The campaign will be conducted here and in more than 8500 other communities during February.

The Heart Fund drive will reach its high point during the 6-day period starting Feb. 28, when Heart Sunday volunteers in all residential areas will visit their neighbors to deliver educational information on the warning signs of heart attack and to receive Heart Fund contributions.

"There can be no doubt that diseases of the heart and circulation, accounting for about 53% of all deaths, constitute our country's foremost health problem," says Mrs. Bludnick. "Apart from this, latest statistics show that more than 27,000,000 Americans suffer from some form of cardiovascular illness."

## State Industrial Board Praises I.P. Reports

Texas Industrial Commission staff member E. H. Sheffield of Austin was lavish in his praise of Iowa Park business and civic leaders when the visited here Monday. He said the reports they have made to the TIC are a "significant contribution to Texas' industrial development."

The Commission and Gov. Preston Smith this week cited Iowa Park persons for their work in helping during the past year in accumulating information to be placed in the Commission's computerized program, called "Insta-Site."

Sheffield said Iowa Park's portion of the information is practically complete, and shows the interest and co-operation of many local people.

Sheffield presented Dr. Carver an 88-page printout containing 1,444 items of information which are stored in the computer's memory bank. Local people had collected data for 393 items on the printout. The balance were collected by the Commission staff.

These data are to be updated as the facts change. Whenever a prospective industrial development needs information about Iowa Park and this area, a printout of this information can be had overnight and sent on its way.

Iowa Park persons who are interested in improving our community can determine from the information now on hand just what our strengths and weaknesses are, and begin at once to bring the area up to full competitive position where indicated.

Mr. Sheffield pointed out that the facilities of Texas Industrial Commission are always available to cities and areas in Texas, and all can co-operate to build a better climate for industrial and economic growth.

It is interesting to note that Jim Harwell, formerly with the Wichita Falls Chamber of Commerce, is chairman of TIC. Jim Heath, formerly secretary of Iowa Park C of C, is on the staff.

Industrial development over the next 25 years will be the key subject Feb. 18-19 during a special advanced seminar co-sponsored by the Lyndon B. Johnson school of public affairs and the Texas Industrial Commission.

State and national economics, manpower development and governmental responsibility are among items to be discussed in the seminar to be held on the University of Texas campus in Austin.

Speakers will include Dr. Wilbur Thompson of Wayne State university in Detroit; Dr. David Carley of Inland Steel Development Corp of Madison, Ore.; Dr. George Kozmetsky, Dr. Ray Marshall and Dr. Stanley Arbingast, all of the University of Texas.

## Committee to Study Community Redevelopment

Forming of a committee to serve as a fact-finding and information sharing group on the neighborhood renewal program to be voted on April 3, was the major item of business transacted when the City Planning Commission met Monday evening in City Hall. Mr. Donald Hill presided for business discussion.

A temporary organization action named Bob Hamilton chairman and Mrs. Luther Shaw secretary of the committee. Other members listed included Billy Gene House, A. K. Settle, James Shumsky, Arch Hughes, Jim McClendon, Dr. Richard Carver, Mrs. M. L. Hines and Mrs. E. F. Watson.

Plans were made to bring a representative from the Housing and Urban Development board with headquarters in Dallas to Iowa Park for a series of community meetings where definite and current information concerning the project could be shared with any and all interested in the development program.

Those functioning in finding out and disseminating the information are home-talent people who themselves will be involved in and affected by the results.

Home grants are free to some home owners on a volunteer basis; and where needed and desired, low interest rate loans may be available. Control of the program will be in the hands of the local neighborhood renewal agency.

The business district will be included in this program under a different set-up.

Following the naming of members on the neighborhood renewal program, the City Planning Commission heard from Thurman Reitz who is investigating the facilities and requirements for his establishing a veterinary clinic in Iowa Park. At present he is working in a clinic at Sealy but is interested in coming to this area.

### Land Bank Cuts Interest Rate

Harry C. Forber, manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Wichita Falls, received word this week the Federal Land Bank of Houston has reduced the interest billing rate of variable rate loans to 8%. This reduction affects more than \$90,000,000 of variable rate loans to more than 2800 farmers and ranchers in Texas.

The variable rate loan plan lets the interest rate "float" over the variations in the money market. The rate in any year will reflect the changes in prices which the bank must pay for money it has for farm mortgage loans.

On Jan. 1 of this year the Federal Land Bank of Houston had over \$529,000,000 in volume of loans outstanding.

### OUR SOIL ★ OUR STRENGTH

Garden mulches and how to use them is the subject of a new leaflet available from the USDA Soil Conservation Service. Gary A. Batte, district conservationist at Iowa Park, says the leaflet "Mulches for Your Garden" has the best and most concise explanation of how to use mulches and compost he ever has seen.

"Mulches cushion falling rain-drops and reduce soil loss and soil compaction. Mulches keep soil cool in summer, conserving moisture; and furnish food for earthworms, which are valuable for aerating the soil. Organic matter added by mulches makes soil crumbly and easy to work."

Batte says some mulches are more valuable if composted before using. The leaflet shows how to build a compost bin and lists the quantities of fertilizer, or wood ashes or epsom salts to add to compost to speed decomposition.

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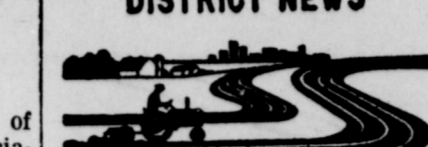

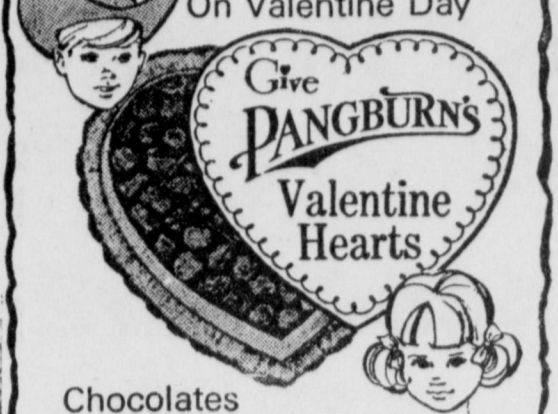
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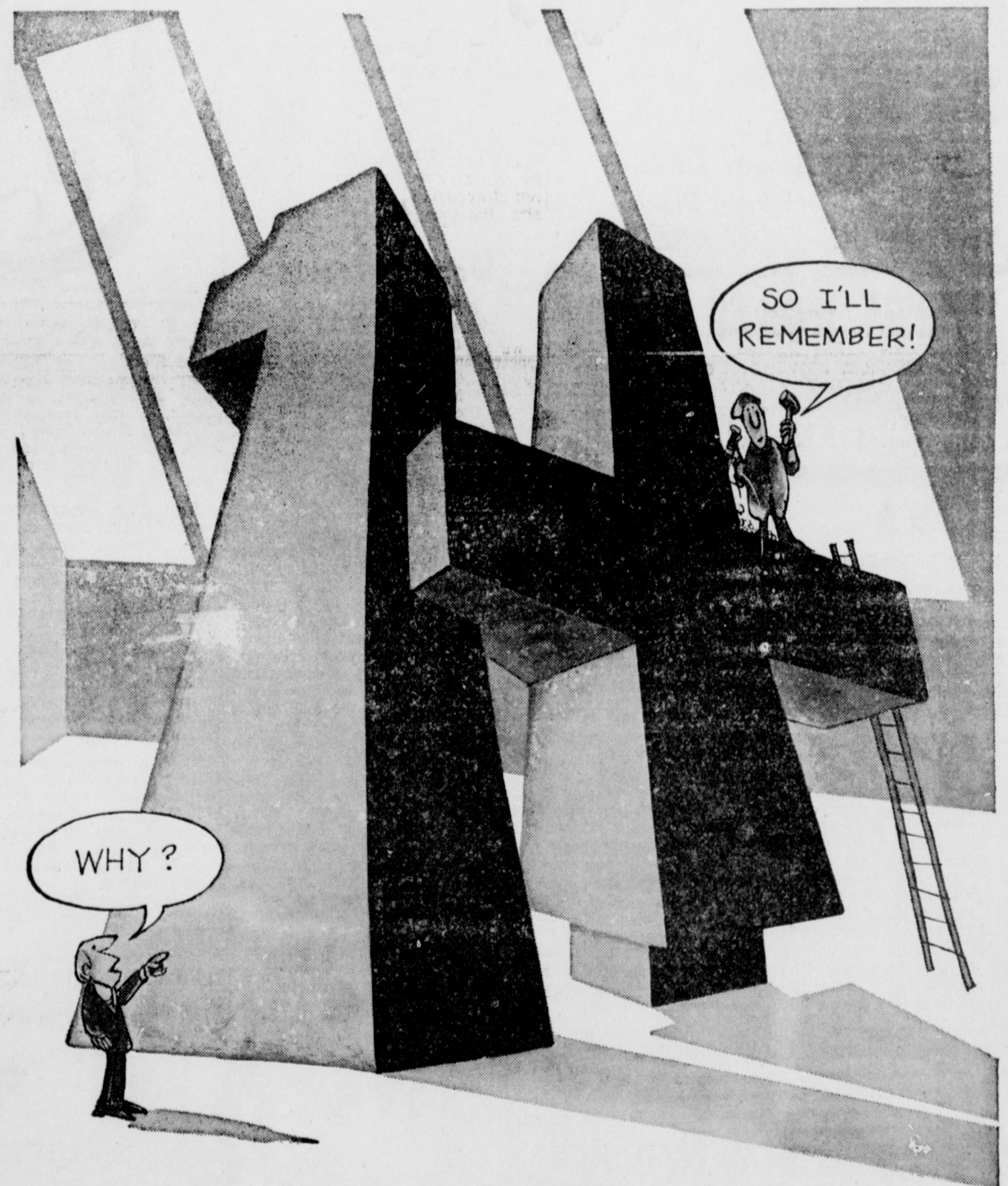
