Bank Credit Cards Help Sales for Small Businesses

The Herald has picked up some interesting information about the use of Bank Credit Cards which might be of critical use to our local merchants. Read it carefully and see how it might affect your retail sales:

"Retail merchants in Fort Worth were interviewed recently on the subject of bank credit cards, and John A. Savage, a contracting officer in the Procurement Division at Carswell Air Force Base in Ft. Worth, has written about the results of this survey for the July "Banking."

"Questionnaires were distributed to and interviews conducted with a representative cross-section of merchants who had been using bank credit card systems for at least six months. The purpose of the survey was to determine what effect the bank credit cards had upon the business of the retailer.

"The study included analyzing merchants by type of commodity handled and this was found to be a factor as well as the dollar volume of the stores' business.

"There were favorable comments from the merchants indicating in some instances that the credit card paid for itself and that it helped public relations.

"Firms doing a sales volume of over \$250,000 per year were found to benefit the least but were using the cards as a customer courtesy. Firms of this type had a regular clientele and were carrying higher priced lines in their particular field.

"Mr. Savage stated that the new and smaller stores with sales of \$50,000 to \$150,000 and where they were unable to carry their own credit did a large percentage of their business on credit cards.

"Firms tending to benefit greatly were those handling low to medium dollar value items appealing to the mass consumer market. New shopping areas or a recently opened shopping center showed more credit card sales than the older well established areas.

"The overall impression was that banks are a primary influence on the economic life of the community and that BANK CREDIT CARDS are an asset to both the consumer and the retailer.

"Especially is this so for the new retail firm."

Fair to Feature Food and Fibers

Agriculture building at State Fair of Texas in Dallas has been redecorated, remodeled and refurbished. And it has a new name—Texas Food and Fiber Pavilion.

Work will be completed in time for opening of the 1970 fair Oct. 10.

The pavilion will house the totally new Texas Food and Fiber show, which is being presented by Texas Department of Agriculture to emphasize the marketing aspect of Texas agricultural products.

About 30 exhibits will be featured, including citrus, poultry and peanut exhibitors. The auditorium will be the site of daily fashion shows and cooking demonstrations.

Miss Wool and Mohair and other beauty queens plus college models will show Texas fiber creations. New recipes with rice, seafood demonstrations, and a Lamb-arama food show are some of the many presentations to be spotlighted.

After Senator Jack Hightower or Vernon had given his blessing to the brand new Hawk Stadium, Tommy Watkins ran his charges onto the new bermudagrass field in pursuit of their 17th straight victory.

They proceeded post haste to do just that, with the Graham Steers unable to score while the Mean Green was piling 26 points on the scoreboard.

Jeff McDonald returned the opening kickoff into Graham territory to start the Hawks on their victory trail. Steve Webb and McDonald pushed the ball downfield and Jeff scored the first touchdown in the new playing ground. Steve Catlin kicked his first PAT.

Iowa Park's rock ribbed defense held and Graham was forced to punt. The Hawks cranked up another drive and in 14 plays had 73 yards punched out for TD No. 2. Webb put it on the record with a six-yard run on fourth down and four to go. Catlin's kick was wide and the Iowa Park lead was 13-0 early in the second quarter.

Shortly before the half, Jackie Perkins recovered a Graham miscalculation, giving the Hawks possession at the Steer 31. Eight plays later Greg Frazier passed to Lee Dawson and the Hawks had their 3rd score with 33 seconds left.

The Graham band reaped applause of the fans for a fine halftime performance; and the Hawk band under direction of Larry Kingsley put on a fine show.

Iowa Park kicked to start the 3rd quarter and held the Steers, who kicked. The Hawks marched to Graham 35 and fumbled. Again the Hawk defense led by Jimmy Gilmore, Chuck Buikema and Jackie Gholson forced the Steers to kick. Webb fielded the ball, did a fake handoff to McDonald and raced 65 yards to paydirt, but the run was called back for a clipping penalty.

The Green got their final margin of victory in the fourth stanza when Greg Frazier raced 65 yards behind the blocking of Steve Watson, Don Harrison and Perkins for the score. Webb kicked the PAT which brought the score to 26-0.

Texans Who Care

Plans for a campaign to oppose the legalization of liquor by the drink were discussed last week by Wichita county chapter of the "Texans Who Care."

A proposed constitutional amendment to pave the way for liquor by the drink will be on the ballot in the Nov. 3 general election.

The Wichita county group decided last week to establish local organizations in Burkburnett, Electra and Iowa Park, as well as in Wichita Falls, and plans were also made for establishment of a speakers bureau to provide speakers for civic and religious groups interested in the subject.



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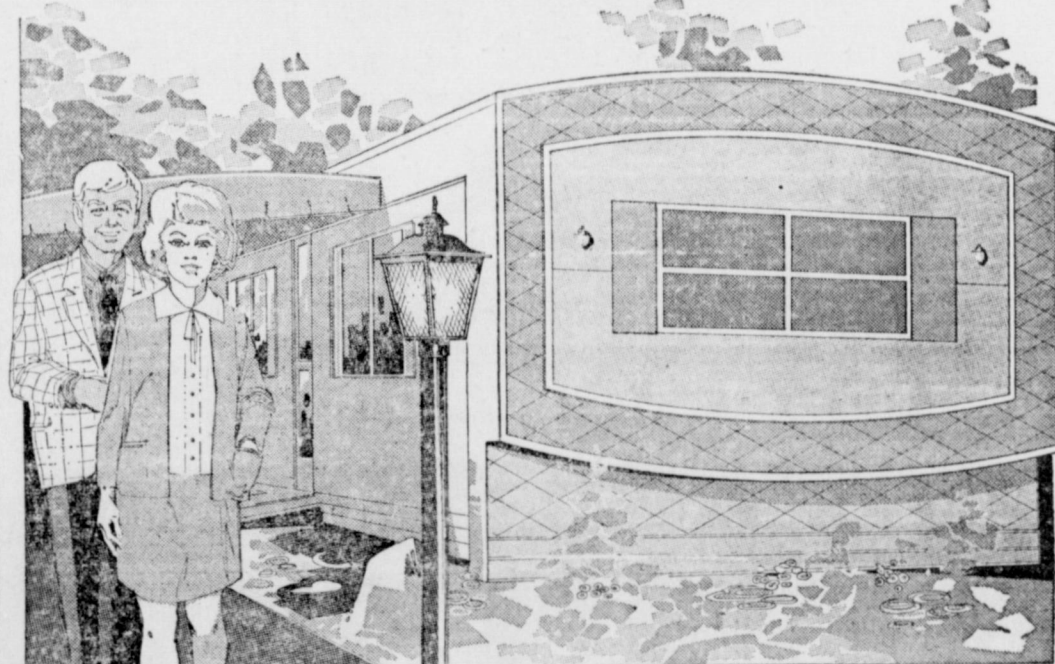
