Photographic Record Of Man's History to Be State Fair Exhibit

The Family of Man, a gigantic all over the world-depicting the entire sweep of man's whole existence-will be shown at the State Fair of Texas, Oct. 7-23.

The collection has been described as the greatest photographic exhibition of all time. It will occupy virtually all of the gallery space in the museum of fine arts on the Dallas fairgrounds. Admittance to the show will be free.

The Family of Man was created by Edward Steichen, dean of American photographers, for the Mu seum of Modern Art in New York, where it has been seen by more than 300,000 people.

Steichen and his assistant Wayne Miller spent 21/2 years assembling the material. They examined million pictures taken in all corners of the world by photographers of every nationality. It took five months to go through the Life magazine collection alone. Finally they selected the 50 pictures which make up the exhibit-representing 273 photographers, amateurs and professionals, famous and unknown

in 68 countries. The Family of Man is tremendous in scope as well as size, and is said to have a powerful emomessage is the universality of human life everywhere - the basic oneness of the human race in spite of wars, language barriers, differences of religions, culture and race. Carl Sandburg has written the introduction to the exhibition, concluding with: "There is only one man in the world and his name is All Men. There is only one woman in the world and her name is All Women. There is only one child in the world and the child's name is

All Children."



The distressing thing is that so large a part of accidents which happen daily could be avoided by caution and commonsense safeguards.

Hazards to life and limb in home and farm buildings are many and obvious. A systematic check will reveal them, and knowledge of them is an urge to remove them. Falls cause more injuries in the home than any other type of accident. Looking before stepping can reduce such accidents.

It is time farmers and their families and neighbors pooled their efforts toward making their industry as safe as any other. As 1104 Sixth St. Wichita Falls, Tex. stated in the theme for Safety Week: "Your safety is in your hands."







Then continue beating until meringue will stand in stiff peaks. Add vinegar and vanilla and beat well. (Entire beating process takes about 10 minutes.)

Using a spoon or pastry tube, shape meringue in rounds on unglazed paper on baking sheet, making each about 3 inches in diameter and 1½ inches high. With a spoon, make a depression in center of each. Bake in slow oven (300°F.) 30 to 35 minutes. Cool and remove from paper. Makes 6 to 8 meringue shells.


