Electricians to Take Test March 10

K. G. Wilks, city secretary, announced Wednesday he will conduct examinations next Tuesday, March 10, for electricians who want to be licensed to work in Iowa Park.

If applicants pass the test, fees for a license will be \$20 for a journeyman electrician; \$50 for a master's license. The latter will also be required to furnish \$5000 bond. If applicant does not pass the test, there will be no charge.

Licenses are dated from Jan. 1 of each year and terminate on Dec. 31. Renewals, journeyman

or master electrician, will be \$10 each year.

Wilks said a property owner can do his own work if he is competent, but the finished job must pass inspection by the city's electrical inspection Gene Lowrey.

The use of qualified electricians to do repairs and new installations is recommended as a protection of the owner, renter and neighboring business locations and homes.

Only master electricians are authorized to contract work, the journeymen do their work under supervision of master electricians.

Mrs. Henry Jones Retires after 43 Years as Classroom Teacher



One who has spent the major part of her life associated with and teaching children of primary age is retiring after 43 years in school rooms.

Effective March 1, Mrs. Henry Jones, wife of Precinct 3 constable, resigned as member of the Iowa Park school faculty and is retiring after 25 years as teacher in Oklahoma and 18 years in Iowa Park.

Immediately upon her graduation at Fletcher, Ok., high school in 1926, Zada Josephine Meyer began teaching and going to school intermittently. The first year she taught three months, the next year six months.

When not teaching, Zada attended Central State college at Edmond, Okla., graduating there with the class known as "The Famous 400," the largest up to that time. She lived with her grandparents while attending college.

Before coming to Texas, which state held no special attraction for her until Henry persuaded her to come live here, she taught in these schools in the Walters area: Emerson, Fairview, Pecan Grove, Plainview District, Lone Star,

Temple and at Walters Independent school, where she was employed at time of her marriage in 1952.

Since that time Mrs. Jones has taught second grade in Iowa Park elementary school and the past nine years as second grade teacher at Ethyle Kidwell school.

Her long-time principal and friend Miss Ethyle Kidwell, has this to say about Zada Jones: "Each individual makes a unique contribution in his or her own way. Zada Jones has made her contribution through her valued service to the school and community. Her unswerving loyalty and dependability, her sympathetic and compassionate attitude concerning the welfare of her pupils, and the firmness of feeling for her co-workers enhanced by her unselfishness and devotion to her work have endeared her to all of us."

Most of the time since coming to Iowa Park she has been superintendent of primary department in First Baptist Sunday school. She is a charter member of the Lions club and at present is vice-president. She is a member and former president of Organ club and Modern Music Study club.

Mrs. Jones is recuperating from surgery in Wichita General hospital, and said she might now be able to join the Garden club, which she has not been able to do, because it meets in daytime. Gardening is something which she has always found most appealing.

After all these years with little children, Zada thinks she might be interested in substitute teaching in the future.

Clean-up, Fix-up, Paint-up and . . . BURN - UP

In line with the proclamation by Major Erwin Soell that the week of March 9 through 14 be "Clean-up, Fix-up, Paint-up, and Cut-the-Weeds Week," city forces will co-operate with citizens to the extent of standing by with fire trucks and personnel and assisting in the burning of combustible material provided the city has on file applications, as below, at the time the burning is to be done. Those who want burning done should file one of these applications with the Police Department as soon as possible. The forms may be obtained from the burning crews also.

Burning will be done during daylight hours subject to these terms:

1. Burning to be done only when a dead calm or when wind is blowing in a direction which will carry burning embers away from structures.

3. No garbage will be burned.
4. I assume all responsibility and liability for all damages to all persons and property by reason of the fire and I will take all necessary precautions to insure that no damage will result from fire.
5. If a complaint is received, either by the Fire Department or by me the fire will be extinguished at once.
6. I will notify the Fire Department at time of burning by telephoning the Fire Department at 592-2181.

Census Date: April 1

Official census of Americans will be taken on April 1. Every American in every nook and cranny of the whole world will be included.

Persons who die and babies born on April 1 will be counted. Foreign nationals studying or working in the United States will be counted.

Americans temporarily abroad on vacations, business or whatever will be counted.

Counted will be inhabitants of Puerto Rico, Guam, the Virgin Islands of USA, American Samoa, Canal Zone, and other outlying areas of US sovereignty or jurisdiction.

Detailed arrangements are being made to enumerate people in institutions, jails, hospitals, colleges and places other than in homes, all in preparation for April 1, when the actual enumeration begins.

Beginning March 23, mail carriers will leave census questionnaires at each residential mailbox. Each family will be asked to fill out its questionnaire and hold it for the census taker.

Preliminary reports of the census can be expected in May, and the full report is to be given to the President by Dec. 1.

Resource persons were Stanley Williams, H. W. Filmore of Wichita Falls, Bill Steger, T. C. Berry, Hoyt Watson, Tommie Watkins, Faris Nowell.

Some of the interesting information gleaned in these discussions can be summarized in the following "Do You Know . . ." questions:

1. In case an area vocational school should become a reality, pupils from Electra, Valley View, Holliday, City View and Iowa Park would be eligible to enroll?
2. Next year \$6000 will be the minimum salary for our teachers with BA degrees; and \$6,600 for those with MA degrees?
3. Having your child present every day is an asset because state aid is paid on attendance records rather than enrollment records?
4. We have six buses in operation for transporting pupils, for which we receive \$13,450 expense money each year?
5. The average bus load is 72 passengers?
6. Eligible bus pupils must live at least two miles from the school they attend?
7. 435 students ride the buses daily?
8. The average route is 56 miles per day?
9. Our funds come from three sources: 31% from local district; 10% federal; and 59% state?
10. 34% of our school patrons with 703 students are federally connected?
11. As of now our assessed property value in this district is \$19,400,000?
12. Only 22% of income in our district is paid by industry?
13. The only alternative, if we continue to grow and need more facilities, is to adjust property values?
14. Judge Filmore told us that federal government, state government, and political sub-divisions of the state are now subject to the tort law?
15. 26,331 lunches were served in our cafeterias during February and that 1,115 of them were free lunches?
16. The aim of the cafeteria program is to break even . . . it is not a money making project?
17. Cafeteria supplies and groceries average \$8000 per month?
18. The cafeteria employee per-

sonnel numbers 24?
19. In order to have a Type A lunch, it must include 1/2 pint of whole milk, 2 oz. serving of protein food, 2 or more vegetables and/or fruit, bread and butter?

20. School lunches are priced 40c in elementary school, 45c in junior high and high school?
21. Iowa Park is one of the few schools in this area which do not supplement the athletic program with local tax money?

All this and much more you would have learned had you been present. If there were other questions in your mind, the persons were on hand with correct answers had you asked.

The project was indeed worth the time and effort expended on it, and Kidwell PTA is to be commended for sponsoring it.

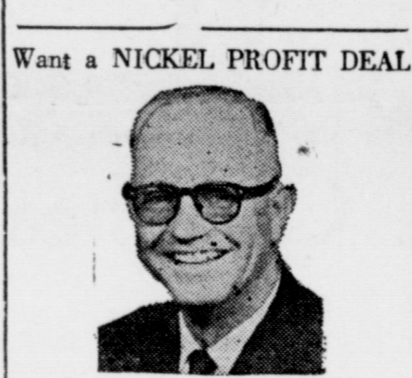

district committee in the near future for examination, after which a License to Preach will be issued.

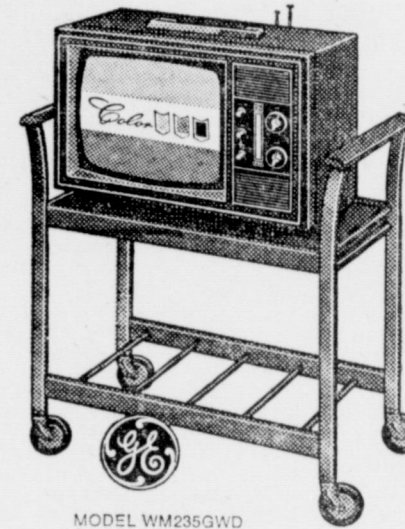

Larry is now a student in Candler School of Theology, Atlanta, Ga. He will complete his first year's work in May.

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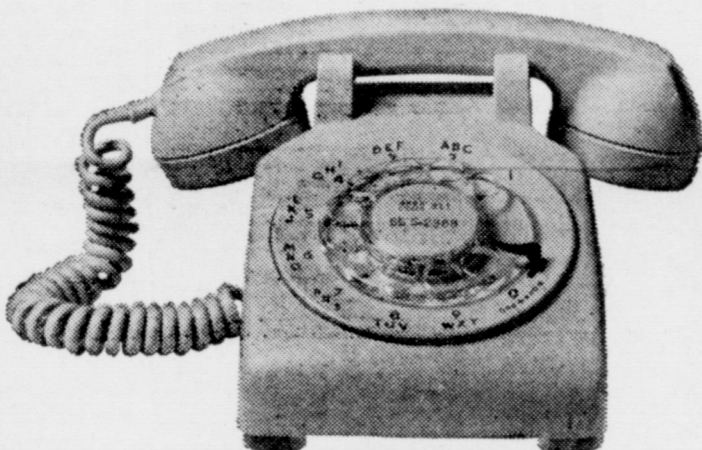
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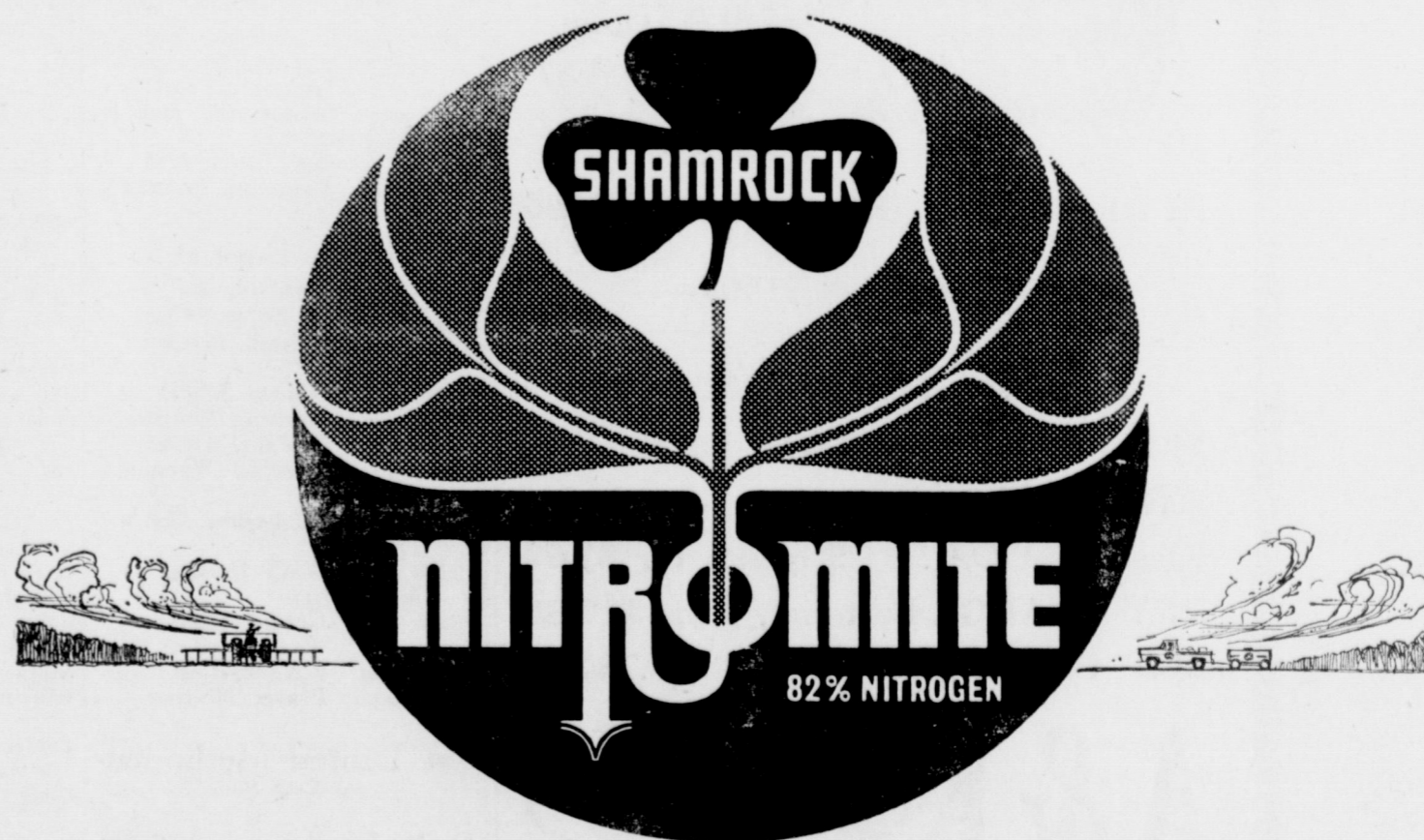
