WB Jim Canuteson is fast and is used as a receiver but can and will run the reverse and some pitch plays. Clifton runs from the T, the wing T, the slot T, and a Triple Wing with three men wide to one side. They average 175 in the line and are rated quick and agile, with great desire.

Several Cubs play both offense

and defense. They use a five-man front with two linebackers, two cornermen and two safeties. On occasion they put seven on the line and blitz. The linebackers are almost joined by the cornerbacks to make a 9-man front.

They also proved to 8,000 chilled fans they were as strong offensively as they needed to be. The game returned out 35-19 with the Mean Green on top.

Decatur started well and challenged the Hawks all during the first quarter, which ended scoreless.

The second stanza had more action on the scoreboard. First Iowa Park's Bobby Morgan took an 8-yard pass from Greg Frazier. Dawson's kick made the 7th point.

The Hawks suffered a lapse in their defenses and scabbard Willie Randle got away for a 30-yard canter. James Thornton's kick tied the score.

Before the intermission, Greg Frazier put the Hawks ahead to stay with his 10-yard TD run. This was augmented by Dawson to get a 14 to 7 bulge which lasted till the half.

The Eagle band and IPHS band did themselves proud during the intermission, both showing formations and movements never before performed in public.

Iowa Park controlled the ball almost the full third quarter. Going against the wind, they used most of the time marching upfield against a strong wind, finally man-

aging 7 more points when Steve

Webb forced his way into paydirt from 2 yards out. Dawson's kick made the score 21-7.

With the fourth quarter came the wind advantage for Iowa Park. Decatur was 14 points behind and had to speed up the play. A pass hung out in the ozone with no-one to catch it, was too much for Greg Ancell to ignore. He gathered the errant pigskin into his arms and had clear galloping to the goal line. Dawson again made good on the PAT.

Reserves got into the game most of the rest of the contest and the Eagles flew high enough to pile up 12 points, bringing the score to 28-19.

Just before the game ended Jeff McDonald got his opportunity to add 6 points. He did it smoothly with a well run 16-yard maneuver. This forced Dawson to make his 5th perfect PAT kick.

Each team intercepted two passes. There were no lost fumbles. The Eagles kicked twice and the Hawks punted only once.

12. Removal of our sins (12)
13. Eternal mercy (17)
14. Eternal righteousness (17)
15. A dependable throne of grace (19)

Oh, how we, as the creatures of God should praise the Lord with all our faculties and forget not all His benefits!

David, in closing the Psalm, said, 'bless the Lord, O my soul' the same words as those which open the Psalm. At first David did not realize how much reason he had to thank the Lord. But upon remembering the many blessings of the Lord, now, his heart is almost too full for words!

And are our hearts—mine—yours — as full at this moment when we say, "Bless the Lord, O my soul"?

The legislation program for the year 1970-71 was adopted. Among priorities approved are the following:

1. Strengthened laws and enforcement to eliminate the illegal traffic in drugs and narcotics.
2. Realistic penalties for first-offense possession of marijuana.
3. Adequate appropriations to implement the teacher pay and kindergarten legislation previously enacted.
4. Strengthened traffic safety laws and enforcement, including school bus safety laws.
5. Standards for supervising and regulating private trade, technical and business schools.
6. Strengthened laws and enforcement to eliminate pollution of air, land and water.
7. Strengthened laws and enforcement to protect children and youth from obscene and pornographic materials, publications and films.
8. Amendment of the Texas Family Code to require parental consent for under age marriages by informal or common law marriage.

Resolved: "That the Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers go on record supporting Freedom of Choice in the public schools and in the event the Supreme Court of the United States does not find this constitutional, that the members of the Texas delegation of the US Congress be urged to introduce and / or support a constitutional amendment to insure Freedom of Choice for all the school districts in the United States—for the welfare of all our children and youth."

Resolved: "That local units be encouraged to use legislation committees to study, report, and inform membership as follows: On TRUANCY and public school attendance requirements; on BONDING and PROBATION laws and on their present usage, particularly in cases of juvenile offenders; and on the handling of youthful narcotic users, the existing laws which affect these youth when apprehended, and the present efforts of the personnel charged with the responsibility of investigation and seeking out narcotic pushers, and curtailment of the sale by these pushers."

Resolved: "That the Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers promote compulsory immunization legislation to include diphtheria, measles, polio, whooping cough, rubella, smallpox, mumps, and tetanus, for the good health and well-being of all children in the public schools within the State of Texas."

Resolved: "That the delegates to this 61st Texas PTA State Convention recognize the importance of such a program as Youth to Youth Incorporated, and encourage parents and teachers to cooperate with and support such programs, good citizenship in all children and youth."

Public buildings in Texas are beginning to display a yellow and blue symbol with the outline of a person in a wheelchair. The Texas State Building Commission by law is charged with the responsibility of requiring all public buildings constructed with federal, state, county or municipal funds to meet the standards and specifications which will make the structures accessible to handicapped and disabled citizens.

The symbol indicates the building has been certified by the Texas State Building Commission that it meets the standards and specifications to accommodate handicapped and disabled citizens. By this means they can enter such building without aid to do business or fill a job.

Winter Care of Evergreens

Weather injury, especially during the winter, can seriously damage evergreen, says Everett Janne, landscape horticulturist with Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Evergreens are particularly susceptible to winter drying in this area, where relative humidity is low. This damage occurs in late winter or early spring before new growth can get started.

Strong winds and low humidity desiccate the foliage because the plants are unable to replace the moisture given off by the leaves through excessive transpiration.

Visible symptoms depend on the severity of the injury. Sometimes only the branch tips will die; at other times entire branches or the whole tree or shrub may turn brown and die. In windbreak plantings, dead plants are often found next to apparently healthy ones.

To prepare evergreens for the winter and reduce weather damage, Janne outlines these steps:

1. Water trees and shrubs at regular intervals throughout the winter, especially where they are protected by wide overhangs on homes.
 2. Use a mulch to prevent surface evaporation and to keep the soil warmer. Evergreens have difficulty taking up moisture when the ground is cold.
 3. Maintain a fertile, well-aerated soil to encourage deep root growth. Compacted soil hinders good root growth.
- Evergreen of most kinds have a beauty which adds much to the winter landscape. They can maintain this beauty only if they are cared for properly, adds Janne.
