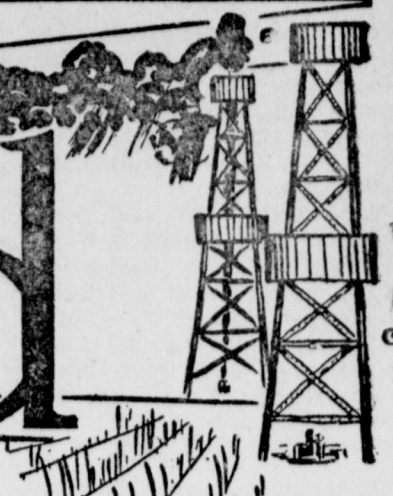

## Life Begins Again in Hometown After 20 Years in Military

After 20 years of active duty with the air force, Billy Gene House and his family have returned to make their home in Iowa Park.

House has accepted employment with Lone Star Gas Co. and will work in distribution set-ups at Electra and Iowa Park. Mrs. House is presently teaching private piano lessons.

Billy Gene was graduated from W. F. George high school here in 1949. He enlisted in the air force on Jan. 5, 1951 in Wichita Falls and received basic training at Lackland AFB, San Antonio. His technical training was for teletype operator at Warren AFB, Wyo.

He was then sent to Kelly AFB at San Antonio.

August 1951 found Billy Gene in Chateauroux AB, France, where he helped set up the communications system. In January of the next year he was assigned to headquarters of the Allied Air Forces Central Europe at Fontainebleau, France. He worked as teletype operator in Napoleon's chateau while awaiting completion of the new installation.

Six nations were represented in AAFCE at the time. Off duty periods made it possible for House to see much of Europe. He was invited by a Dutch airman to visit in his home in Leyden, Netherlands. He also visited in Amsterdam and Veldendam and enjoyed sailing and sightseeing.

At other times the Iowa Park serviceman toured Luxembourg, Germany, Switzerland, Austria and France with American friends by car; and visited with English friends in Staleybridge, England.

House returned to the States in Sept. 1954 and re-enlisted. Again he was sent to Warren AFB and retrained into administrative work.

In December 1954, he and Miss Cecilia Yeargan were married. They moved to Wetumpka, Ala., the following year and were stationed at Gunter AFB for 1½ years.

This was followed by three years of ROTC duty at Texas Tech in Lubbock. There followed a short stay at Randolph AFB, San Antonio.

The family went to Tehran, Iran, in 1960, where Billy Gene was assigned to a Military Assistance Advisory Group training the Iranian AF. Highlights of the stay in Tehran were witnessing a Moslem wedding and weathering an earthquake.

Billy Gene flew to Athens and Paris for a short visit while stationed in Iran.

Sheppard AFB was the next assignment. This lasted three years and was followed by 1½ years in Oklahoma on Clinton - Sherman AFB.

Final overseas duty for House was a 2½ year tour at Kadana AB, Okinawa. While there the family visited Taipei, Taiwan, the capital of Nationalist China. They had several days of shopping and sightseeing. Highlights of the trip were their tour of the National Museum which houses one of the largest collections of Chinese art in the world; and glimpses of the presidential palace of Chiang Kai-shek.

House's final assignment was at Carswell AFB, Ft. Worth. He retired as Master Sergeant, Jan. 31 this year after 20 years of faithful service to our country. His military decorations include three Commendation Medals.

The House family includes three children: Gary, 14, a freshman in IPHS; Alan, 12, and Cynthia, 11, both students at Junior High.

Billy Gene's mother Mrs. W. N. House, and his brother Wayne and family reside in Iowa Park.

Cecilia's parents, Rev. Mr. and Mrs. M. C. Yeargan are residents of Sulphur, Okla. He formerly was minister of the First Presbyterian church here; and Mrs. Yeargan was secretary of the Chamber of Commerce. They are now retired from active duty.

## Frank Mahler Is Heart Victim

Funeral service for Frank Mahler was conducted Wednesday afternoon in Iowa Park church of Christ. Burial was in Highland cemetery.

Pallbearers were Dave Robnett, Carl Barnhill, Ralph Beall, Robert Johnson, Jim McClendon and H. C. Johnson.

Mr. Mahler had a heart attack Monday morning and was rushed to Wichita Falls, where he died. Born July 5, 1925, in Archer county he was a resident of Bowman community for 40 years.

A farmer and rancher, he was a veteran of World War II.

Surviving are the widow Frances, a teacher at Kidwell school; a son Henry of Iowa Park; four daughters: Mrs. Fran Davis of Iowa Park, Carolyn, Mary and Carrie McMiller of the home; three brothers: Clarence of Iowa Park, Herbert of Wichita Falls, Milton of San Antonio; and a sister Mrs. Bernice Ayers of Bowman community.

## Postmaster's Brother Has Reputation as Outstanding Farmer-Stockman in Texas

"Gibreaths Rake in Honors as 'FARM FAMILY OF YEAR'" is the headline in last week's issue of the Brownwood paper. It is not about our Mr. and Mrs. T. E. Gibreath; but about his brother and family who farm and raise cattle in the Dublin area.

The Gene Gibreaths were chosen as the rural American family out of several thousand farm families as the outstanding 1970 Texas Farm Family. They have been told by the Texas Farmers Home Administration that they are in the running for the national award in March.

The Gibreath farm has been used by the Future Farmers of America and other demonstration teams, visited by people throughout the state, and by others from foreign countries.

In the Feb. 21 issue of Fort Worth Star Telegram, we found these quotes: "For a farm boy reared about two miles from his present place, Gibreath still hasn't traveled far from home, but he's gone a long way as a farmer and good citizen."

In 1951 Gene rented land to raise peanuts and cotton, but in seven

years threshed only two crops of goobers.

He started dairying, sold his stocker cows in 1955 and bought four Holsteins. Since then the Gibreaths "worked and managed," applied a complete conservation plan to the farm, learned technical methods of artificial insemination of dairy cattle to improve his herd . . . until last month . . . "he dispersed 125 cows whose average was 14,908 pounds of milk and 528 pounds of butter fat."

He leased land to produce feed and hay and to raise replacement dairy heifers as well as increased beef cattle numbers.

The family is composed of Mr. and Mrs. Gene Gibreath and son David, 17.

For the awards banquet hundreds of friends came from Comanche, Earth, Eastland, Hamilton and Brown counties to join the state and national officials who presented the awards.

Our own Gibreath, T. E., Iowa Park postmaster, is also interested in what is happening in his birthplace and goes often to Dublin. He also has a small acreage here and owns a horse or two and some cows. It runs in the family.

## Renewal Study Is Continuing

For the opening discussion the committee met in the City Hall in joint session with the City Council. Here Mr. Hamilton gave a summary of the progress made in contacting HUD and reported that representatives of that agency can not come to Iowa Park between now and April 3, when the election is set for voting on the Renewal program. It had been hoped their representatives could be here to meet with interested folk in the community to answer questions and give background information on the program.

After the research committee moved to the office of the Leader, permanent officers were elected and plans were made for future activities. In order to become informed on the details it is hoped a delegation from Iowa Park will go to Dallas within the week to confer with officials of the Housing and Urban Development division of the federal government.

Monday evening, March 1, at 7:30 has been set as time for the next meeting, in the Chamber of Commerce office. Others interested in the renewal program in Our Town are invited to be present.

**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR 21)  
Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVII, Section 1, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 1. The Legislature by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each House, to be entered by yeas and nays on the journals, may propose amendments to the Constitution, to be voted upon by the qualified electors for members of the Legislature, which proposed amendments shall be duly published once a week for four weeks, commencing at least three months before an election, the time of which shall be specified by the Legislature, in one weekly newspaper of each county, in which such a newspaper may be published; and it shall be the duty of the several returning officers of said election, to open a poll for, and make returns to the Secretary of State,

of the number of legal votes cast at said election for and against said amendments; and if more than one be proposed, then the number of votes cast for and against each of them; and if it shall appear from said return, that a majority of the votes cast, have been cast in favor of any amendment, the said amendment so receiving a majority of the votes cast, shall become a part of this Constitution, and proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereof."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on May 18, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the Legislature may propose an amendment of the Constitution at any session of the Legislature."

**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR 17)  
Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows: "Section 49-d-1. (a) The Texas Water Development Board shall upon direction of the Texas Water Quality Board, or any successor agency designated by the Legislature, issue additional Texas Water Development Bonds up to an additional aggregate principal amount of One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) to provide grants, loans, or any combination of grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as established by the Legislature. The Texas Water Quality Board or any successor agency designated by the Legislature may make such grants and loans to political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas, including municipal corporations, river authorities, conservation and reclamation districts, and districts created or organized or authorized to be created or organized under Article XVI, Section 59, or Article III, Section 52, of this Constitu-

tion, State agencies, and interstate agencies and compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party, and upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature may authorize by general law. The bonds shall be issued for such terms, in such denominations, form and installments, and upon such conditions as the Legislature may authorize.

"(b) The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund to be invested and administered as prescribed by law.

"(c) The bonds authorized in this Section 49-d-1 and all bonds authorized by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III shall bear interest at not more than 6% per annum and than the Texas Water Development Board shall prescribe, subject to the limitations of the Legislature.

"(d) The Texas Water Development Fund shall be used for the purposes heretofore permitted by law, and subject to the limitations in Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1; provided, however, that the financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 subject only to the availability

of funds and without regard to the provisions in Section 49-c that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1982.

"(e) Texas Water Development Bonds are secured by the general credit of the State and shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"(f) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on Tuesday, May 18, 1971, at which election all ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) bonds to provide financial assistance to cities and other public agencies for water quality enhancement purposes, providing for the improvement and continuance of the water resources program, and establishing an interest ceiling on Water Development Bonds at 6% per annum."

## Income Tax

Taxpayers are warned against misleading advertising conveying the impression that the income tax law greatly complicates their 1970 returns.

Ellis Campbell jr., district director of Internal Revenue Service for North Texas, said ads placed by some commercial preparers of tax returns also picture Form 1040 as extremely complex. Campbell said the IRS has made improvements in the form and in filing procedures in response to suggestions from taxpayers, lawyers, accountants and others.

IRS has this year offered to figure the income tax and retirement income credit for up to 30 million taxpayers.

Taxpayers should be careful of "guarantees" offered by some commercial preparers of returns that make it appear they will represent the taxpayer in any subsequent audit. Generally, only attorneys, CPAs and those who, by demonstrating their qualifications, are enrolled for practice, can represent a taxpayer before IRS. A taxpayer should be sure of just what is meant by a guarantee offered by a preparer.

Regardless of who fills in the form, the taxpayer is responsible for the accuracy of the return.

#### Heart Fund Campaign Starts This Sunday

The week-long 1971 Heart Fund campaign will reach its high point on Heart Sunday, Feb. 28, when approximately 65 volunteers commence a canvass of Iowa Park residences, according to Mrs. Geo. Bludnick, chairman. It is anticipated that all residential visits will be completed and that kits will be turned in not later than Saturday, March 6.

Alpha Epsilon Omicron chapter of Beta Sigma Phi sorority is local sponsor of the fund drive.

It is estimated that heart diseases are responsible for 53 per cent of all deaths each year, and that 46,800 will die in Texas this year.

Volunteers will call at the homes between 2:00 and 6:00 p.m. distributing information about warning signs of heart attack and receiving contributions to the Heart Fund.

Each of us should donate if possible. The Heart Association is not supported by United Funds because heart disease is too big a problem to share in other causes.

Mrs. Bludnick pointed out that these contributions go to fight a vast complex of diseases—heart attack, stroke, hardening of the arteries, high blood pressure, rheumatic fever, and inborn heart defects.

Give . . . so more will live!

Answers to questions often asked of Heart Fund volunteer workers:

1. How will the money I contribute be spent?

Your gift will be spent by the local, state and national organizations on public and professional education, community services and research.

Local programs include: Training hospital and nursing home staffs, firemen, policemen, ambulance drivers and other rescue groups in resuscitation procedures.

Working with industrial leaders on heart education for employees.

Furnishing exhibits, films, charts and speakers for public

schools and Midwestern university.

Providing speakers, films and literature for men's civic organizations and women's groups.

Providing a multi-media teaching system for coronary care nursing in local and area hospitals.

Maintaining a complete referral system for heart patients.

Arranging for nurses seminars and programs for the County Medical Society.

2. What percentage of the funds are spent on administration and fund raising?

9.8% for administration and 12.4% for fund raising.

3. How big is the heart problem actually?

Fifty-three per cent of all deaths are from heart and cardiovascular disease—more than everything else combined, including accidents. The closest to this is 16% from cancer. There were 494 deaths last year in Wichita county from heart disease.

4. Is the Heart Association a tax exempt organization?

Yes. Any contribution made to the Heart Fund is fully tax deductible.

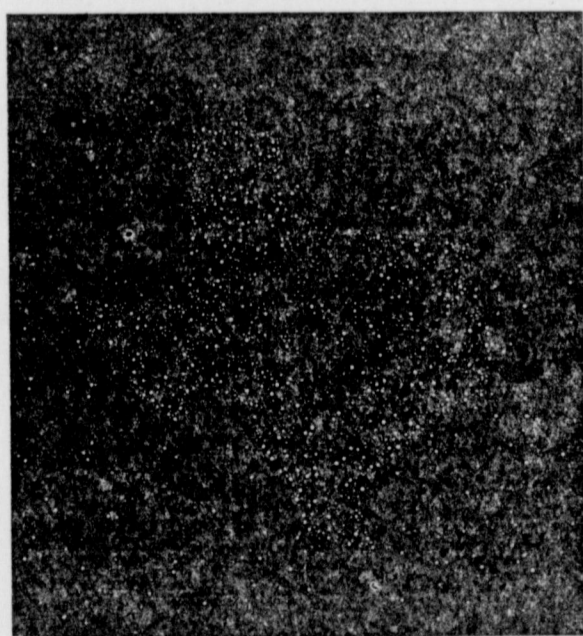

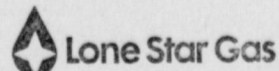
