## City Council

Iowa Park city aldermen voted Monday night to accept the plat presented by W. T. Crawford for his use of Block N. He plans to build a grocery store on the block with considerable parking facilities. The building permit for this structure was issued last week.

After considerable discussion, the council voted to enter into a contract with Riewe & Wischmeyer, consulting engineers, to plan for expanded sewerage facilities here.

Passed through first reading was Ordinance 150 authorizing the destruction of old buildings and other facilities which have been declared to be nuisances in the city. Ordinance 141-A amending the Housing Code, was also passed.

The City Fathers accepted a bid of \$1,062.31 as price for a portable radar to be used by the police in controlling traffic.

Resolution was passed calling the city election on April 4. The mayor and three aldermen positions will be filled. At the same time voters will have opportunity to accept the Home Rule charter proposition and a zoning ordinance.

Candidates for the positions have until March 4 to file for a place on the ballot.

The council decided to ask 35¢ per thousand gallons for treated water sold to Wichita Valley Water Corporation. This will be a 5¢ rise in price.

A recent trip by some councilmen and Mayor Erwin F. Soell was discussed. They inspected the sewerage facilities at Muenster, Carrollton and Weatherford. The subject of plastic bags for garbage was brought up, but nothing was done. This problem will be considered further.

Arch Hughes was in a hospital and did not get to attend.

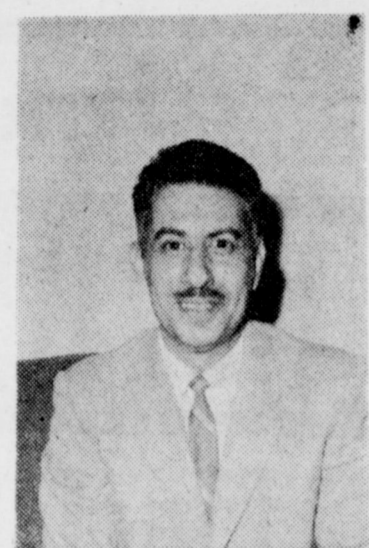

Robert Puder, who will be retired from the air force Jan. 31, has made arrangements to open an insurance agency at 119 West Park, in the east room of White's Store. He will handle all types of fire and casualty insurance.

Puder and his wife Rose have four sons. Robert D. is a graduate of W. F. George high school here and is taking pre-med training at Midwestern university. Roy is a sophomore in IPHS. Rick is a sixth grader and Mark, a fourth grader at Kidwell. Puder enlisted in the air force Aug. 18, 1949 and was assigned to Sheppard AFB in November to attend aircraft and engine maintenance school. He remained as instructor in the engine branch until Jan. 1953, when he was discharged from USAF. Puder re-enlisted in June of 1953 and was assigned to SAC bases until 1964, when he was retained to work on the Atlas missile. In 1965 he went into communications, staying at Sheppard from July 1964 until Oct. 1965.

Assignment to Japan lasted 3 years, and he returned to Sheppard in Oct. of 1963.

## Welcome, Gov. Preston Smith To Our Friendly, Growing City

Citizens and friends of Iowa Park, the growing town of friendly living, will gather in Iowa Park High School cafeteria this evening for the Chamber of Commerce banquet.

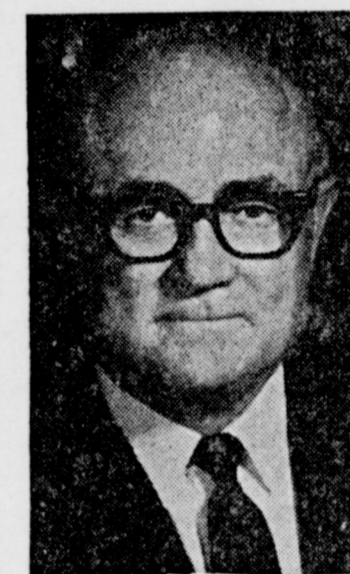
Besides the food and fellowship the folk will have opportunity to meet Governor Preston Smith and hear him discuss the status of Texas in general and Iowa Park in particular.

Governor Smith made the following remarks recently:

"Most of us began our lives in a rural or small town environment. We have seen Texas transformed from an agricultural economy to a major industrial state.

"When we look back at our home towns we find they either have become crowded cities or are decaying into nothingness.

"In a recent 40-year period, 136 Texas communities completely disappeared from the map. Inability to make the transition from an agriculture- and oil-based economy to the diversified economies of today caused their demise.



More than 2,000,000 persons, or about 20 percent of the state's population, live in small towns and cities. If surveys are accurate, many more would like to live in small communities but

cannot for lack of opportunity.

Yet, our cities tend to be overcrowded. Traffic jams too often mark the beginning and the end of each workday. Downtown centers are decaying or have decayed. Slums have arisen to replace almost every slum we have cleared. Air and water pollution abound; our people flee to the sprawling suburbs while despair eats at the heart of our larger cities.

"As we seek solutions to the aching problems of urban centers, we tend to regard city crisis and rural decay as separate and unequal problems. Actually, they are intertwined. We cannot simply deal with urban problems of education, housing, employment, public health and welfare without dealing with rural decay.

"We need a balanced economy and distribution of population. About 70 percent of our people live on 1 percent of our land area. If we continue worrying about urban problems in a relatively exclusive way without attending to the plight of small towns, we will have only rural wastelands and urban slums."

## CITY OF IOWA PARK, TEXAS ORDINANCE NO. 150

An ordinance declaring certain buildings and structures found unsafe, dangerous or hazardous to be nuisances; providing for the abatement of such nuisances; providing for charging the costs of such abatement to the property so being improved; providing for a special assessment lien; providing a severability clause; repealing conflicting ordinances; providing a penalty for violation.

(Here follows the body of the ordinance which may be read by all interested persons at the Office of the City Secretary, at City Hall.)

Introduced and passed on the 12th day of January, A.D. 1970.

This ordinance will be scheduled for final reading and passage at the next City Council meeting Jan. 26, 1970. 46-1c

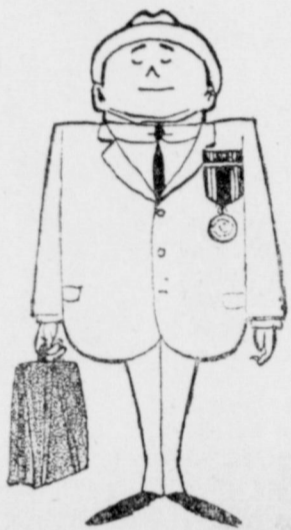

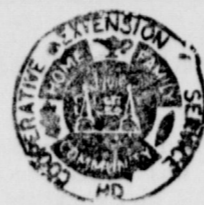
