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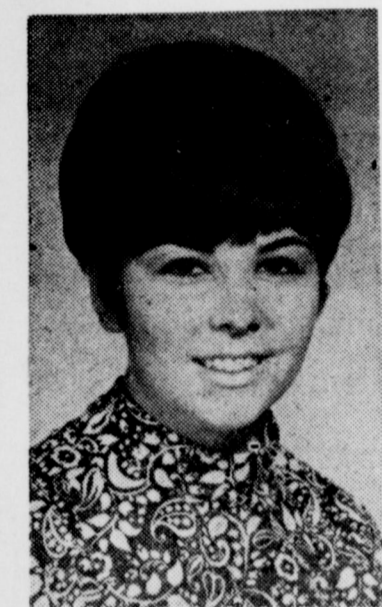
Mothers' March Monday Night

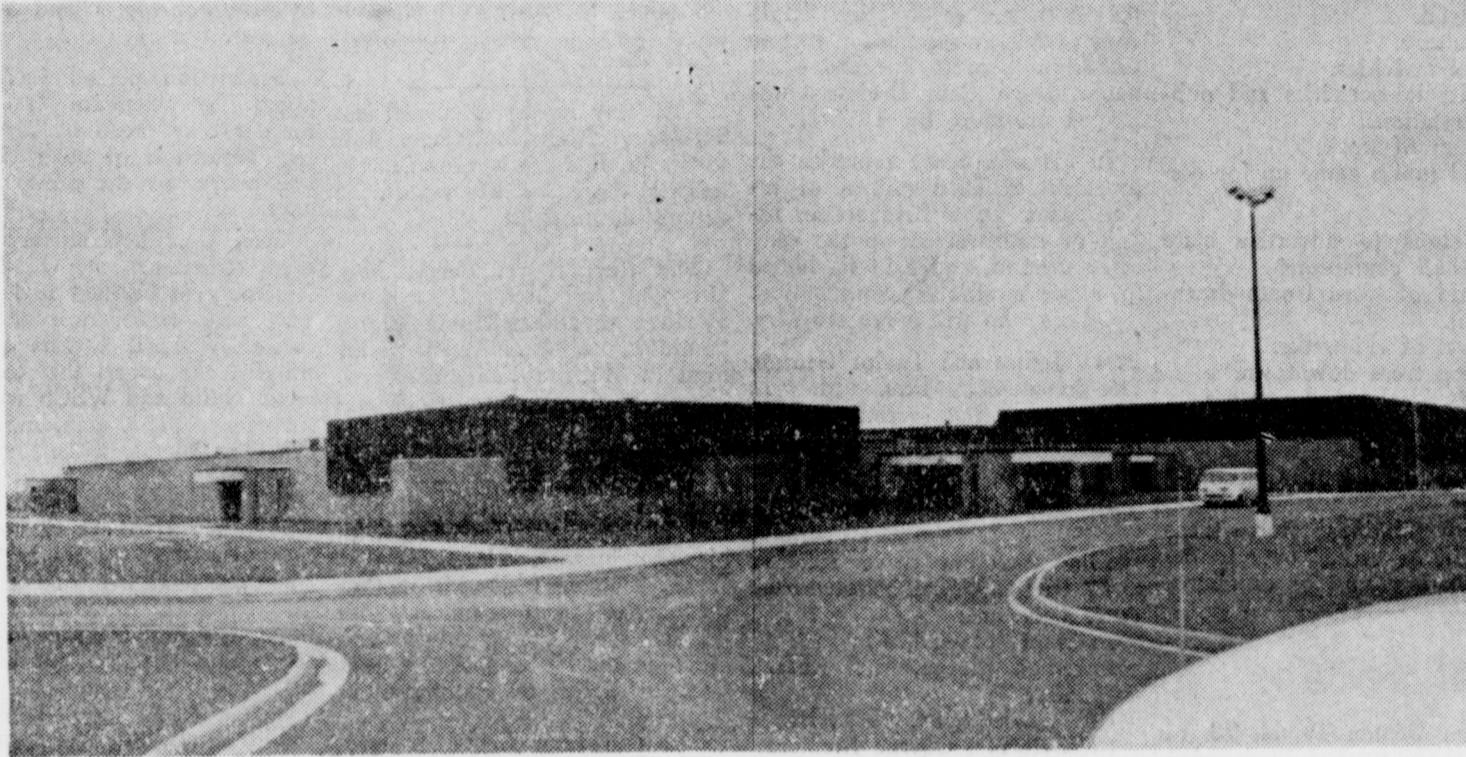
Sue Marie Ross

Mrs. Rollins Woodall in Iowa from his home in Ganbury, and spoke in glowing terms of the seminar.

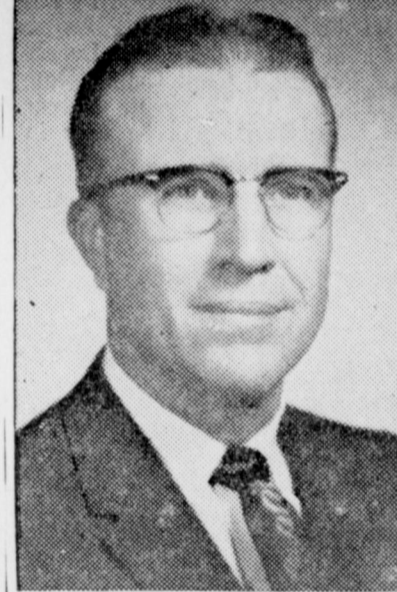
Dr. M. Jack Suggs of Fort Worth, professor of New Testament in Brite Divinity School of Texas Christian university, was study director of the tour. Twenty-four of the participants are leaders of the Christian church. The others work in United Presbyterian and United Methodist churches. Six states were represented in personnel of tour members.

The group spent the major part of their time in a detailed tour of Israel before moving on to Cyprus, Lebanon, Syria, Turkey in Asia Minor; Turkey in Europe; Greece, Italy and Denmark.

They visited innumerable religious shrines of Muslim, Jewish and Christian faiths, including two of the world's most famous basilicas, St. Sophia's at Istanbul and St. Peter's at Rome. They had an audience with the Pope.

The Rev. Mr. Woodall is a graduate of W. F. George high school of Iowa Park, has a bachelor's degree from TCU and the BD of Brite Divinity school. He is minister of the Christian church in Ganbury.

While a student in Iowa Park he also served as state president of Christian Youth Fellowship and was called upon to make a great number of visits and talks at youth meetings.

A very special day and one that will be long remembered took place last Thursday night when the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce held its banquet. In the first place our state governor Preston Smith favored us with a visit and most inspiring talk.

In the second place this social event of the year took place in our new high school building. Or shouldn't these both be "first place" events in all fairness?

Many people should be thanked for doing a fine job of planning and for many hours of work organizing this affair. Plans started under leadership of Kenneth Sullivan. He was awarded a plaque for serving as president of the Chamber in 1969. Norman Maves was recognized as newly installed president, and delivered an incoming speech.

Bob Birk as chairman of the banquet committee did an admirable job. He spent much time and made many contacts to see that all went well. Outstanding thing about Bob was that he went ahead and did what he was supposed to do without any outside prodding. Just how many can be depended on to be like that?

John Maples, minister of the Church of Christ, generously consented to be master of ceremonies and everyone looked forward to hearing him. Maples has a way of making people feel "good and happy." Thanks a million, John, for a superior job.

We wish everyone in town could have seen the table decorations. Ladies, we were almost speechless when we saw how well you had done. It was a western motif with cowboy and cowgirl figures complete with lariats, chaps, and bandannas. Accompanying each was a pot of prickly pear cactus. Much of the help came from Iowa Park Florists, when Mr. Wilson kindly agreed to work along with the Garden club. Mrs. Frank Harlin and Mrs. W. A. George were in charge of this project. The whole club is to be congratulated for the beautiful display.

Head table was decorated with two large arrangements of yellow gladiolas and black wrought iron holder with olive green candles at the center, furnished by Iowa Park Florists.

L. W. Teel jr. was chairman of the program committee and turned out an attractive program with photographic illustration of our new high school showing the shrubbery already planted.

Hershel Nipper and Wayne House were in charge of ticket sales and really "got busy," the result being a large turnout of 450 persons at the banquet.

Newt Newman introduced Governor Smith and presented him a western oil painting done by Jack Stevens of Valley View.

Rev. Kenneth Flowers of First Baptist church gave the invocation; Rev. Alfred Dorsett of the Presbyterian church pronounced the benediction.

Twenty-five Future Homemakers of America directed by home economics teachers Mrs. Louella Olson and Mrs. Carl Barnhill did a marvelous job serving tables.

Organ music was provided during the meal by James Green of J & K Music Co., Wichita Falls.

On the program was the A Cappella Choir which everyone looks forward to hearing. Mr. Darrell Dick, choir director, has done a fine job with these young people and we are fortunate to have him in our school system. They never fail to please.

Three-year term were recognized: Bill Cook, Dr. Richard Carver, R. E. Birk, Wayne House, C. A. Nipper, John Sibley, Buck Voyles and Harold Cowley. Also introduced were George Roy, vice-president; Don Schram, second vice-president.

There were many distinguished out-of-town guests: Jack Hightower, Dave Allred, Vernon Stewart and Charles Finnell and their wives. From Sheppard AFB were Maj. Gen. and Mrs. Jerry Page.

The governor recognized Mayor Erwin Soell for his work with North Texas Regional Planning Communities with which he serves as vice-chairman.

A plaque was presented by the governor to the school honoring its six all-state football players: Steve Berry, Jim Clapp, Gary Frazier, Craig French, Jeff McDonald, Jerry Pittman.

The governor called Iowa Park the state capital of Class AA high school and called attention that Wichita county this year had produced two state championship squads.

Smith pointed out that the executive mansion in Austin belongs to the people, and invited everyone to visit it.

Honorary citizenship cards were presented by the governor to foreign students at Sheppard. Countries represented were Indonesia, Peru, Turkey, Venezuela, Iran, Vietnam.

Topics emphasized by Governor Smith as problems to which he was seeking solution are substandard and shortage of housing in the state. He stressed the narcotics problem on which he said a frontal attack is being prepared.

He was enthusiastic about the Communities Program of which hospitals and recreation facilities head the list of needs in rural communities. Emphasis was cited regarding slaughter on highways, which is receiving considerable attention.

Smith said he sensed a trend away from violence and lawlessness. State leaders are trying to treat the problem before it reaches a crisis. The speaker explained that cities have at last awakened to the fact state government is a partner to the cities.

He closed with "If you sometimes feel Texas is not getting good government, compare it with any other state, and you will feel grateful."

'23 Study Club

Plea for preservation of one of the Nation's most remarkable wilderness areas, the Big Thicket of Texas was the emphasis in the dialogue program by Mrs. L. E. Brooks and Mrs. M. L. Hines at the Jan. 15 meeting of the '23 Study club in the home of Mrs. N. E. McKinney. Mrs. Fred Widmoyer was co-hostess.

They revealed that the Thicket offers findings for science that are invaluable for the welfare of mankind. Conservation of natural resources was a timely plea, since the Big Thicket is being eroded at the rate of 50 acres daily.

The story of the only Indian Reservation in Texas, the Alabama-Coushatta Tribe, which is a part of the Big Thicket project, was woven into the program.

State Representative Dave Allred of Wichita Falls is an honorary member of the tribe. Like his father the late Governor Allred, Dave is concerned for the welfare and progress of these people. He was present for the ceremonial at Livingston recently when Fulton Battise became big chief.

"And Isaac went out to meditate in the field at eventide" (Genesis) was the background verse for a meditation by Mrs. O. E. Lochridge. In her talk were these: "Reverie, it has been said, is the Sunday of the mind. Let us often in those days give our minds a Sunday in which it will do no manner of work but simply be still and look upward and spread out itself before the Lord and like Gideon's fleece, be soaked and moistened with the dews of Heaven."

The potential message of God to man through Nature was made real as Mrs. Earle Denny read these poems:

"I Believe" by Guest
"Winter Wonderland" by Mabel McClelland
"So Much More" by Elsie Halsev
"Tomorrow" by Garnett Ann Schultz.
