Dick Rancier, branch manager of Southwestern Drugs in Wichita Falls, spoke to the Evening Lions club Tuesday on "Drugs." Rancier was introduced by Fred Hays, local druggist. He began his talk with scientific drugs and what they can do for us today. He told of several instances where members of the family of former presidents of the United States have died because nothing was known then about anti-biotics. We have advanced 90 per cent in the past 20 years, and half the medicines today were unknown then. With better remedies and preventives, the death rate has been cut 92 per cent in common diseases. More children die today from accidents than from illness. "This is the Golden Age in medicine," said Rancier. "New drugs are being invented so rapidly, and there is so much competition, it keeps the doctors and druggists busy studying and reading about them." The speaker said that medicines cost less today than years ago. "After all, drugs are the best bargains you can buy today, because they mean good health." 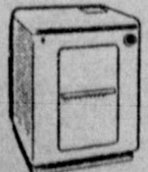

Elmo Traylor, Bud Mitchell and Al Reed returned last week after attending Grand Lodge of AF&AM of Texas in Waco.

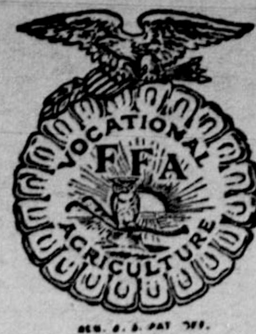
Elmo and Bud also attended a school of instruction of grand chapter RAM and grand council R&SM. Bud was appointed grand visitor of this district of the chapter and council.

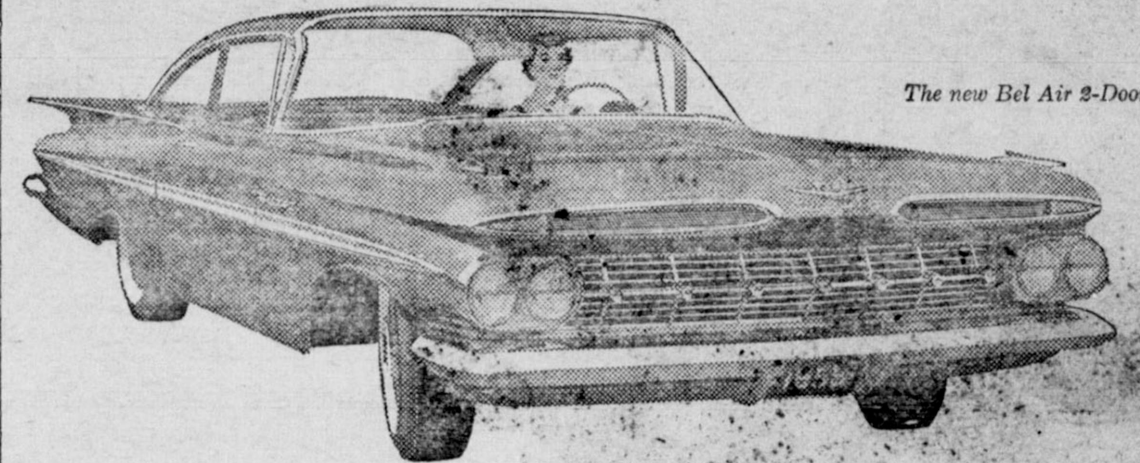

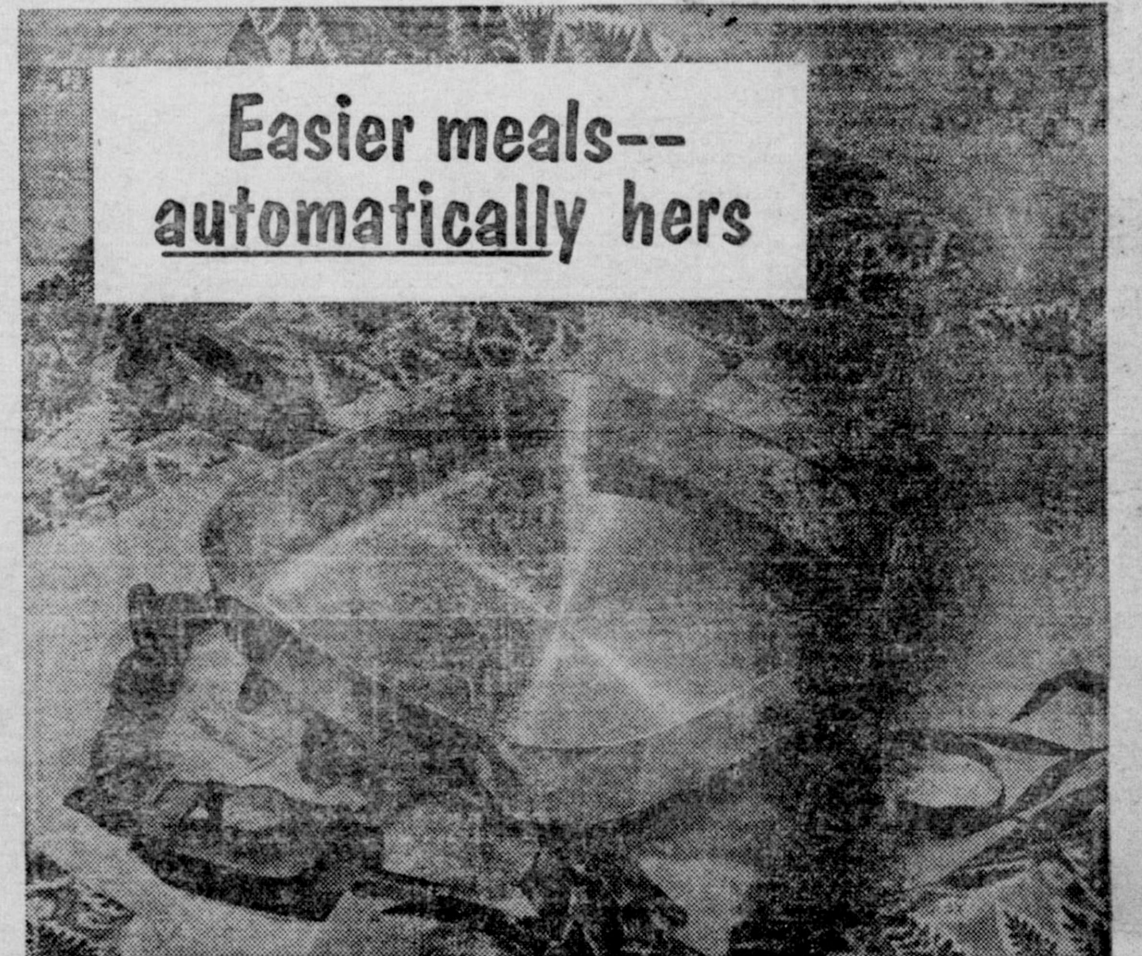

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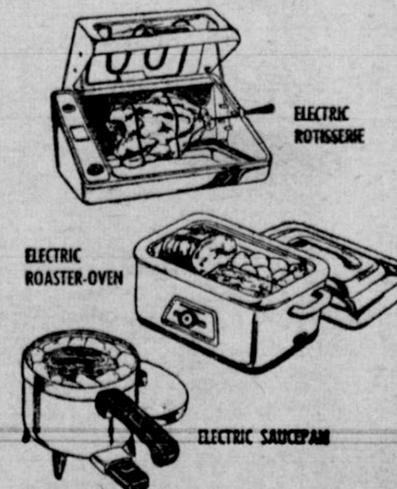
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Places - People - Things by Pap Simpson

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REASON AND REVELATION

by GLENN OWEN

"WHY OPPOSE CREEDS?"

When we speak of a creed we usually mean a set of rules, regulations and doctrines compiled by men to regulate the teaching and practice of some religious group. Let us consider some objections to creeds.

First. They are man-made! Doctrines that did not originate with God are certainly not acceptable to Him. If they originated with Him, then it would certainly be found in His word. The Holy Spirit was to guide the Apostles into ALL truth (John 16:13). What the Spirit taught, the Apostles spoke (1 Corinthians 2:7-13). Not only did they speak but they wrote what had been revealed by the Spirit (Ephesians 3:3-5; 1 Corinthians 14:37). Thus all of God's will is revealed in the Scriptures. Thus we are able to see that all of God's will is revealed in the Scriptures. The fact that men must turn to some creed to find authority for many of the religious practices of the day serves to illustrate that they are of human origin. "Howbeit in vain do they worship me, teaching for doctrine the commandments of men" (Mark 7:7).

Second. Creeds suggest the insufficiency of God's word. It is inconsistent to affirm that the scriptures are a complete guide in religion, then devise some creed in addition to the word as a rule of faith and practice. "All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness: that the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly furnished unto all good works" (2 Timothy 3:16,17).

Third. Creeds should be opposed because they contain MORE than the word of God (Revelation 22:18).

Fourth. Creeds should be opposed because they contain LESS than the word of God (Revelation 22:19).

The first creed of this kind was formulated and decreed by the First Council of Nicea, A.D. 325. For almost three hundred years the scriptures revealed all things that pertain "unto life and godliness." Is the word of God now so insufficient that we need something more? We invite you to attend the church of Jesus Christ and worship according to the word of God and not by some man-made creed.

Mrs. Kate Emanuel fell while shopping in Wichita Falls, Wednesday and fractured an arm. She was admitted to Wichita General.

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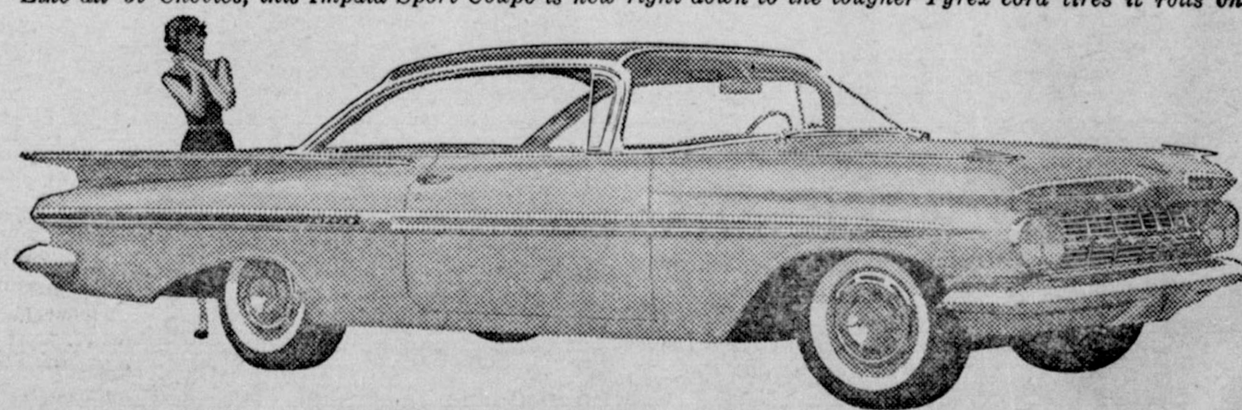
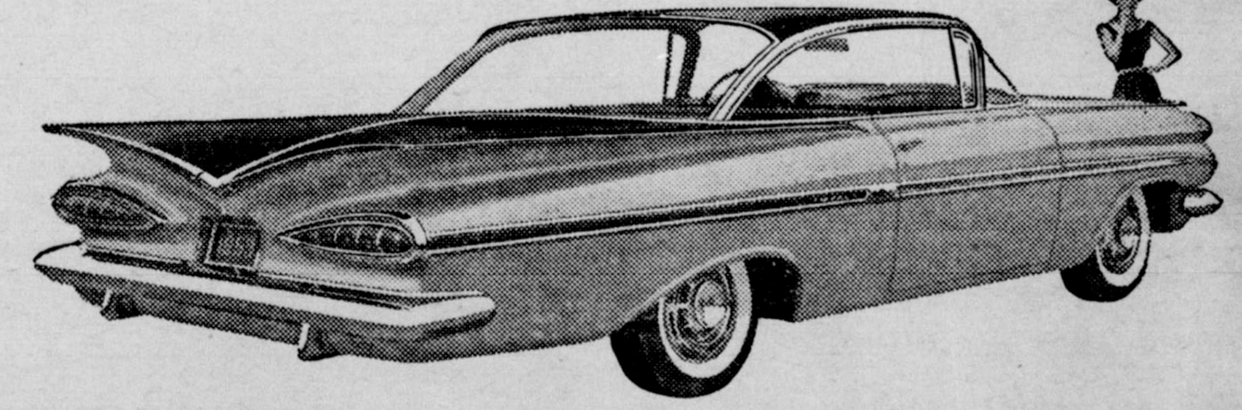
