Gardening, Canning, Collections, Close Family Ties Make a Full Life for Mr. and Mrs. Fletcher

There's nothing dull nor hum-drum about life for Mr. and Mrs. Leo H. Fletcher, who live on the Lone Star Gas Company pumping station property west of Iowa Park. The couple have so many and so varied interests that something new and old is happening in their daily living at all times.

To begin with, if a thing is unusual, it gets the immediate and undivided attention of Leo and Inez.

Let's begin with their garden. A visitor will be astonished to see turbin squash, dill, cucumbers, black-eyed peas, tomatoes, green beans, potatoes, strawberries and several varieties of hot and sweet peppers in a well-kept garden scattered in several places on the Lone Star pipeline station.

Of course there is a beautiful home occupied by Leo and Inez, and the garage has an apartment attached at the back.

The turbine squash mentioned is a vegetable unlike anything you have ever seen. It starts out looking like a pumpkin, and then on top looks as if a three-section squash has been inserted into the hollowed out pumpkin. The whole thing has a color scheme unlike anything else in the world. No two turbine squashes look alike. There are all possible yellows which are distinctly separate from all possible reds and oranges. These are mixed with various shades of green to make no definite pattern. They have to be seen to be appreciated, and most likely they won't be believed!

The potatoes are still another horticultural anomaly. Growing in the root section are potatoes, and on the vines are tomatoes. We didn't find out exactly how they are produced. Maybe the Fetchers can make you understand it.

There's a variety of bean raised by Leo and Inez which puts our regular green bean to shame. The beans get as long as 33 inches. As the gardener gathers them, he lays them across his arm. A dozen or so, cut into cooking lengths, make a mess for a family.

We went down cellar where Inez has stored hundreds of quarts and half gallons of vegetables and fruits. There we noticed a preponderance of cucumber pickles and quantities of green beans, fruits of all kinds.

Passing on to the various collections developed by Leo and Inez: In the home are many antiques, and even in the garage apartment there is a beautiful old dresser which has been in the family several generations. Leo has a barbed wire collection which beggars description. There must be 30 to 50 distinctly different varieties of the wire, and he has a catalog of the varieties which identify them and give their various patent dates.

Leo's coin collection is quite large, and we didn't get around to viewing it. Guess he realizes that we have sticky fingers. But he can be sure no money has yet stayed long with our family!

Leo also has a gun collection of which he is quite proud.

Fletcher pointed out with pride a huge buggy wheel which never has been used on a buggy. It has a wooden hub and is probably six feet in diameter.

Fletcher was born and reared at Vernon. He began work with Lone Star Gas in Mountain Park, Okla. His job was to walk the pipeline the 90 miles from that city to Wichita Falls. This was his weekly duty for the following seven years.

During the following 13 years Leo was a truck driver for Lone Star Gas at Petrolia. In 1952 he was transferred to Iowa Park and for the past 19 years he has been Pipeline Superintendent stationed here at the present location.

A map on the wall shows the pipelines in this district which have gas for use here. Fletcher and his crew are in charge of the line from Electra to Wichita; Iowa Park to Archer City; Iowa Park to Burkburnett; Burkburnett to Electra. Often they go farther to help in emergencies in the system.

The gas lines and pressure stations are all tied together. Fletcher says that sometimes the gas we use comes from Oklahoma supplies; in the summer the gas is sent here from Jack county.

In winter time our gas comes from New York. Who, don't get excited like we did. New York is the company name for a large cave near Henrietta where huge amounts of natural gas are stored.

Miss Inez Bates was born in Davidson, Okla. She and Leo H. Fletcher were married at Vernon in 1928. They have four children who live close enough they can bring their families quite often to help the parents eat the fine stock of home grown fruits and vegetables we have been reading about. In fact all of them will probably show in the next few weeks while their uncle Johnny Fletcher and family are visiting here from Huntington Park, Calif. He always brings empty cans and other necessities for a canning binge.

Leo and Inez plan to reside in Iowa Park when he retires after another two years on the job.

Consolidation will cut tax load in both areas

Savings brought about by consolidation will mean that Iowa Park and Valley View can operate their public schools this coming year without a tax increase! If the consolidation election fails to get approval, Valley View faces the possibility of not being able to fund its budget.

Iowa Park would have to raise its tax rate to offset a 10 to 12% increase in operating cost. According to school officials consolidation will be a benefit to both districts.

The tax structure of each School District is more than adequate to meet its own bonded indebtedness, causing no burden on the new consolidated district. The consolidation incentive aid based on an estimated figure furnished by the Texas Education Agency will amount to \$21,000 a year for a period of 10 years, amounting to a minimum of \$210,000. This money has to be used to retire bonded indebtedness or build needed buildings.

An Elementary School will be maintained in Valley View and approximately 60 High Schools students will be absorbed into the IPHS system without additional expense to this District.

It can be pointed out that additional savings will be forthcoming due to the fact that Iowa Park is currently educating students at an average cost of \$436 a year. On the other hand, the cost of educating a student in Valley View is \$1,200 a year.

Voting will be at Kidwell Elementary School and at Bradford Elementary School for those living in the Iowa Park School District. For those living in Valley View School District, voting will be in the Valley View School Library.

City Council

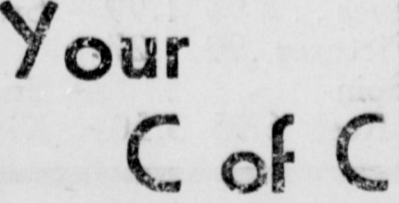

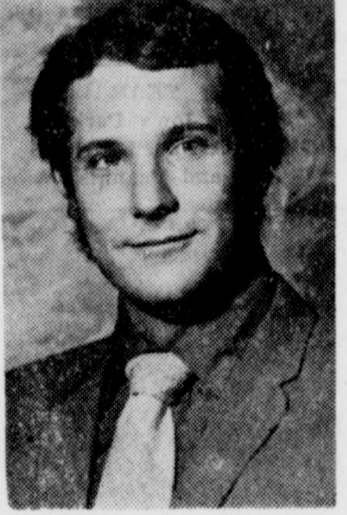
The Tidwells have two children: Cindy 10 and Todd 4.

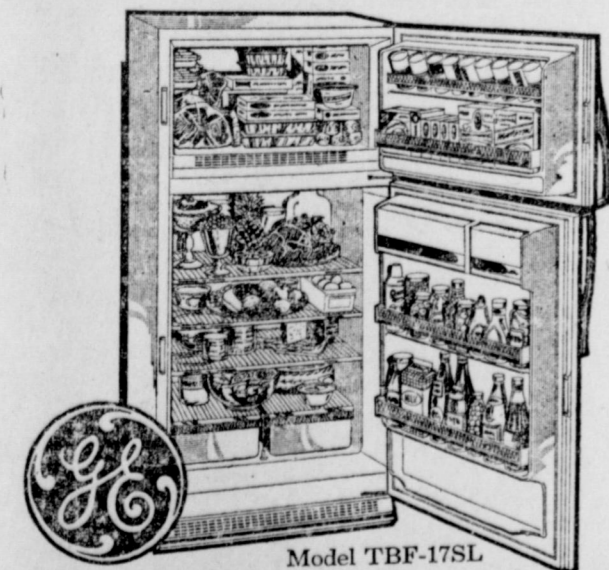
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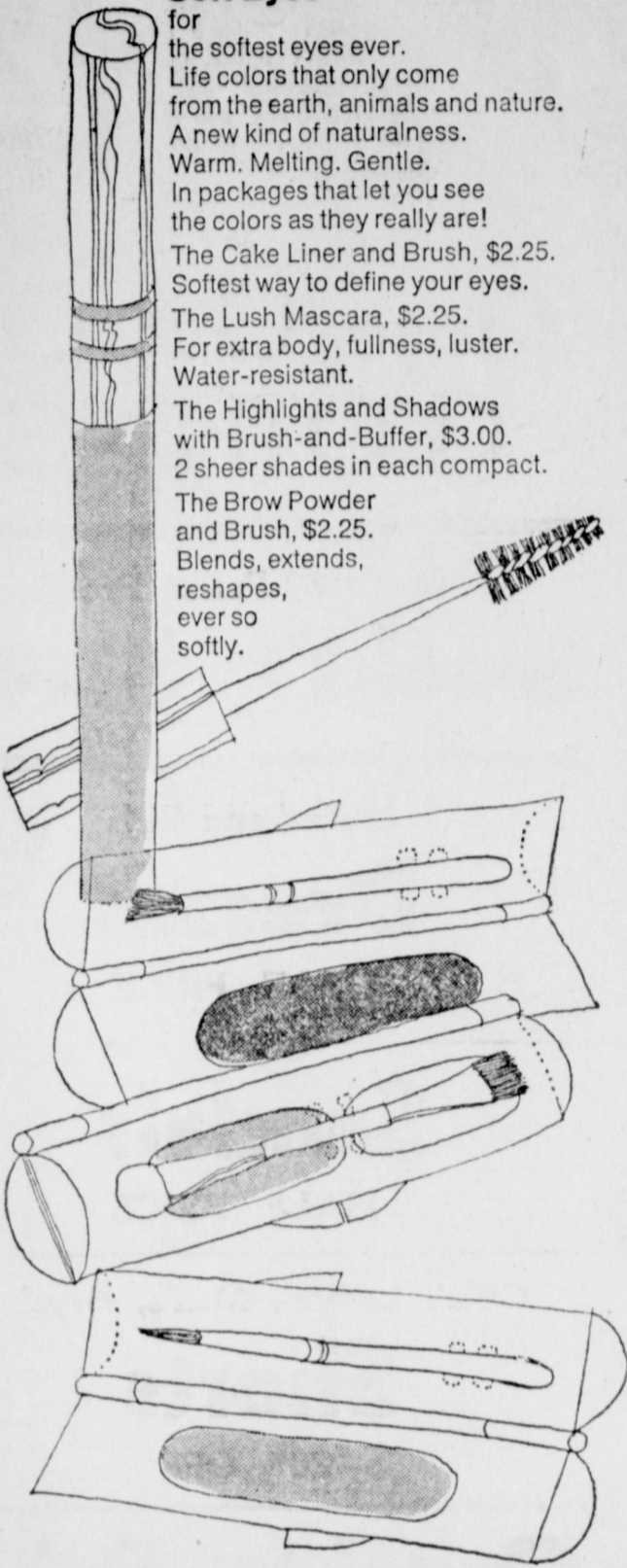

A native Iowa Parkan, Catherine Murphree Connick, has many interesting experiences to relate. She and her husband Louis Connick have just returned from six years spent in Asia, where he represented Asia Foundation, which is based in San Francisco.

Louis is Irish-American and enjoys visits to Ireland especially.

The Connicks really enjoyed a visit with a college friend of Catherine's mother — Madame Chiang Kai-shek in Formosa — who attended Georgia Wesleyan at the same time Mrs. Murphree did when they were young and unmarried.

In late March, Mr. and Mrs. Connick were decorated by King Vathana of Laos at the royal palace in Luang Prabang, when they were guests of honor at a dinner party. Louis received a medal of the "Order of the Million Elephants and White Parasol" for his contribution as a director in a non-profit foundation devoted to education, cultural and social progress in Asian countries. Catherine received a new "feminine merit medal." She authored a "Welcome to Laos — a Practical Guide" booklet which is shared with visitors, tourists and newcomers to Laos. She was president of the American Women's club in Laos.

Mrs. Connick is a daughter of Jno. C. Murphree of Wichita Falls and the late Mrs. Murphree. She was born in Iowa Park and started to school here with Miss Ethyle Kidwell as her first teacher. In second grade she claimed Sammy Jackson as her sweetheart and he gave her a little white mouse on her birthday. His parents were Mr. and Mrs. S. B. Jackson.

In 1939 the family moved to Dallas. There the children were graduated from Highland Park high and Southern Methodist university.

Following graduation, Catherine went to New York City and was with NBC radio, later NBC television. She met Louis in New York. Catherine also spent some time in Burbank Calif. as an employee in production work of NBC.

Connick is now assigned to San Francisco as director of Southeast Asia for the Foundation. After a month visit in Wichita Falls with her father and her sister Mrs. Evelyn Clark, Catherine will join her husband in San Francisco.
