## Miss Kate Haynes, 90, Beloved WF Teacher, Taken by Death

Funeral services for Miss Kate Haynes, 90, of Wichita Falls and formerly of Iowa Park, were held last Saturday morning in the First Presbyterian church of Wichita Falls, with Dr. Earl Crawford, pastor, in charge. Burial was in Riverside cemetery there.

"Miss Kate," as she was affectionately known to a large host of friends in this area, died in a Wichita Falls hospital Friday morning from injuries received in a fall from the back steps of her home on July 21.

Miss Haynes taught in the Wichita Falls schools 52 year, retiring in 1951 but remaining active in church work.

She was born Sept. 9, 1864, in Milan, Tenn., and came with her parents and family to Iowa Park in the early 1880's. They lived on West Lafayette street just west of Dan Sunday's house. Her sister Miss Emma Haynes was one of the early school teachers here.

Miss Kate taught at Ferris before she began her teaching career in Wichita Falls.

During her lifetime Miss Haynes received many honors. In 1952 she was granted an honorary doctor of humanities degree from Midwestern university for her service to Wichita Falls. "There is no way to measure the greatness of the work you have done," she was told.

In 1954 the Kate Haynes Memorial library was dedicated at the First Presbyterian church of Wichita Falls. For her wonderful ability to inspire children with awe and reverence to the ways of God, Dr. Crawford presented a bronze plaque honoring Kate and her two sisters Jodie and Emma for their long service to the Sunday School.

Alamo school in Wichita Falls erected a large granite fountain in 1923 commemorating her long and faithful service in the schools. It was thought she would retire, but it was nearly 20 years later that Miss Kate brought to a close her long and colorful career as a public school teacher.

Iowa Park friends join others in saying she was a wonderful teacher and friend. She will be missed at many meetings where pioneers of this area gather.

Latest methods of preparing foods for freezing will be presented in the Texas Electric Service company office Thursday and Friday, August 11-12, it was announced this week by Ted St. Clair, manager.

Miss Elizabeth Gunther, TESCO home service adviser, will conduct the demonstrations at 11:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. She will demonstrate the preparation of foods for freezing, the newest materials available for packaging, and the cooking of frozen foods.

Miss Gunther will display a food freezer with foods arranged according to four classification. A picnic shelf will include sandwiches, meats, salads and cup cakes.

The party shelf will include a salad, cake, fruit juice ice cubes, tarts and sherbets.

A meat shelf will include a variety of frozen meats, eggs, bread, baked-stuffed potatoes and donuts. The fourth section will be an array of commercially frozen foods available in food stores.

Miss Gunther will demonstrate the preparation of a vegetable for freezing and the proper packaging of fruits, vegetables and meats. As she packages and prepares one meat dish, she will take the frozen meat previously prepared for the freezer and cook it. Electric table appliances, including the deep fat fryer and the electric skillet will be used in the demonstration.

## Strict Tests Through Every Process Assure Safety of Salk Polio Vaccine

For the first time in history, a vaccine is protecting millions of human beings from paralytic polio. While the Salk vaccine will not work in every case, American children are being safeguarded against the dread disease, with no more risk than they would take in a vaccination against smallpox or a typhoid shot. The Salk vaccine must pass elaborate tests under the watchful eye of a government inspector at every stage of production. Then the final packaged vaccine is approved by the U.S. Public Health Service for distribution. Here are shown a few of the steps that assure American parents their children are being given a safe vaccine.



This technician is filtering dead cells and all other foreign matter from polio virus after it has grown on animal tissue in glass containers.



This expert is examining tissue after contact with vaccine, to determine absence of live virus.



Animal tissue in tubes is inoculated with vaccine and let stand. If any live virus remains, it will multiply here, hence can be detected.

Greeting:

If this citation is not served within ninety days after the date of issuance, it shall be returned unserved.

The Officer executing this process shall promptly execute the same according to law and make due return as the law directs.
