

Patrons Learn of School Program

The open forum sponsored by Kidwell PTA and conducted in high school cafeteria Tuesday evening proved to be a most fruitful and informative session on the topic "Curriculum."

Mrs. John L. Chapman, PTA president, opened the meeting and asked Supt. Faris Nowell to direct the discussion.

Dean Miller of the guidance and counseling department defined curriculum as the planned learning and activities program of schools and named the six areas of endeavor as an attempt to develop skill in: the social world, physical world, of one's self, appreciation of the aesthetic in life, ethical values, and physical skills.

The four principals — Harold Cowley at Kidwell, John Sibley at Bradford, Austin Webb at junior high, Bob Dawson at senior high — gave detailed and interesting information as to how the curriculum is implemented in each area in their schools.

Nowell stated the State requires 17 high school credits for graduation; Iowa Park requires 22 — 20 in solid subjects and two in such electives as band, P.E., choir and the like.

Two weeks are spent at the 8th grade level in testing and interviewing pupils under the guidance program to aid individuals in determining areas of interest and aptitude. By process of elimination, four or five possibilities are narrowed to one, which is flexible for each student as he progresses from one grade to another.

Expansion of the vocational field and possible establishment of an area vocational school were presented by Fred Parkey, school trustee.

Timely questions on a possible 12-month school, methods of grading, and inclusion of kindergarten in public school system were asked by patrons, and thoughtful answers were given by members of the panel.

The purpose and need of the Special Education classes were emphasized.


The interest manifest at the Tuesday meeting anticipates a good response on Thursday evening, Feb. 26, when the topic for study will be Finance and School Law.


Brother-in-Law Dies at Gainesv'l

Martin Scouts Due Here Soon

The vicinity of Iowa Park is a bird sanctuary thanks to our Garden club here. This is a sign of progress for the city.

All our people are happy to have more songbirds.

The first warm days purple martins will be sending scouts to look for houses in which to build their nests. Houses for these birds should be put up right away in order to attract martins. Also, houses already installed should be cleaned out and insect repellent applied, such as sulphur or some other remedy to discourage mites.

A book on purple martins can be obtained at the library. Martin houses can be purchased here in town. Pictured in the six-room martin home. This and larger martin homes can be found now at A & K True Value Store and the poles on which they can be mounted are also available.

Martins live right with people and are seen daily in business areas during their season. Residents have reported six or more pairs of martins in one house, and much pleasure is had from sitting in the yard watching the activities of these interesting birds.

Martins do not require feeding because they eat insects, principally mosquitoes by the thousands each day. More and more houses for martins are going up each year in our town.

It is hoped that parents will be sure their children will help in attracting all song birds to Iowa Park by seeing that the feathered friends are not shot. They are protected by Federal law, so it is important that all of us help to protect the song birds.

Early settlers found that Indians enticed purple martins by attaching hollow gourds to tall poles.

Mayor Suggests City Fix-up and Clean-up Period, March 8-14

Whereas, Iowa Park is called "The Town of Friendly Living" and,

Whereas, the Iowa Park High School football team has brought high honor and renown to their school and community, and,

Whereas, during the year of 1969 many compliments were paid our city for its neat appearance after city forces mowed grass and weeds in many places, and,

Whereas, the new high school building, grounds, and stadium are places in which the community can justly take great pride, and,

Whereas, the city has within its limits and environs many depreciated buildings and condi-

tions which detract from the spirit and character of the community, and,

Whereas, it is believed by civic minded citizens and community leaders that new industries should be enticed to come to Iowa Park so that more of our young people can find employment at home, thereby retaining youth, vigor, and citizenship in the community, and,

Whereas, industrial leaders who come into our community prospecting for new locations almost without exception come with a critical eye concerning the looks, character, and spirit of a community,

Now, therefore, I, Erwin F. Soell, mayor of the City of Iowa Park, do hereby proclaim the week of March 8th through the 14th, A.D. 1970, as

"Clean-Up, Fix-up, Paint-Up and Cut-the-Weeds Week"

and I call upon the citizens of Iowa Park and its environs to give appropriate recognition of this week by removing weeds, grass, brush, debris, junk, and all other unsightly material and conditions, and repair, fix up, and paint all buildings within the area so that our community will be a source of pride to all citizens and an enticement to industry to come here, thereby stabilizing the economy, character, and spirit of our community.

I also call upon the youth and others of the community to volunteer their time and equipment

for the purpose of gathering rubbish and junk to be hauled to the dump ground as a beautification and health measure, during which week there will be no charge for dumping said rubbish and junk at the dump ground, provided the dumping is done according to the instruction of the dump ground attendant.

I also call upon civic minded citizens of less than normal strength both young and old to volunteer their services as overseers of clean-up crews, and to take and relay telephone calls relative to rubbish and junk to be hauled.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Seal of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, to be affixed.

Helping the county historical survey committee dedicate a marker placed on the Valley View school grounds, was Dh. Rupert N. Richardson of Abilene, president of Texas State Historical association. He made the principal address Wednesday.

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
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Jack Hightower Seeks Re-election




