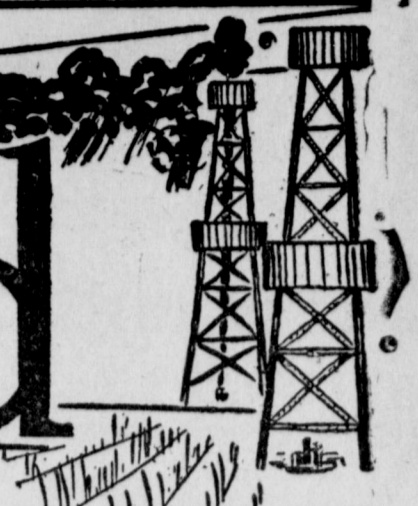

City Budget Accepted

Iowa Park City Council met in regular session Monday evening to consider the 1971-72 budget. An outline had been published recently, and it was adopted virtually without change.

An ordinance was passed setting the sewer rate of \$2.50 per month.

Wayne House, representing the Industrial Foundation, appeared at the meeting and told of the prospect of securing a new industry. Aldermen voted to lay water and sewer lines to the city limits west of Iowa Park, provided an industry is located in that area.

Securing treated water from Wichita Falls was an item of importance. Councilmen and guests heard a report from W. J. Wischmeyer on the piping of water from the Cypress street water plant to Iowa Park through a 16-inch line. He predicted the cost to be near \$686,000.

Aldermen voted to take preliminary steps toward constructing the water line and financing the project.

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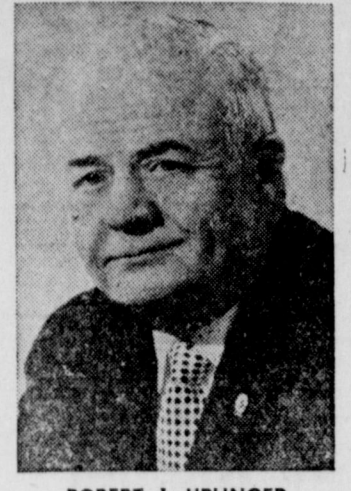
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Lions Elect International President

ORDINANCE 168
 An Ordinance Regulating the Discharge of Industrial Wastes into the Public Sewers of the City of Iowa Park, Promulgating Regulations and Establishing Charges for Services Rendered, Providing for a Penalty Not to Exceed Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) for Each Offense.

Whereas, the City of Iowa Park has provided facilities for the collection and treatment of sewage to promote the health, safety and convenience of its people and for the safeguarding of water resources common to all, and
 Whereas, provision has been made in the design, construction and operation of such facilities to accommodate certain types and quantities of industrial wastes in excess of, and in addition to normal sewage, and
 Whereas, it is the obligation of the producers of industrial wastes to defray the cost of the waste treatment services rendered by the City of Iowa Park in linear proportion to the cost of the waste treatment facilities and of the operation and maintenance costs, utilized in treating the industrial wastes, and

Whereas, proper protection and operation of the collection and treatment facilities may require either the exclusion, pre-treatment, or controlled discharge at point of origin of certain types or quantities of industrial wastes,
 Now, therefore be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas: (here follows the body of the ordinance. Interested persons may appear before the City Council for discussion.)

SECTION 10. Penalties
 (a) If any person, firm, or corporation shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance, they shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction in the Municipal Court, shall be punished by a fine not to exceed Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) for each offense. Each day of such violation shall be deemed a separate offense.

(b) Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall become liable to the City for any expense, loss or damage occasioned by the City by reason of such violation.

SECTION 11. Validity
 All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed. The validity of any section, clause, sentence or provision of this ordinance shall not affect the validity of any other part of this ordinance, which can be given effect without invalidated part or parts.
