It's Great to Be Debt Free!

Most people now residing in Iowa Park have never had the privilege of living in a General Revenue Debt Free community. We are such a municipality—after about 50 years.

Last Saturday afternoon the City Fathers and the mayor, the city secretary and Miss Dosta Smith gathered at the City Hall to make the final payment which

cleared Iowa Park of its General Revenue indebtedness.

The bonds were a refunding issue of 1944, representing indebtedness which had accumulated through the '20's and the '30's and up to the refunding issue. For 26 years most of the City Tax income has been set aside to retire the \$121,000 of bonded indebtedness.

Since Miss Smith was city sec-

retary in 1944 when the bonds were sold, and she has signed all the previous checks which have been issued to pay the bonds, she was given the privilege of signing the final check, through courtesy of K. G. Wilks, current city secretary, and the other officials of Iowa Park.

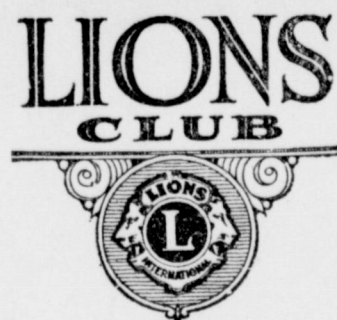
Seen above is Mayor E. F. Soell, symbolically burning the bonds which freed the general

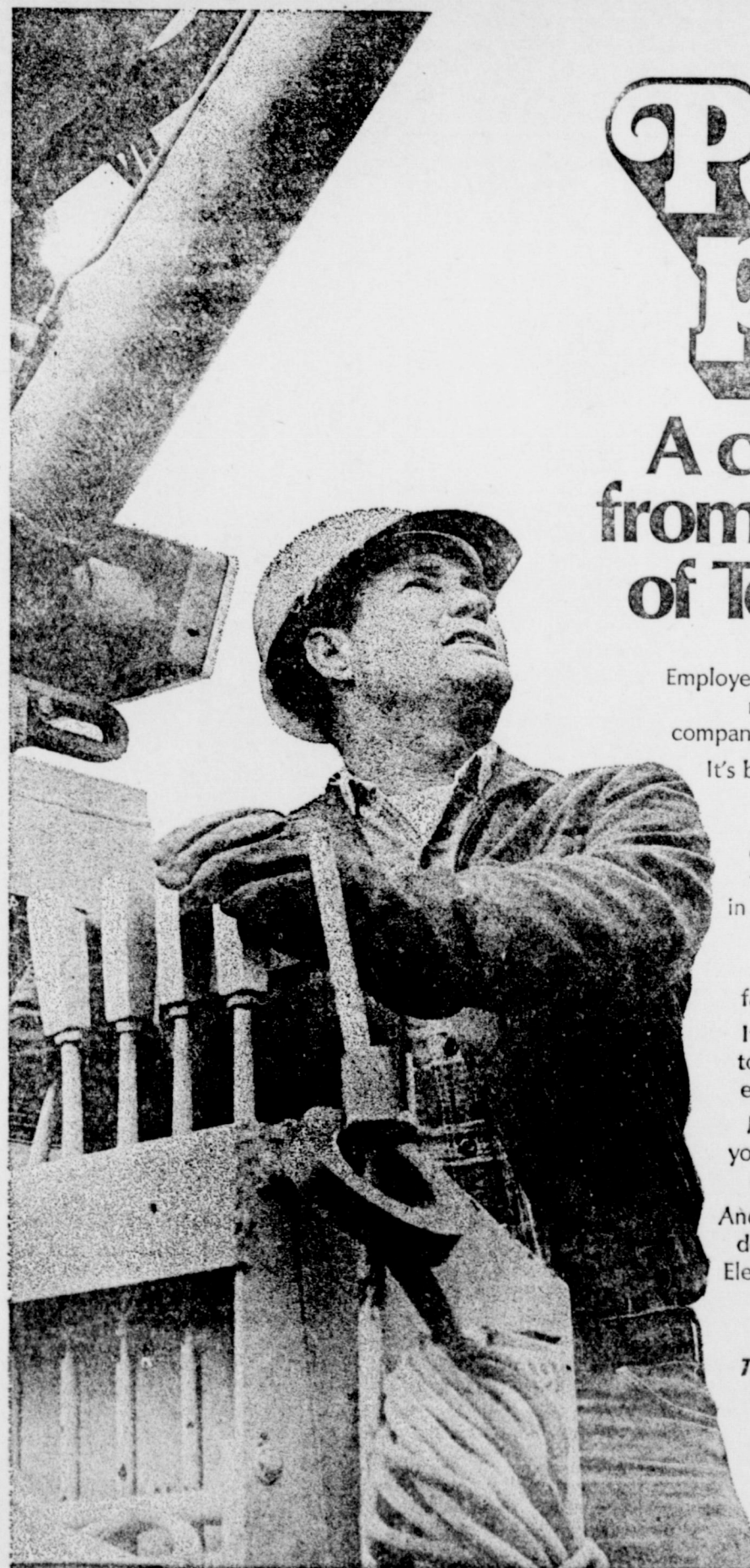

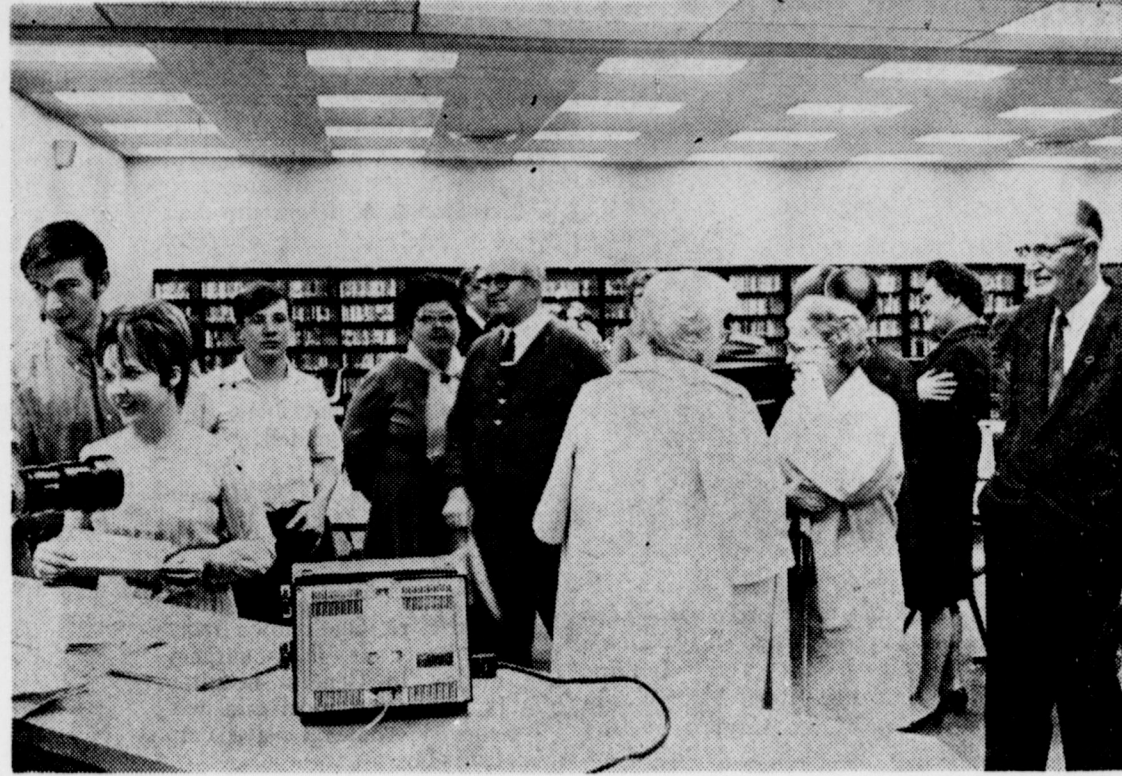
June 4 has been chosen as the wedding day.
