## Choir Ranks High in New District

IPHS Choir earned a First Division rating last Friday for the fourth straight year, at the annual UIL contest. However, this year the school is competing in the AAA classification.

The singers earned the I in sight reading and U in concert. Last year they won sweepstakes with First Divisions in both categories.

Fifteen choirs were entered in competition this year. The only school's rating I in sight reading were Iowa Park, Rider and Crowell. (Darrel Dick started the choral program in Crowell seven years ago.) Schools earning I in concert were Rider, WFSH, and Vernon.

Mr. Dick said, "I am very proud of our choir and the progress we have made in the four years I have been director here. I am proud of our rating this year. I only wish we could have brought home another Sweepstakes."

In solo competition IPHS had more First Divisions than any other school. Twenty-seven students were in solo events and 14 made I: Brenda Barnes, Lee McClelland, Lynn Dozier, Sandra



First, or last, they have to elect three trustees for the Consolidated Independent school district. In one race they have the choice of selecting one trustee from three candidates: C. E. Myer, Jim Frazier, Chester Morrison. In the other division are three men contesting for two positions: Stanley Williamson, Robert Wilcox and Luther Skinner.

All qualified voters residing in the combined school district will be eligible to vote. Those living south of the FW&D railroad will cast their ballots at Bradford school. Those living north of the railroad will go to Kidwell school.

Qualified voters who reside in the City of Iowa Park have two items of importance on the same ballot. Which of the six candidates for aldermen do I prefer? The voter may choose two.

Candidates are Carl Davis, Bill Gilmore, Frank Harlin, R. O. Harper, John Huff, Arch Hughes and Robert Johnson.

The same group of persons also has opportunity to vote for or against forming an Urban Renewal Agency for the City.

The City election also will be conducted Saturday in the two elementary schools, with the same dividing line.

Voting in both elections can be done from 7:00 a.m. 'til 7:00 p.m.




