Will R. Dunn, Pioneer Parkan, Dies at Age 76; Is Buried Here

Funeral rites were held here in the Baptist church Monday morning, July 18, for Will R. Dunn, 76, of Perryton, a pioneer of Iowa Park. Rev. H. M. Riek, pastor of the host church, officiated. Burial was in Highland cemetery under direction of Tanner Funeral Home of Iowa Park.

Palbearers were M. B. Cain, R. R. Brubaker, Joe Bell, Ernest Birk, Locke Lowrance, L. A. Teal and Jim White.

Mr. Dunn died in a Perryton hospital Saturday morning after undergoing surgery Thursday, July 14. His body was brought from Perryton by Tanner's.

Mr. Dunn was born Aug. 5, 1878 in Grapevine, the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. J. N. Dunn. When he was 19 years old, October, 1897 he came with his parents, sister and brothers to Iowa Park. They settled on a farm south of town known as the Blagg Place.

Later the family moved to town and established residence in the house on East Bank street now owned by Mrs. P. G. Kildow.

While in Iowa Park, Mr. Dunn farmed and did garage work. Some 20 years ago he moved to Perryton, where he was a farmer.

A few years ago he returned in a 1909 Buick car for Pioneer Day at the silver anniversary of the Texas-Oklahoma Fair and was met by photographers, for he and his car created color and excitement that the antique machine could be driven from Perryton.

Mr. Dunn spent several months last winter visiting relatives here and in Wichita Falls.

He is survived by one sister Mrs. Aaron Brubaker, a brother George of Wichita Falls; nieces: Mrs. Ray Miller of Wichita Falls, Mrs. Martin Smith of Knox City, Mrs. Mode Mathis of Houston, Mrs. Johny Barnes of California; and nephews: Clyde Dunn of Electra, Norris Dunn of Prairie Grove, Ark., Edwin and Harold Dunn of Wichita Falls, Harvey Dunn of Fort Worth; and Gibbons Brubaker of Iowa Park.

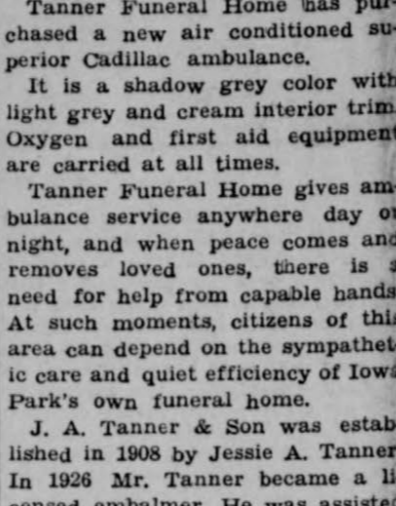

All Adults Requested To Take Part in Free Chest X-Ray Survey

X-ray technicians of the Texas department of public health will be in Iowa Park on Tuesday, Aug. 2, beginning at 12 noon till 5:30 p.m. and Wednesday, Aug. 3 beginning at 8:30 a.m. till 1:00 p.m. for the annual chest x-ray survey.

The mobile unit will be set up in the Texas Electric Service company office.

Officials of the Wichita County Tuberculosis association emphasize that certain groups should have x-rays without fail. These include teachers, mothers and fathers, and all adults who will be in contact with babies, all food handlers and persons who sit with babies and children.

Every adult should be x-rayed each year to find tuberculosis in its earliest stages for early recovery to prevent the spread of the disease.

All persons 15 years of age and older are invited to use the services of the mobile x-ray unit. They will be notified of results within four to five weeks. All reports are kept confidential.

Iowa Park chapter of Epsilon Sigma Alpha will supervise the survey this year. Mrs. Rollin Roberts is local chairman assisted by Mrs. Ray Watson and Mrs. Alan W. Berry.

Transportation will be provided by calling 2431. In the past many have failed to take advantage of this service. The committee asks that folk in the area not hesitate to call for free transportation.

Park Nearly Ready For Equipment; Board To Be Named Soon

Mayor R. E. Van Horn reports the Lake Park project has progressed satisfactorily the past few weeks but work has been held up due to rains.

The creek which drains through the park and also takes seepage from the lake, had to be re-routed. The park area, after much work of heavy equipment, became dry and dusty; but thanks again to the rains, it has enough moisture for work to be resumed.

The north-south entrance to the park has been laid out and will be opened from North Park street and from Texas street.

North Park had to be surveyed and mesquite trees removed. Now the drainage problem must be solved and entrance to the street constructed. This entrance will have a 20 foot center park and in the future will be lighted with mercury vapor bulbs.

Mayor Van Horn says a planning board is to be formed at a later date. This board will help plan for a baseball field, a swimming pool and other recreation facilities.

The mayor says, "From personal observation, in working and being familiar with the recreation problems of our city and other towns in this area, it is my personal opinion this park project will provide nicely for our people. It will be and should be one of the most improved projects for the city of Iowa Park and our community."

Retailers Affected by Many New State Laws

A review of bills passed at the recent session of the state legislature shows that many measures affecting retailers have been signed into law.

A breakdown by subjects of the laws passed follows:
Unfair Sales—Effective Sept. 6 a new law prohibits grocers from limiting purchases on merchandise offered for sale below cost.

Collections—The Small Claims Courts Act has been amended to provide for a fee of \$10 to the citation serving officers and authorizes the usual court fees for levying executions to enforce judgments.

Holidays—November 11 has been designated Veterans Day. Bank and Trust companies are given permission to close on Saturdays.

State taxes—A one-cent a gallon additional tax on gasoline. A one-cent package additional tax on cigars. A \$2.30 per barrel increase in tax on beer. A 25c additional levy per \$1,000 on corporation capitalization.

Assignment of wages—Employers are exempt from legal action in cases where an employee's wages are pledged to a creditor, if the employer can prove that he was not notified in writing of such an assignment and did not assent to such an assignment in writing.

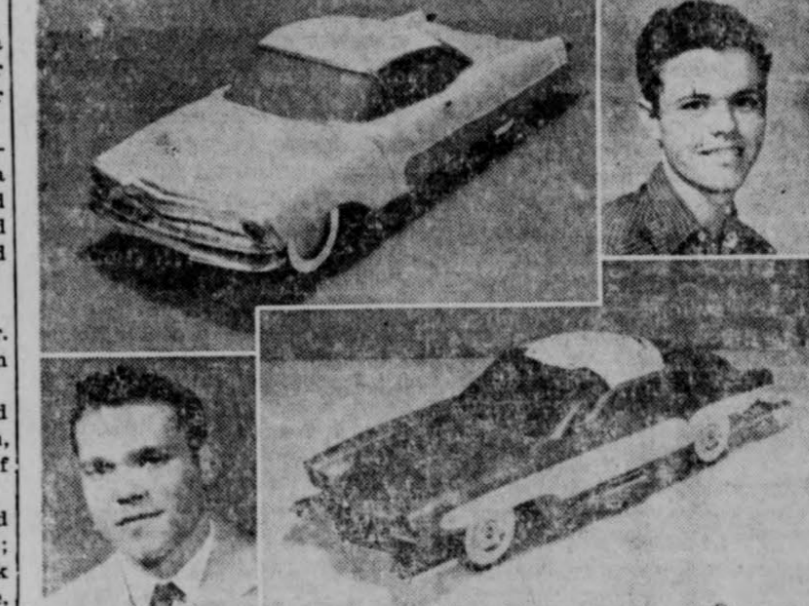

Photographic Record Of Man's History to Be State Fair Exhibit

The Family of Man, a gigantic assemblage of photographs from all over the world—depicting the entire sweep of man's whole existence—will be shown at the State Fair of Texas, Oct. 7-23.

The collection has been described as the greatest photographic exhibition of all time. It will occupy virtually all of the gallery space in the museum of fine arts on the Dallas fairgrounds. Admittance to the show will be free.

The Family of Man was created by Edward Steichen, dean of American photographers, for the Museum of Modern Art in New York, where it has been seen by more than 300,000 people.

Steichen and his assistant Wayne Miller spent 2½ years assembling the material. They examined 4 million pictures taken in all corners of the world by photographers of every nationality. It took five months to go through the Life magazine collection alone. Finally they selected the 50 pictures which make up the exhibit—representing 273 photographers, amateurs and professionals, famous and unknown in 68 countries.

The Family of Man is tremendous in scope as well as size, and is said to have a powerful emotional impact on its viewers. Its message is the universality of human life everywhere—the basic oneness of the human race in spite of wars, language barriers, differences of religions, culture and race.

Carl Sandburg has written the introduction to the exhibition, concluding with: "There is only one man in the world and his name is All Men. There is only one woman in the world and her name is All Women. There is only one child in the world and the child's name is All Children."

Use of Silage Urged By A & M Expert

Next to pasture, silage is the cheapest source of succulent feed for livestock, says C. H. Bates, extension farm management specialist of Texas A & M.

And it's filling the bill for many producers. "No other method of storing forage is as economical as the unlined trench type silo," says Bates. Recent studies indicate that such a silo of 200-ton capacity can be constructed and maintained for 93¢ for each ton of material stored.

Silage provides an excellent supply of vitamins and minerals essential to maintenance and growth of livestock. Chances of loss from rodents, fire or weather are negligible.

It may be put up in seasons not suited to hay production. And it can be self-fed, eliminating practically all labor costs in feeding.

Specialized equipment is required for an efficient harvest and silo-filling operation. Field cutters for chopping the material from row or broadcast stands usually are available on a custom job basis at costs of about \$1 an acre.

A sizable labor crew is needed for harvest of silage, but many work out this problem with a labor and equipment exchange agreement with neighbors.

Joint 4-H Club Camp Set for August 4

Wichita County Joint 4-H Camp has been set for August 4. The 4-H Barn in Wichita Falls will be the scene of this event.

Details are to be worked out by the county council executive board, junior leaders, and the district camp delegates under guidance of county and home agents.

Plans are to have Mr. Wilson of West Texas Utilities, Abilene, here to end the one day camp with square dancing. Mr. Wilson was at Buffalo Gap with the district camp and can teach anyone to square dance.

A large group is expected to attend this joint camp so they can go back to their 4-H clubs this coming year as better members.

August 9 has been set for the Wichita County 4-H Dress Revue. Special workshops were set up by Nellie S. Cobb, assistant HDA to help 4-H girls learn to sew and solve their sewing problems, so they can plan and make garments to model in the Dress Revue.

Girls under 14 will model in the junior division and girls over 14 will model in the senior division. From these participants in the district dress revue will be chosen. Wichita Falls has been chosen as the place for District III Dress Revue to be held Aug. 24 and 25.

Mrs. O. E. Lochridge and Mrs. R. R. Brubaker were appointed to serve as the telephone committee.

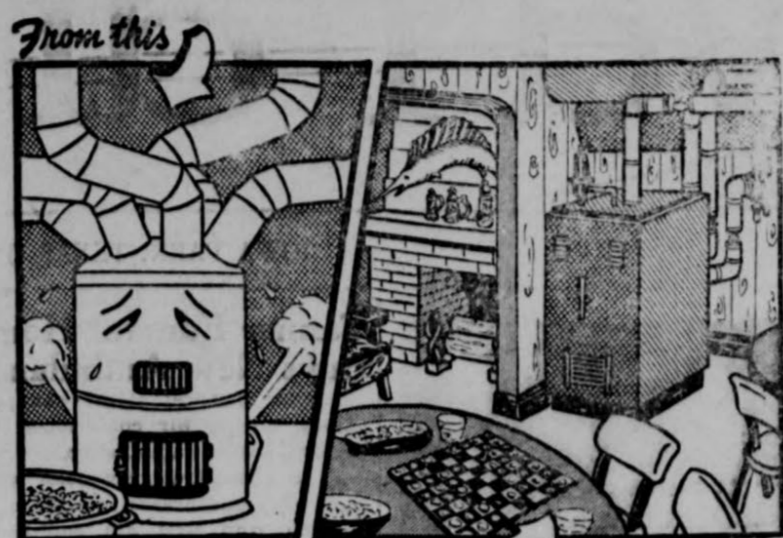
A social hour was enjoyed by Mrs. T. R. Horine, secretary of the local PTA, and those previously mentioned.

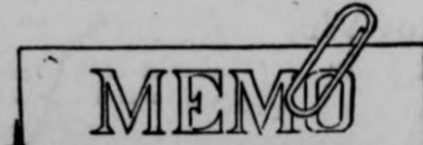

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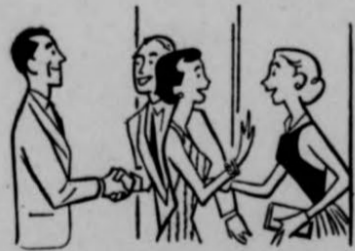

Combine cocoa and sugar. Beat egg whites with salt until foamy throughout. Add cocoa-sugar mixture, 2 tablespoons at a time, beating after each addition until sugar is blended. Then continue beating until meringue will stand in stiff peaks. Add vinegar and vanilla and beat well. (Entire beating process takes about 10 minutes.)
Using a spoon or pastry tube, shape meringue in rounds on unglazed paper on baking sheet, making each about 3 inches in diameter and 1 1/4 inches high. With a spoon, make a depression in center of each. Bake in slow oven (300°F.) 30 to 35 minutes. Cool and remove from paper. Makes 6 to 8 meringue shells.
