Service Held for Ralph B. Sisk

Ralph B. Sisk, long-time Iowa Park businessman, died last Friday in a Wichita Falls hospital. He suffered two severe strokes. Funeral service was conducted Monday morning in the Christian church by the Rev. Claude McDonald. Burial was in Highland cemetery here under direction of Tanner Funeral Home.

Pallbearers were Ray Stubbs, Perkins Woodall, Bill Sawyer; Bill Allard of Wichita Falls; Glen Cullier of Electra; Leo Evans of Burk Burnett.

Ralph Sisk was born March 31, 1894, in Allendale community of Wichita county. He became a resident of Iowa Park in 1910. On Sept. 15, 1918, he and Miss Nell King were married at San Antonio.

Sisk was a World War I veteran. He was member of Christian church and of Wichita Falls Gene and Mineral Society.

At one time connected with the trucking industry in this area, Mr. Sisk became interested in developing bullets for hand-loaders. He established Sisk Bullet Factory in 1932.

Mr. Sisk designed his own equipment for making .22 and .17 caliber bullets. Carefully constructed and inspected the Sisk bullet became known all over the world as the best that could be had.

For many years Neft and Ralph have made hunting trips in season armed only with .22 caliber and .17 caliber rifles. They know after each hunt just how well Sisk Bullets perform.

Rev. Dan Terry conducted the service with assistance of Kenneth Flowers of First Baptist church.

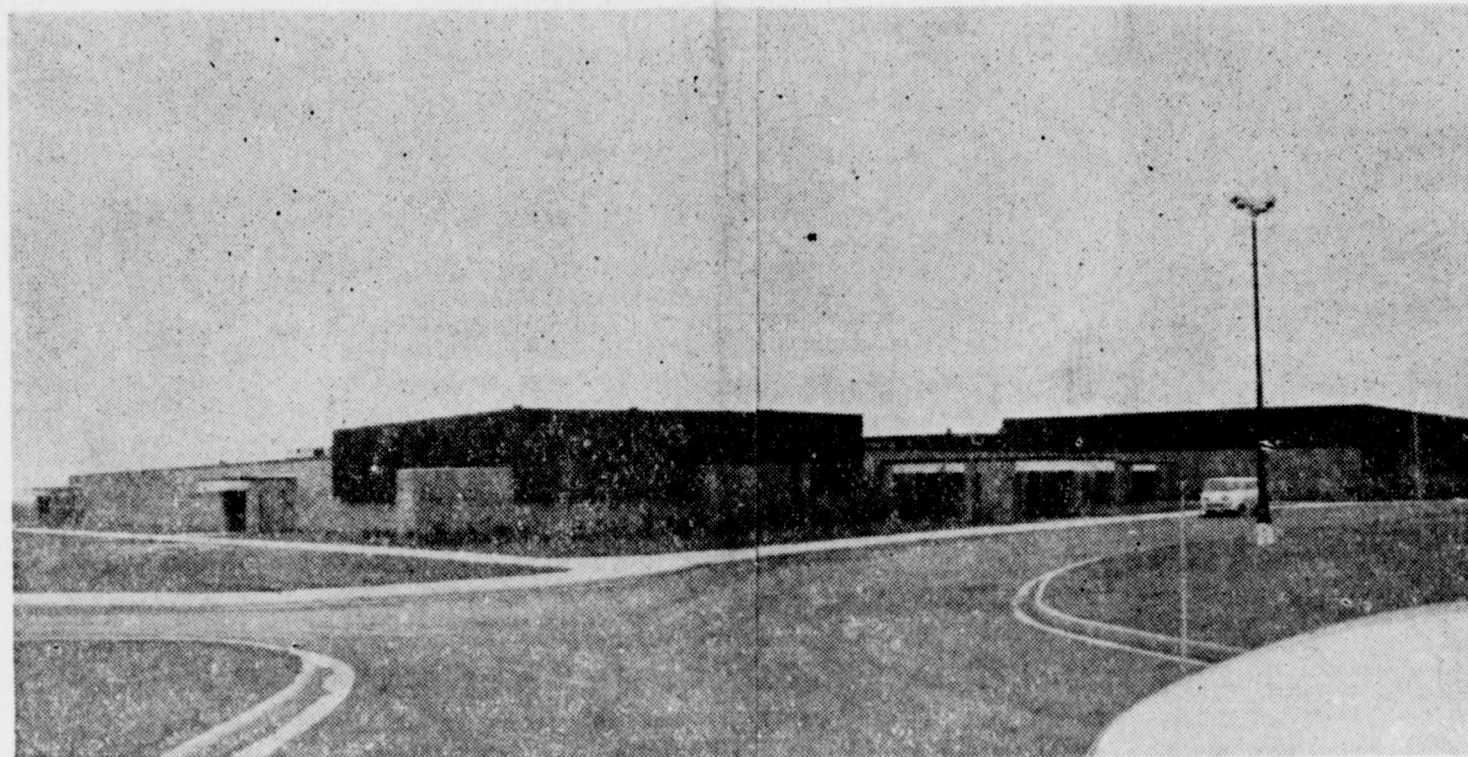
Burial was conducted in Seymour Masonic cemetery under direction of Tanner Funeral Home.

48 Years

The year 1970 marks the conclusion of 48 years with Levine's for Leota Wigley Weseman. She is retiring and making her home once again in Iowa Park—"from now on," she says.

Leota was graduated from the local high school. After school hours during her senior year, he worked as waitress at Jack's Cafe to finance her enrollment in Texas Christian university at Ft. Worth.

Two young men, Morris and Bill Levine, who had just put in a drygoods store on the corner where the Famous Department Store now is, told her she was working too hard at the cafe and offered Leota a job as bookkeeper in their place of business.

After one year at TCU, she accepted their offer, and Mrs. Weseman has been with the firm of Levine's ever since.

The first store in Iowa Park was quite different from a modern Levine's. Leota says they had no cash register nor safe, so hid the money each night in the merchandise. Sometimes even- ing she forgot where the money was cached. Such panic the next morning!

It took real salesmanship to sell, according to Leota, as they had only a limited stock. To make it appear they did what we have often been told, put empty boxes back in the shelves.

They hung hosiery from the ceiling, together in such a way that it was easy to get down one pair at a time.

Besides her duties as bookkeeper, Leota became experienced as clerk, janitor and window trimmer.

After selling the store in Iowa Park, Levine's opened in Vernon, Chillicothe and Shamrock for a season. The first step in



real expansion came when the brothers bought out a firm in Colorado City and Lubbock.

Leota was sent to close out the store in Colorado and on to Lubbock to help set the new management there. Because of her knowledge of the Levine's way of doing business, she was given a free hand in Lubbock. It was here that she started the first Children's Department for the firm. This small beginning mushroomed into what has become one of the top departments of the business.

In 1934, Levine's purchased the P.B.M. store on Indiana in Wichita Falls and Leota was sent there to help "Get things going." She was there for the next 23 years, during which time she "broke in" some of the top executives of today's Levine's businesses.

One of these apprentices was Leonard Glickman, whom she first contacted as a 14-year-old in knee pants. She had said through the years it would be time for her retire when she had

to work for one she had trained. Mr. Glickman has been manager of a store in El Paso the past two years, where she has been working.

Levine's have four stores in El Paso and Mrs. Weseman has been there since 1957. At time of the recent merger with Zale's, the Levine's stores numbered 154.

One highlight of her experience while with the company was her bout with typhoid. She was in Lubbock when she was stricken. Bill and Morris took her in an ambulance to the railroad station and her cot was lifted onto the baggage car. An employee was sent with her to Iowa Park, where she came to recuperate at the home of her parents Dr. and Mrs. Virgil Wigley. Another ambulance was waiting for Leota when she arrived here.

For months she was here, unable to work, but she received her pay check every week.

She says there is no need to ask her why she has stayed 48 years with the firm; that Morris and William Levine and the Levine's stores have been the biggest part of her life. And she has enjoyed every minute of her association with them.

During the years, Leota has worked in every department of the business.

Allred Seeks Re-election to State Legislature

State Rep. Dave Allred, who recently helped defeat the proposed tax on groceries, has announced his candidacy for a third term in the Texas House of representatives.

Allred, one of two representatives from Wichita County, said he plans to continue to "personalize" government. He said he has sought to help people in their dealings with government and to assist them in knowing about their government. In this regard, he has helped people with problems and has been an active supporter of legislation providing for open meetings where public business is being transacted.

Allred has been a frequent speaker at area schools and civic organizations, telling about government. Also he has been guest lecturer on government and journalism at Midwestern university, the University of Texas, and at Texas A & M university.

Along with personalizing government, Dave's plans include continuing to work to strengthen water and air pollution laws, to assure equal opportunity for all citizens, and to help agriculture keep on growing toward its potential.

First elected in 1966, Allred has been active in various legislative areas. He was principal author and floor leader of the proposal to provide death benefits for the families of volunteer firemen killed in the line of duty.

He has worked for legislation to help Midwestern university and the public schools and to strengthen fields such as mental health and mental retardation, law enforcement, and technical and vocational training to help people get job. He led the fight that blocked a recent proposal to legalize horse race gambling in Texas.

In the House of Representatives, Allred has achieved the reputation of a man who will stand up for what he believes in. People know where he stands.

Son of former Gov. James V. Allred and grandson of the late Claude Miller of Wichita Falls, Dave is the fourth generation to be in public service. (Mrs. Joe Betsy Allred and Mrs. Daisie Miller reside at 1007 City View Lane in Wichita Falls. Mrs. Allred teaches music at City View school.)

Dave, 36, holds the BA degree from Texas Christian university in Ft. Worth, and MA degree of Columbia university in New York City. He has done graduate study at Midwestern and TCU.

Allred is a reporter for the Wichita Falls Times. As a newsman for various papers and the Associated Press, he has covered all levels of government from City Hall of White House. In addition, he has served on Congressional staffs and as an investigator for the House Government Activities Subcommittee, based in Washington.

Dave and his wife Patricia have three children and reside at 1608 Hayes, Wichita Falls.

Farm Bureau in Membership Drive

Millard Shivers of Dallas, formerly organizational director for Texas Farm Bureau and new director of Area Development for Blue Cross, threw out an enthusiastic challenge to each of the 50 persons present to promote membership in the county FB, when he spoke Monday evening at the annual membership drive kick-off meeting in ASCS building.

Despite the fact that many couldn't care less what happens to the farmer and to agriculture, the speaker remarked that 1969 progress in Farm Bureau work was unbelievable and that 1970 promises to be even better.

In the field of industry, agriculture is second only to medical field, with an additional 50,000,000 to feed and provide for, during next year, the demands on agriculture are greater than ever.

1960 there were 25,000,000 people on 6,000,000 farms; now there are 10,000,000 people on 3,000,000 farms.

One-third of the farms are commercial and are responsible for 80 per cent of the products. It is the responsibility of the Farm Bureau to encourage the farmer.

County president Raymond Schroeder of Burk Burnett directed the meeting and recognized guests. He thanked L. P. Bumpers of Olney, service agent for Young county, for the chili he had made and served to the gathering, an expression of his appreciation for what Farm Bureau has done for his family through the years.

Membership drive chairman Lovis Barbour stated there has been a continuous membership growth for the past 11 years and he expects a repeat in 1970.

The meeting here was one of 2814 similar county meetings being held in the 48 states.

Texas reported 116,622 members last year, with 2500 enrolled during Farm Bureau Week. This county had 240 members with 75 of them enrolled during the special week.

T. J. Richards of Paducah, a field service representative, congratulated Wichita as one of the model counties in Farm Bureau. Melvin Darabny told of prizes for workers in the drive: for six new members, a money clip or key chain; for greater numbers, \$25 hat or \$50 boots to the county organization.

Prospective lists were handed each membership chairman in the four precincts as follows: J. W. Toles, No. 1; R. S. Schroeder, No. 2; Carl Barnhill, No. 3; Carl Moeller, No. 4. They met their workers at four different tables.

Chairman Barbour announced there will be a report meeting at the county office at 7:00 p.m. this Friday, when names will be sorted, reshuffled for complete coverage.

A film by the Home Mission Board titled What Is the Church? from Matt. 17:15-18.

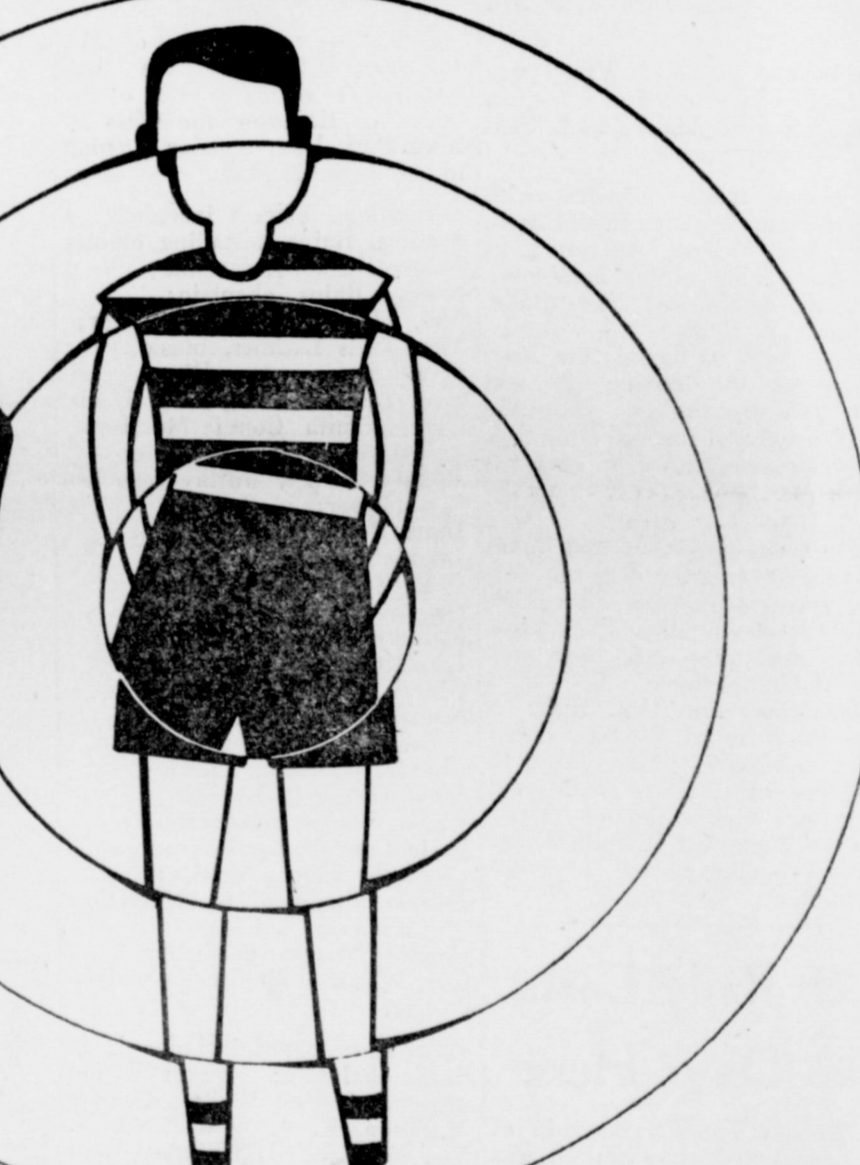
The scripture was shown. The scripture was a period of fellowship and refreshment was held afterward.
