## James A. Sewell Family Distinguished

Often it is said that a mother's glory is in her children. That is the attitude of Mrs. James A. Sewell.

So, on this Mother's Day may we combine that observance with the one usually given Father's Day and in many areas of National Family Week, as we pay tribute to an Iowa Park family as typical of the finest in family living — the James A. Sewell family.

Eunice Davis, daughter of the late Rev. Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Davis, has lived in Iowa Park all but three months of her life. She and Sewell were married 44 years ago by Dr. P. S. Richardson, presiding elder of Wichita Falls District Methodist church.

James, a navy veteran of World War I, who attended University of Georgia following military service, came to Texas to visit his brother Curtis, had preceded him by a few and lived many years in Iowa Park. Since that time, Georgia has been to James only a place to visit.

Sewell has served on official board and committees and taught a boys class in Methodist church for years. He continues as a businessman of Wichita Falls through the years. He has been an active member of Rotarians during that time.

Eunice has maintained a piano studio at her home all these years. She was director and/or organist for the church during much of the time. Her piano students have always been enrolled as Harmonic Minors in the junior division of Federated club.

She has studied with artist teachers C. Barthold Maclin, Ernest Katz, Frank Renard; and has spent several seasons in choral workshop studies with Dr. John Findlay Williamson, founder of Westminster Choir college.

At present Mrs. Sewell functions of president of board of Iowa Park Library, Iowa Park Garden club; vice-president of Music Clubs of Wichita Falls; and is active in Federated club work from the local '23 Study club level

to district and state; and in the women's work in United Methodist church

For several years she was a member of Texas Safety association and has always been member of Music Teachers association.

Mr. and Mrs. Sewell have three sons and a daughter—all four of them graduates of W. F. George high school of Iowa Park and of North Texas State university at Denton. But that foundation has been only the stepping stone for each to greater achievements in the medical and educational worlds.

Dr. James Patrick Sewell is at present associate professor of political science at Yale university. He received the PhD from University of California at Berkeley, after which he and his family spent a year in Africa, where he toured as visiting teacher and lecturer connected with University College of Rhodesia at Nyasaland.

Pat also took a year's leave from Yale to study in Paris with UNESCO. His research papers have been published as a book titled "Peacekeeping," as a depth study on "Functionalism and World Politics."

Pat's wife Judy sponsors the organization "Round the World Wives" at Yale. There are three children: Bretton Christopher, born in Berkeley; Gunnar, born in Africa. Thea Genevieve, born in Paris.

Michael Walker Sewell studied at Texas university, received the master's degree from Stanford university at Palo Alto, Calif., was teacher of literature for two years at University of Minnesota. Now he is instructor and doing graduate study toward the PhD degree at University of Iowa in Iowa City. He had a double major at Stanford and did one year of medical study, as well as literature.

Dr. David Huff Sewell, an outstanding surgeon, is the Medical College of Virginia and has assisted Dr. Richard R. Lower in heart transplants. It was one of the first medical schools in the world to

do successful kidney transplants, now doing heart transplants. It was here that Dr. Christian Barnard of South Africa spent four months of study.

David received his MD degree from Tulane at New Orleans before going to Virginia. As of July 1 he again will be one of the team of surgeons working with Dr. Lower. David jr. was born in New Orleans.

Cynthia Caroline Sewell is the wife of David Lee Minter. He is a graduate of NTSU and has both a doctor of divinity and doctor of philosophy degree from Yale. He has taught in University of Hamburg, Germany, at Yale, and presently is professor of literature at Rice university, Houston.

Caroline taught in New Haven, Conn., high school. did graduate study in Hamburg and sang with the Bach Oratoria Society. They have a son Christopher Sewell Minter.

In today's world, with its confusion and frustration, it as refreshing and stimulating to think of this outstanding family. It serves as a sort of anchor, and an example of parenthood and family living on which we can pin our faith and hope for the future.
