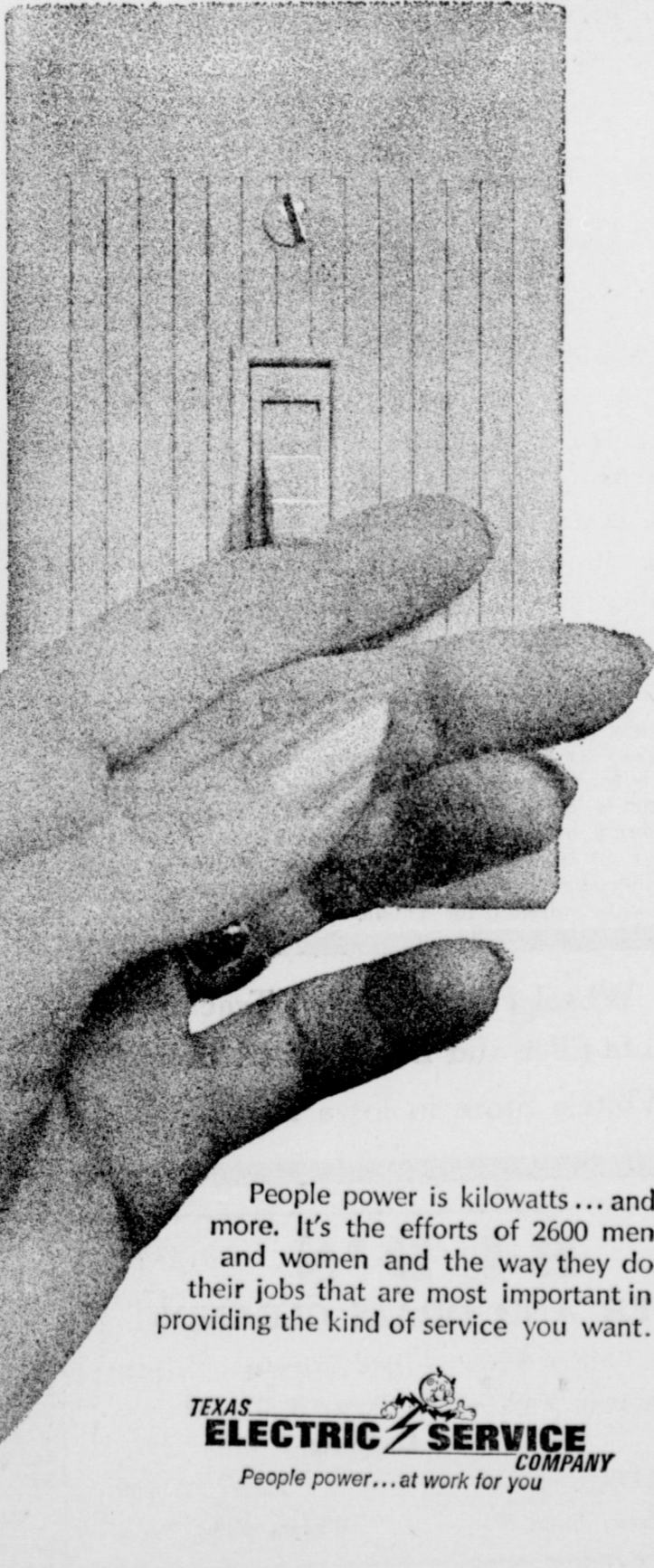
