## Park Manor Sets Open House May 10

Nursing homes in Texas will participate actively in National Nursing Home Week being sponsored by the Texas and American Nursing Home associations.

In joining the program, Aaron Wood III, administrator of the Park Manor nursing home, announced this week they will be having an Open House on Mother's Day because most of the residents are women.

But the men will be visited too, of course. This year's theme is "A Fuller Life—Nursing Homes working Together for Today and Tomorrow."

"All of us in the nursing home profession and going to get the

community to come in for a visit. We can provide for all of the needs of our patients but one—we can't show them that the community cares—we cannot relieve their feelings of remoteness from community life unless the people do care and do come in," Wood said.

"The health care revolution that is occurring in America is probably affecting the nursing home more than any other type facility," Wood commented. "We want to show people what our nursing home is like!"

Refreshments will be served at the Park Manor open house.

## Mayor Names May 10-17 as Nursing Home Week Here

Citizen support and participation in the Texas and American Nursing Home Association's Better Life Program was urged when Iowa Park Mayor Erwin F. Soell signed a proclamation designating May 10-17 as Nursing Home Week.

"I urge our community to take an active interest in patients in nursing homes; learning how community participation and public understanding are vital elements of working together, and

how patients thereby participate in the better life," Mayor Soell said.

Larad D. Wall of Lubbock, president of Texas Nursing Home Association, representing more than 31,000 beds in the state, voiced these comments: "I want to encourage everyone to visit our facilities and see for themselves what the modern nursing home has to offer the Senior Citizens of this state."

## David Kinsey on the Mend in Leukemia Program

Much is being done in cancer research at present, and a breakthrough is taking place in treatment of acute leukemia.

Pictured is David Kinsey of Iowa Park, who is taking part in the leukemia program. He is son of Mrs. Alice May Kinsey.

Born Feb. 12, 1964, David had apparently perfect health until he had the flu in February 1969. He did not seem to respond to treatment, and tests were made to find the cause.

Local doctors sent David to M. D. Anderson hospital and tumor institute at Houston, where tests revealed he was suffering from acute leukemia.

Since Mrs. Kinsey works at Sheppard, David stays with a baby sitter in the mornings and attends Adams Kindergarten in afternoons. Every four weeks the two go to Houston for tests and treatment.

David is now in remission and has been off medication for the past four months.

If a voter has been in Texas a year or more but in the county less than six months, he may vote only in the county clerk office during the period for absentee voting, which ended Tuesday. And in that case he may vote only in statewide races.

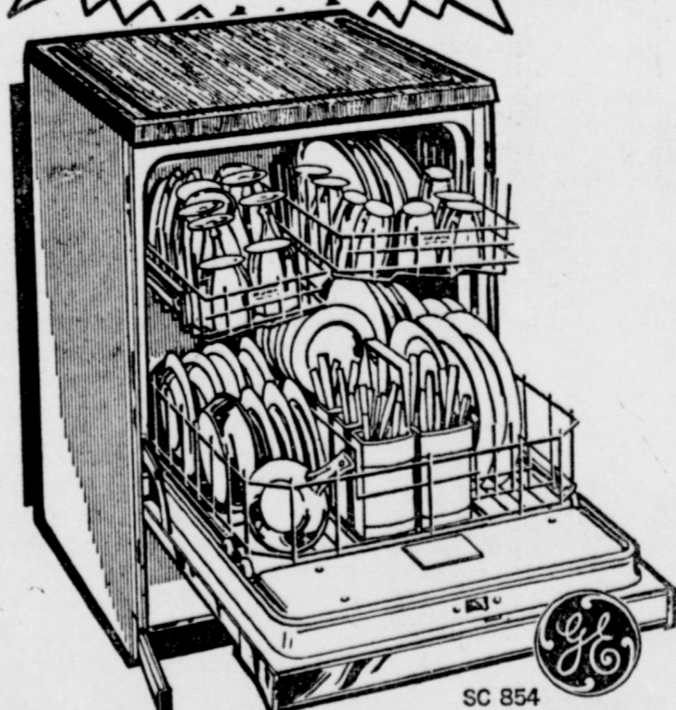

Eighth grade had a skating party Monday after school. The youngsters enjoyed the outing, according to Ricky Logan.

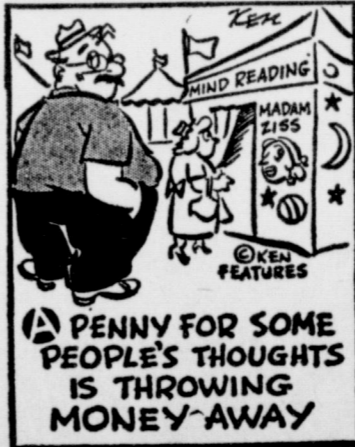
