Wayne N. House, company manger for Texas Electric Service Co. here, urges young kite flyers to follow a few simple rules for their own safety. He warns them of the danger of flying kites in the vicinity of electric power lines. "If your kite should get caught in electric lines, call Texas Electric Co. Someone will be sent to get it down for you." House recommends the following safety rules for kite flying: Use dry string, not wire or anything metallic. Use wood and paper in your kite not wire or metal. Fly your kite on days when there is no rain. Avoid busy streets and highways while flying your kite. Don't pull on the string or climb a power pole to loosen a snagged line. Fly your kite far from electric or power lines.

Fly you kite away fom television and radio aerials. "Posters containing these safety hints have been distributed by the Comuany to all schools," Wayne said, "so kite flyers will get more fun out of flying kites and at the same time keep from getting hurt or losing their kites.'
