Remember this old phrase made famous by the Navy? It was used to gain attention of crew members in all parts of the ship when new orders or communications were communicated. When answers were required, all the crew members had to do was "speak up."
Now the folks in Iowa Park may have a similar communications system for the home. It's called the home interphone and offers many advantages to save time and needless steps. For instance you can talk from room to room, call people to the phone, even answer the door without leaving the room you're in.

Near each phone in the home is a small speaker which broadcasts the caller's voice. The person called can answer through a small microphone located in the base of the phone. If you'd like more information about the home interphone, just call the telephone business office—or ask any telephone service man.

KEEP AN OPEN LINE
Once in a while a child or a household pet will cause the receiver to be off the hook. When this happens the phone is automatically closed to all incoming calls. To make sure there are no lost calls to your home, it's a good idea to occasionally check the phones in rooms where the children play. Call by number. 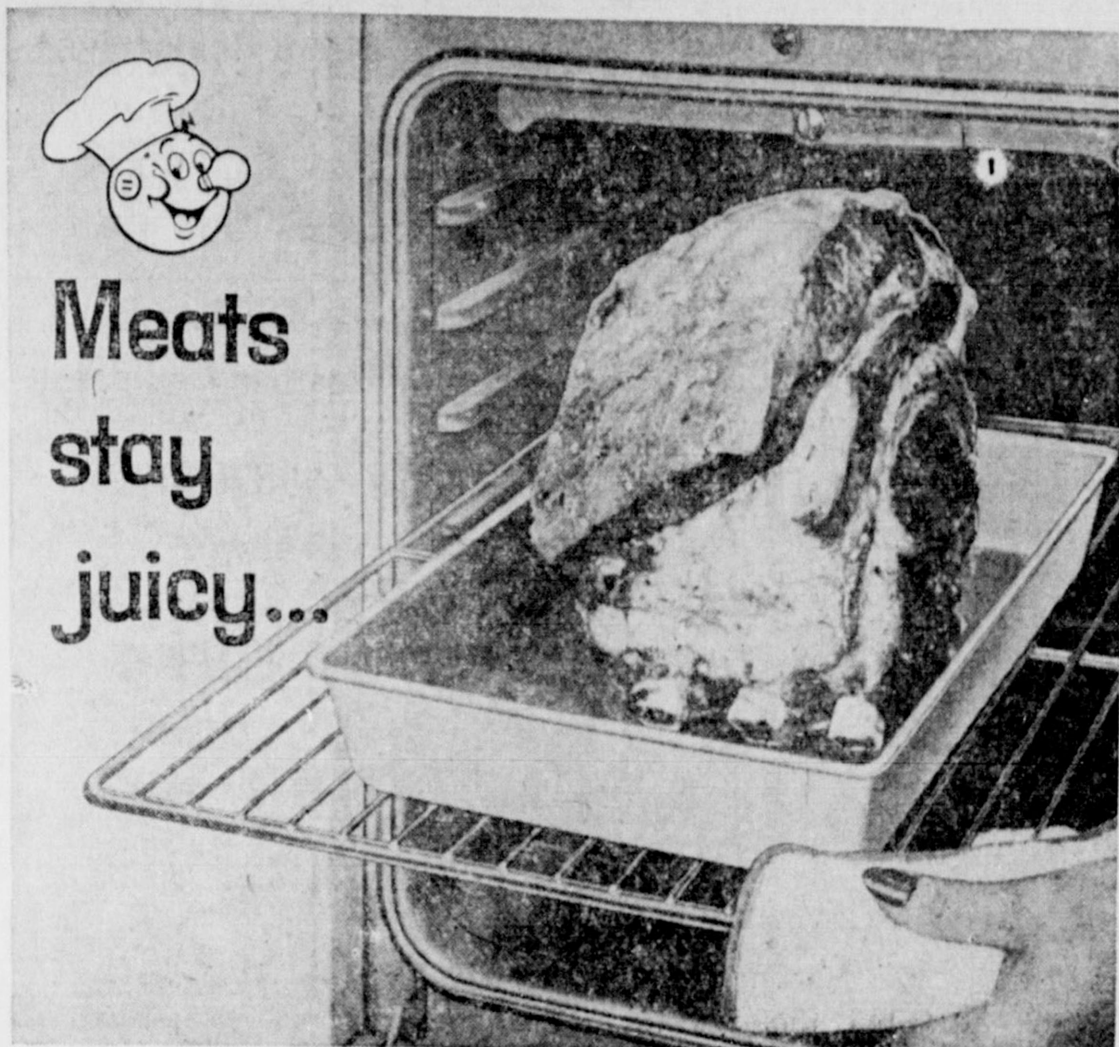

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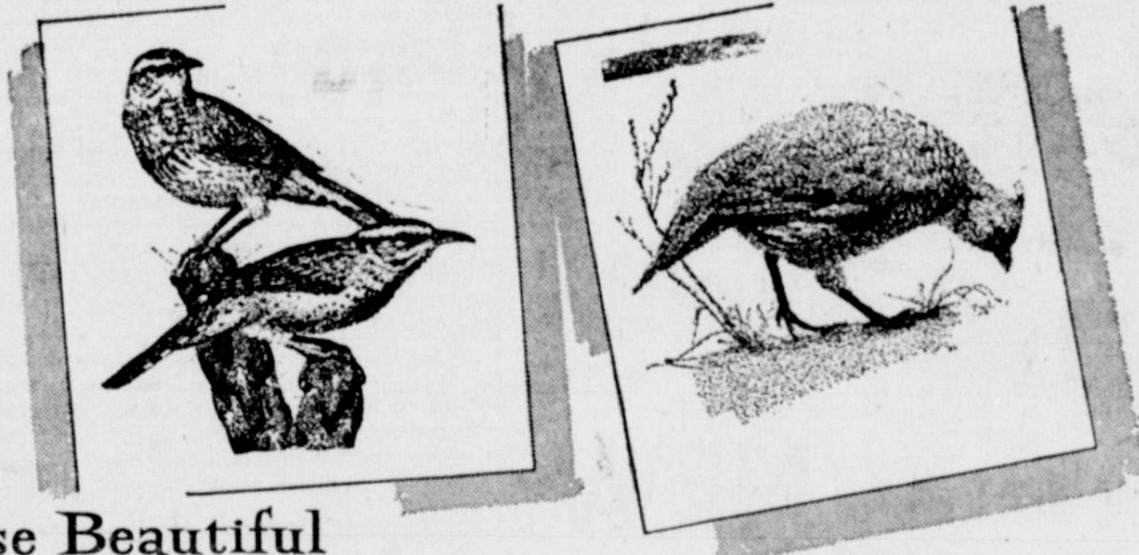
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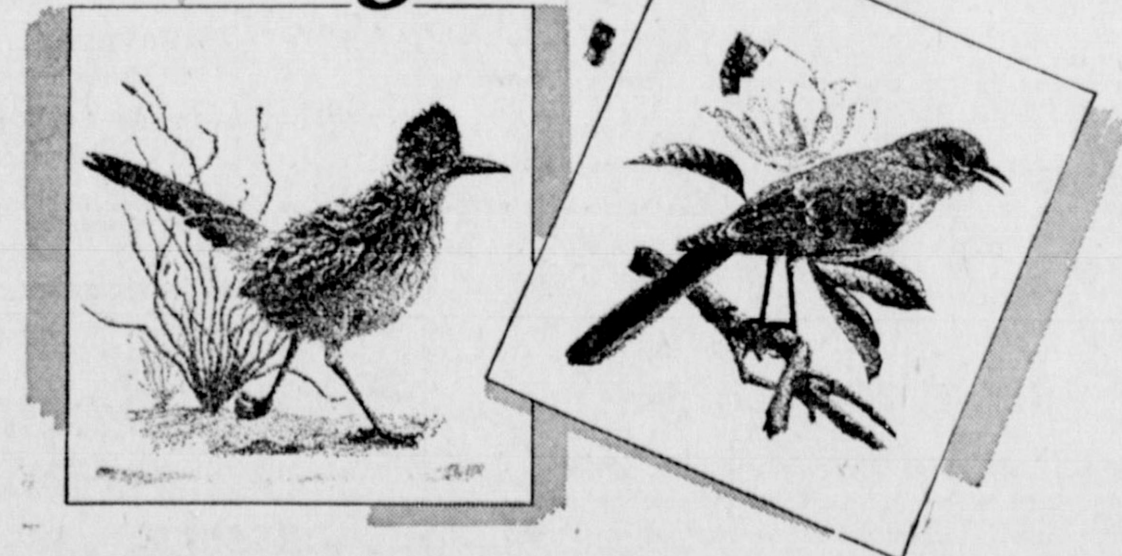

Pat Pruett recently attended the Poultry Fact Finding Convention held in Kansas City, Mo. The trip was a reward for winning state in a 4-H poultry marking contest.

Pat reports that while he was in Kansas City he was taken on special tours to see new equipment and waterers, and machines for cleaning eggs automatically.

There were special speakers for the convention who discussed improvements in poultry raising and others who discussed educational requirements for a person entering this work.

Other points of interest which Pat visited were Truman Library, Liberty Museum, the Missouri river where Lewis and Clark crossed, and radio and television station KRLLD in Dallas.

Study Club

Mrs. Jack Farley of Wichita Falls, president of the Audubon Society, was speaker for a meeting of the Iowa Park Garden club Friday morning, Feb. 10, in the fellowship hall of the Methodist church. Topic was "Our Feathered Friends."

Mrs. W. G. Steele, program chairman, presented Mrs. John C. Murphy, president of Wichita Falls Woman's Forum, who introduced the speaker.

Currently serving as fifth vice-president of Woman's Forum, Mrs. Farley is past president of Wichita Falls Garden club and is a national flower show judge. She is an artist, sculptor and authority on flower arranging, horticulture and landscaping.

Mrs. Farley gave interesting information about the migratory birds and those which stay in this area. She is one of the 6,000,000 bird watchers in the U.S.; there are 650 species of birds in the U.S. and 150 species in Texas and Oklahoma.

There are five highways that birds travel, and our area is on the central highway.

Among migratory birds described by Mrs. Farley were the warbler, swallow, humming-bird, golden plover, song sparrow, oriole. The humming-bird will cross the Gulf of Mexico in one hour; and some of Mexico in one hour; and some migratory birds travel 8,000 miles to complete their flight. Birds that stay in this area living completely within a 10-mile radius are bob white, quail, woodpecker, carolina wren and titmouse.

The group listened to recorded bird songs. Mrs. Farley said birds sing to proclaim territory or for a mating invitation, or because they are bubbling over with joy. In closing she gave the Audubon philosophy and encouraged her listeners to attract birds, reminding them that if we had enough birds it wouldn't be necessary to spray for insects.

Mrs. O. N. Newman conducted a brief business session and introduced Mrs. R. H. King and Mrs. Kenneth Sullivan as guests.
