## Death Takes W. F. George, Pioneer Farmer, Banker, Friend of Youth

W. F. George died Saturday afternoon at his home in Iowa Park. His funeral service was conducted at 10:00 a.m. Tuesday in the First United Methodist church by the Rev. Mr. Richard T. Perry. Assisting was the Rev. Mr. Wayne Dunson of Dallas, former minister in Iowa Park.

Burial was in Highland cemetery here under direction of Tanner Funeral Home. Pallbearers were Kelly and Mike Hardage of Wichita Falls, William and Robert Goodwin of Longview, Jeffrey Johnson of Rochester, Minn., Larry George of Atlanta, Ga., Craig Larimer Jr. of Colorado Springs, Colo.

Mr. George was born July 31, 1879, in Fayetteville, Tenn., and came to Texas in 1890, settling in the Weeth community seven miles north of Iowa Park.

He was married Jan 25, 1911, to Nellie Weeth, in Iowa Park. He was a farmer at that time. In

1923 the couple moved to town. Mr. George and the late John Hirschi organized the State National Bank. He has been chairman of the board of directors for many years. He has also had oil and real estate interests.

His interest in youth has led to many gifts to their education and physical development. Until this year the high school built in 1923 bore his name. Two Little League baseball fields here also are named for Mr. George.

For many years the volunteer fire department used a building of his as a recreation hall and sub-station.

Survivors include Mrs. George; a son W. A. of Iowa Park; four daughters: Mmes. Roland Knox and Pat Hardage of Wichita Falls, J. J. Goodwin of Longview and E. W. Johnson of Rochester, Minn.; a sister Mrs. M. G. Weeth of Panhandle; 15 grandchildren and 3 great-grandchildren.



## Mrs. Sumrall's 29 Years of Music Here Have Borne Rich Fruit

The musical program of First Baptist church here can hardly be mentioned without attention being given to Mrs. E. W. Sumrall, who has been pianist since 1943 and assistant pianist for 5 years before that, making 32 years continuously in that capacity—a record of loyal service worthy of special commendation.

During those years she has also maintained her private studio for teaching music. Many a youngster in this area has received his first training in notes and scales from her.

At present Mrs. Sumrall is also pianist for Beginners and Junior departments in the Sunday school and director of the Junior choir. Twice the choir has been entered in the District Music Festival, once receiving a rating of excellent, and the next, superior.

In previous years she directed the Teen Choir when a highlight of projects attempted was presentation of John W. Peterson's "Night of Miracles" at Christmas time. She also directed the Girls Sextet when they gave programs for two years at Sheppard AFB.

When she was active in the WMU as president three new circles were organized: one in the mission group which is now Faith Baptist, one in First Baptist, a night circle for working women; and a third at Rocky Point.

She served from 1945 to 1968 as mission chairman, when birthday cards were sent to foreign missionaries, at first to 1200 and later to 2000. The task became so expensive and time consuming that other projects were adopted to replace it. She also served as chairman of the Wichita-Archer Association.

In 1948-49, a drill corps was organized in high school. Some of the members wanted it to be a band as well as a marching group. Don Hatch was the director. He, with a few members in the corps, began meeting in the living room of the Sumrall home for band practice. In a year's time it became too large for its quarters, and permission was granted for the band to meet in the home economics cottage at high school. This became the first Iowa Park Hawk band.

Mr. and Mrs. Sumrall have two daughters: Eva Joy, who is Mrs. William M. Eklund of Austin, and Katy Merle, who is Mrs. Morris Vogel of Littleton, Colo. There are six grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

Eva Joy sings in the choir and does solo work in First Presbyterian church of Austin. Her husband is head of the appliance department in a furniture, appliance and music store in that city.

Katy Merle taught music in the Wichita Falls schools before her marriage. She now directs a youth choir of 40 voices in the Arapahoe Baptist church in Littleton and teaches flute, voice, organ and piano. Her husband is head of the Distributive Education department of the Littleton high school.

When the Sumralls gather as a family they are a happy group, the young sharing with the older in worthwhile experiences in living.

First Baptist church has hired Glenn Schell for choir director and youth counselor. He is working on his master's degree in music at Midwestern.

Schell is a native of Pennsylvania. He has a degree in physical education from Taylor university in Upland, Ind.

After service in the army in '62 he spent two years in Cameron college at Lawton and finished up at Southwestern in Weatherford, Okla.

Glenn and his wife Mary Helen moved here from Cyril, Okla., where he was music and youth director in First Baptist church for six years. The past five years he was also assistant coach for junior high and high school and choral director.

Glenn and Mary Helen met at Cameron and were married in 1965. She is a graduate of Cameron and has the BA degree from OCLA, Chickasha, Okla., in music for organ and piano. They both teach private lessons in piano and organ and voice.

**A. H. Smith Led Active Life**

Andrew Hubert Smith, long-time resident of Iowa Park, died June 4 in a Jacksboro hospital.

Funeral service was conducted last Sunday afternoon in Jacksboro United Methodist church with the Rev. Mr. Tom Price officiating. Burial was in the Truce cemetery.

A. H. was born Feb. 24, 1892, in Sulphur Springs and moved to Truce community in Jack county with his parents a year later.

He and Miss Mae Dove of Truce were married in 1915. In the early 20's they left the farm and Smith worked several years in refineries in Texas and Oklahoma.

He abandoned this work and became interested in real estate in California. He was quite successful on the West coast.

In 1924 the family came to Iowa Park where A. H. formed a partnership with D. O. Smith in real estate. They are not related.

In 1948 Mr. and Mrs. Smith and daughters moved to Glendale, Cal., where he continued in the real estate business. In 1952 they returned to Texas and set up a business in Dallas.

A. H. retired in 1967 following the death of his wife.

Smith led an interesting and fruitful life. As a school boy in Jack county he was a charter member of the Corn Club from which has developed the national 4-H club. In Iowa Park he was instrumental in development of Southgate gardens and worked to make this area a truck gardening spot. Poor quality of Lake Kemp water helped kill this fine project.

Smith was a member of Iowa Park Volunteer Firemen's department and was one of the first to draw the pension which goes with that service.

Surviving are six daughters: Mrs. Ardena Klenk of Glen Elyn, Ill.; Mrs. Virginia Wilford of Tazana, Calif.; Miss Eunice Smith of Glendale; Mrs. Nell Conner of Agoura, Calif.; Mrs. June Mueller of Temple City, Calif.; two sons: Edwin of Dallas and Harmon of Mineral Wells; and 12 grandchildren.

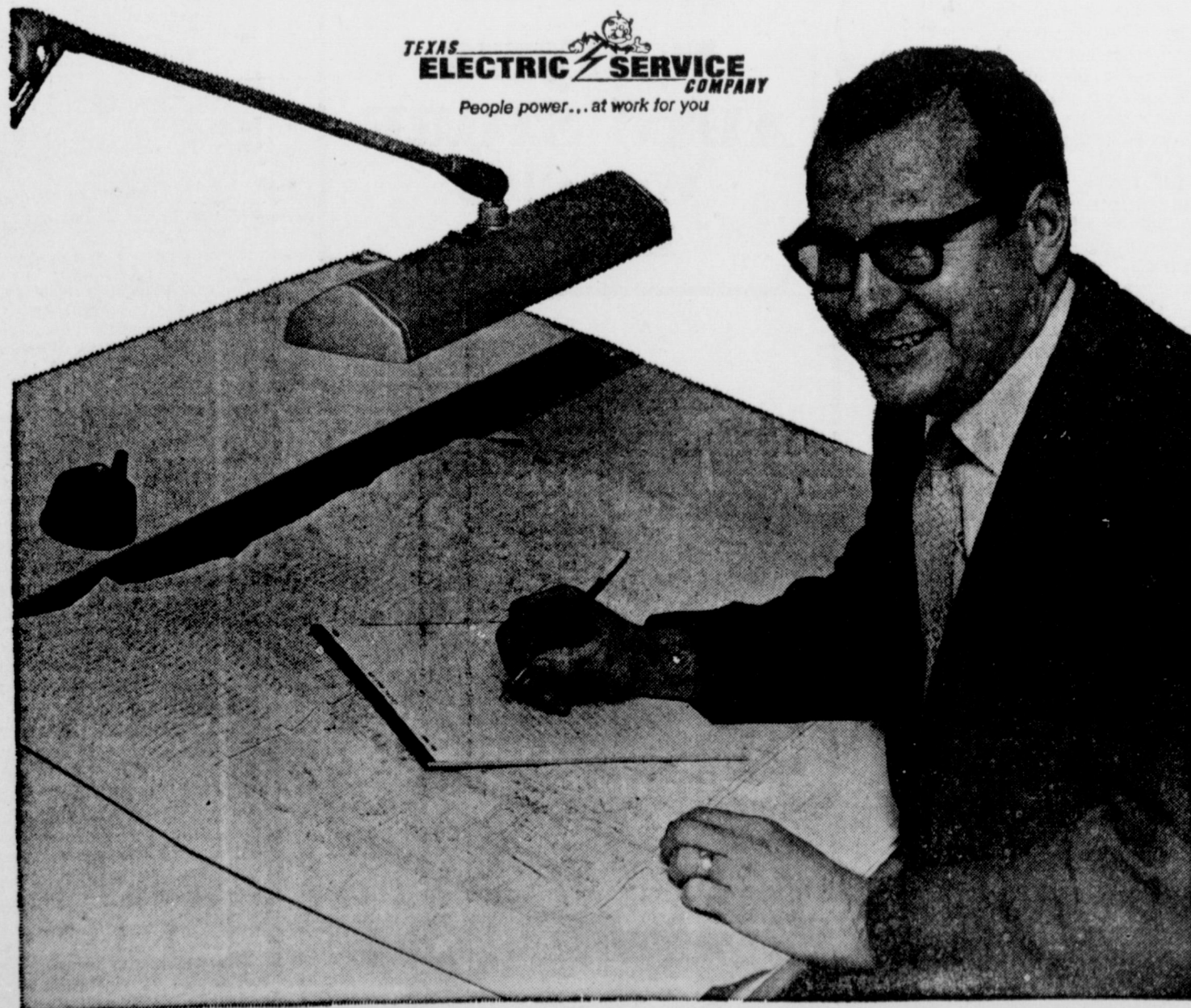
