Mrs. Lou Rilda Gee Dies in Wichita Falls

Funeral services for Mrs. Lou Rilda Gee, 77, were conducted Wednesday morning at the Iowa Park Church of God.

Rev. F. C. Dozer of Oteasa and Rev. J. W. Truett, local pastor, officiated. Burial was in the Sunset cemetery under direction of Tanner Funeral Home of Iowa Park.

Mrs. Gee died early Monday in a Wichita Falls hospital after being a patient there a little over a week. She had been in ill health over 10 years and seriously ill 2 years.

Mrs. Gee was born August 14, 1877, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Wilson, in Nashville, Tenn. She moved with her parents to Sunset when she was four years old. In 1898 she married the late J. F. Gee in Sunset, and in 1936 the Gee family moved to Iowa Park. Survivors include six sons: Garvin and Cecil of Wichita Falls; Bill of Electra, Ocie of Kamay, Elbie of Iowa Park, and Eldon of Pampa; two daughters: Mrs. Fred Morris of Graham and Mrs. W. C. out danger signs and possible detours. Some herds in Wichita county have cows which are not paying their way, Haws points out. In their cases an empty stall would increase profits. Only actual production records can sound out these boards, he says. It cannot be done by guessing or estimating.

Only a small percent of the Grade A milk producers in Wichita county are members of a dairy herd improvement association, and many registered herds are not on test. The majority of herd owners are trying to operate without the most important tools for making much-needed sound decisions.

Concentrate feeds, the most expensive in a cow's ration, should be controlled, or fed according to production. Without records, a cow may be underfed, overfed, or properly fed. Chances are two to one against being correct. Records on milk production will eliminate such guesswork.

Are herd replacements out of the best producing cows? There is danger in being overstocked on the statement "The bull is half the herd." As far as each heifer is concerned, one-half of her inheritance came from her dam. Here again, without records, the dairyman is guessing at one-half of her inheritance, regardless of the bull.

Dairy Cows Need A "Vacation" Dairy cows, too, need an occasional rest. Unless given a good vacation between lactation periods, dairy animals may be unable to produce a strong, healthy calf and give their full quota of milk, says R. E. Burleson, extension dairy husbandman. He refers to the dairy cow as a "complicated piece of machinery."

A cow, during her dry period, must recover from heavy milk production, build a calf and store reserves for her next lactation period. How well she does these jobs depends upon the length of the rest and her feed and care during this time, says the specialist.

Gov. Johnston Murray of Oklahoma, Supt. Keith D. Swim and Rep. Tony Fenoglio of Nocona rode together.

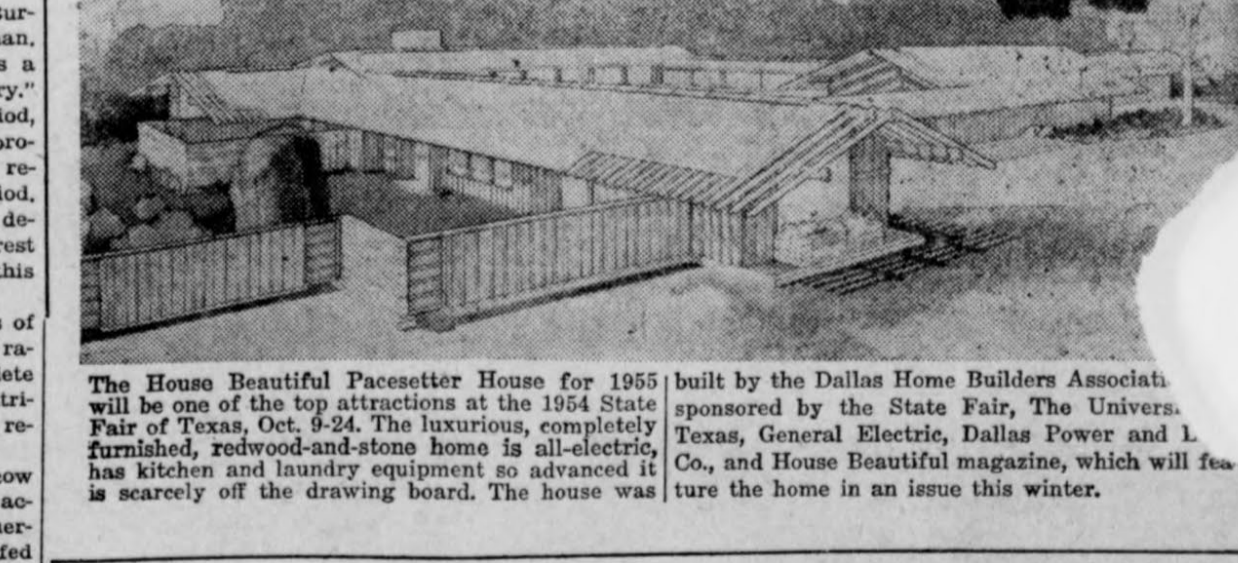

During the next few weeks bird watchers from Saskatchewan to San Antonio will be on the lookout for 20-odd whooping cranes winging their way south from an Arctic wilderness to a marshy refuge on the Texas coast near Rockport.

The migration is an annual event for the whooping cranes, perhaps the most celebrated of all birds and the last flock of their kind still in existence.

The cranes are the largest and most stately of all migratory fowl on the North American continent. They stand more than four feet high, and they are snow white except for sharply etched black wing tips, black legs, yellow bills, and bare red crowns.

Their fall migration takes them from their summer nesting ground in northern Canada to the Arkansas National Wildlife Refuge about 15 miles north of Rockport on the Texas coast.

Whooping cranes generally leave Canada in late September or early October. They fly in small groups, and bring their young ones—hatched during the summer. Length of time required for the trip varies. Some arrive at the refuge as early as mid-October. Others don't complete their flight until late December or early January.

The cranes usually head back to Canada in April.

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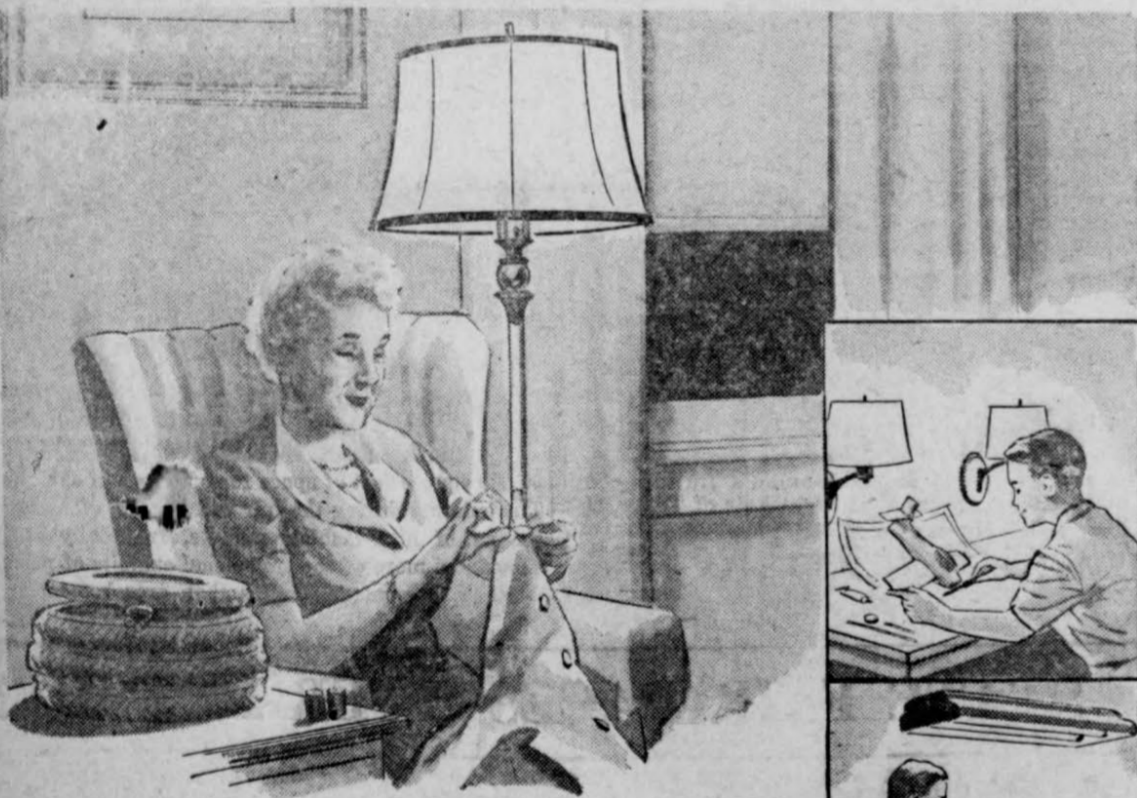
