the right connections are ready for service this year.

"Patsy Todd, your name is listed as Vice-president. You have been chosen to serve in this capacity because you always ring true when called upon in an emergency. It will be your duty to help plan the programs and activities for the coming year that will promote fellowship and growth in the Garden club.

"Carol Sinclair, I see in the phone book your new number is Recording Secretary. This honor has been given you by the Garden club members because they know you will record accurately and faithfully the progress of this club.

"Helena Black, your name is listed in the directory as Corresponding Secretary. Many times, your president Bernice will use her magic dial to ask you to write letters for the Garden club this year.

"Margaret Koonce, your club shows a special kind of trust in you by electing you to handle the club funds. The magic dial will ring your number when there is a need for money to be spent. Correct handling of club funds will be your responsibility this year as Treasurer of the Garden club.

"Sue Teel, I see your name in the book as Historian. Yours is a big responsibility for it will be your duty to keep an accurate history of all activities and record it in the Iowa Park Garden club Scrapbook.

Mrs. James Murfield reported on Spring Conference held April 24 in Wichita Falls with five voting delegates in attendance.

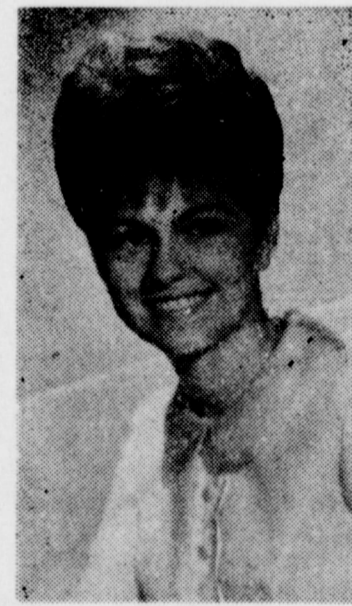
Revision of By-laws was approved. Mrs. Daniel York was presented the Texas Life Membership award.
