At 8:22 a.m. I saw a dog die! Suddenly, in the midst of the morning traffic to our new high school, a little black terrier trotted across the highway. Had his master been with him on a leash, they would have waited.

Had our city dog catcher visited that neighborhood the day before, the little pet might have been rescued from this morning's fate. But the frightened puppy hesitated, whirled around, and scampered straight into death.

I was proud of an Iowa Park teenager that day. As he tried to avoid hitting the dog, his brakes locked and his car screeched toward ours. He chose to take his chances on the muddy shoulder rather than to play into oncoming cars of school children. He controlled his skidding car as it left the highway for the roadside ditch, and fortunately no one was hurt.

No dog in Iowa Park is worth the life of any person in Iowa Park; and no dog owner should be allowed to endanger our school children's lives. Any dog worthy of being a pet should be confined or kept on a leash as the city ordinance specifies. As City Health Officer and as parent of four children who travel our streets to class each morning, I strongly support our city dog ordinance and the work of our city dog catcher.

I am most grateful to the skillful teenaged driver who unfortunately had to kill a dog one morning, but who chose to risk his own life to save ours that day!
