IPHS 50 Olney 6

Class AA's No. 1 team won its district title for the seventh time in a row last Friday night by defeating Olney 50-6. This is Iowa Park's first year in District 11-AA.

The victory churned out on a cold, damp night kept the Mean Green's string of consecutive wins alive. It now stands at 25.

Coach Watkins had his team put Olney down with ground play almost exclusively. Three passes were thrown and one was caught for an 18 yard gain.

The ground attack was responsible for 17 first downs and 364 yards net gain.

The Cubs used a more balanced plan of attack but it was so well defended the Olney squad could chalk up only 8 first downs with a net 63 yards on the ground and 81 yards through the air. The Hawks intercepted one of Olney's 14 passes. The Cubs completed 7.

QB Greg Frazier mixed up the offensive plays well, keeping the Cub defense loose and ineffectual. He carried the ball himself on the third play of the game and made a 36 yard touchdown run.

Soon thereafter the Hawks had worked the ball to the Cub 9, and Steve Watson made a beautiful run into pay territory, giving the Hawks a 12-point lead.

In the 3rd stanza the scoring plays were a 72-yard run by Jeff McDonald and a 16-yard sally by Steve Webb. Frazier and Webb made 2-point conversions, making the total 28-0 at halftime.

Defense was the name of the game for Jimmy Gilmore, Don Harrison, Jackie Gholson, and Jackie Perkins and Chuck Buikema. Gilmore caught one of the Cubs' passes and Buikema fell on an Olney fumble to take all the sting out of the Cub attack.

Weather being unfavorable, neither school had its marching band on the field. Many fans gave up and went to the comfort of their tiresides.

Early in the third quarter, Webb returned a punt 80 yards for a touchdown and Gholson added the PAT. From then on the Hawk reserves had the game pretty much to themselves. Richard Blair added a touchdown with a Lee Dawson PAT.

Almost everything good that happened for Olney had Ken Pastusek in it. He carried the ball for many short gains. He kicked some fine punts. And finally he tossed a 31-yard touchdown pass to Kevin Kelly when the game was in its dying minutes.

Final Hawk points came with Jimmy Gilmore playing tailback. He had to run the ball over the line twice to get his name on the scoring list. Somebody messed up the first time. The next Gilmore run was rather long, and the payoff was an 8-yard effort around the right side. Wes Spruiell ran for the final 2 points.

Hawks, Decatur Meet Friday in Bi-District Game

Ten down and five to go! That's the cry for the mighty Hawks as they encounter the Decatur Eagles this Friday night in the new Complex at Wichita Falls. Winner of this game will meet the winner of the Brady-Clifton game.

Coach Watkins said the Eagles are an offense minded team with a defense that tends to be overlooked. Decatur has averaged 35 points a game and allowed their opponents only 9, in winning nine games and losing one. Their loss was to Granbury in District play, and they won the right to enter the playoffs by the toss of a coin.

Eagles have excellent speed and quickness in both line and backfield. Their speed merchant deluxe is Freddie Allen, generally plays Split End but sometimes moves to the backfield. Hawk track fans will remember he outran Gary Williams about 5 yards in the 100 and 15 yards in the 220.

Willie Randel also commands respect as a back. At 195 pounds he moves well and likes to use his power up the middle when the outside is sealed off.

Paul Schroeder is quarterback. 6 ft. and 4 in., he weighs 200 and will be the biggest option runner we have seen this year. He throws the ball well and likes to go deep to Allen several times each game.

Thornton, a big tackle, does the kicking. He kicks the ball long and straight. Decatur is by far faster overall than Jacksboro, whom the Eagles knocked off 48-6.

Hawk fans can go to the game expecting an offensive show, and they probably will get it. Remember to get your tickets at the schoolhouse and leave here early, as no seats are reserved.

Wherefore, premises considered, Howard G. Large, Chief Probation Officer of Wichita County, Texas, asks the Juvenile Court to enter its order declaring said children to be dependent and neglected children and authorizing the Chief Probation Officer of Wichita County, Texas, to provide for the future care of said minor children in accordance with the best interests of said children, as is more fully shown by Plaintiff's Petition on file in this suit.

If this citation is not served within ninety days after the date of issuance, it shall be returned unserved.

The Officer executing this process shall promptly execute the same according to law and make due return as the law directs.

No Solicitors

ORDINANCE NO. 65 (176A)
An ordinance prohibiting the practice of going upon private residences to solicit; declaring a nuisance; and providing a penalty.

Section 1. The practice of going in and upon private residences in the town of Iowa Park, Texas, by solicitors, peddlers, hawkers, itinerant merchants and transient vendors of merchandise, not having been requested or invited so to do by the owner or owners, occupant or occupants of said private residence, for the purpose of soliciting orders for the sale of goods, wares and merchandise and or for the purpose of disposing of and or peddling or hawking the same is hereby declared to be a nuisance and punishable as such nuisance as a misdemeanor.

Section 2: The City Marshal and police force of the City of Iowa Park are hereby required and directed to suppress the same, and to abate any such nuisance as is described in the first section of this ordinance.

Section 3. Any person convicted of perpetrating a nuisance as described and prohibited in the first section of this ordinance upon conviction thereof shall be fined a sum not less than \$25 or not more than \$100 together with costs of proceedings, which said fine may be satisfied, if not paid in cash, by execution against the person of anyone convicted of committing the misdemeanor herein prohibited.

Sportsmen are taking to the field in pursuit of quail. "This is a good time to take note of things quail need to survive," said K. C. Willis Jr. of the Iowa Park Soil Conservation Service work unit.

The farm or ranch conservation plan should include provisions for conservation of quail and other wildlife, since most of our hunting is done on privately owned lands.

Quail thrive where there is plenty of food and cover. The farmer or rancher may increase the quail population on his place by leaving a portion of his undisturbed land such as turn rows, fence rows and odd corners for cover. Soil Conservation also recommends leaving or planting a few strips of grain for quail food.

Willis said that control of mes-

quite and other brush in this area can be done in a way that will help wildlife. Strips or scattered spots of brush can be left in the pasture to provide food and cover.
