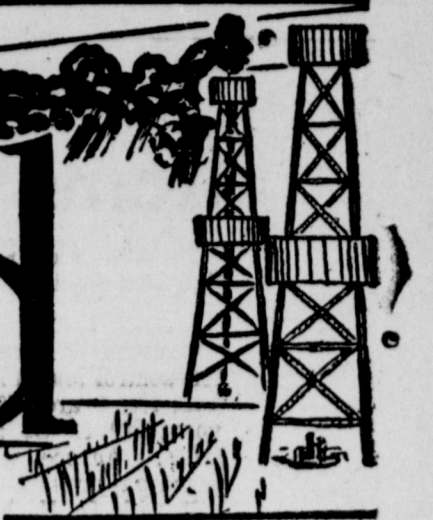

Fish Kill Aug. 13

A Fish Kill has been scheduled for Friday, Aug. 13 at Lake Iowa Park and Buffalo Reservoir.

The City and the Water District will furnish rotenone for the kill, which will be directed by Kenneth Holder, representing the state game and fish department.

The chemical is absolutely not harmful for stock, cattle or people but is sure death for fish.

It is hoped a large number of persons will be present to participate and carry home the kill.

The program will begin at Lake Iowa Park at 8:00 and then move to Buffalo Reservoir. Each person may have 15 bass and 25 channel cat, plus all he wants of all other kinds of fish.

However, no fish may be sold because these are no longer commercial fishing waters.

Christmas Bazaar

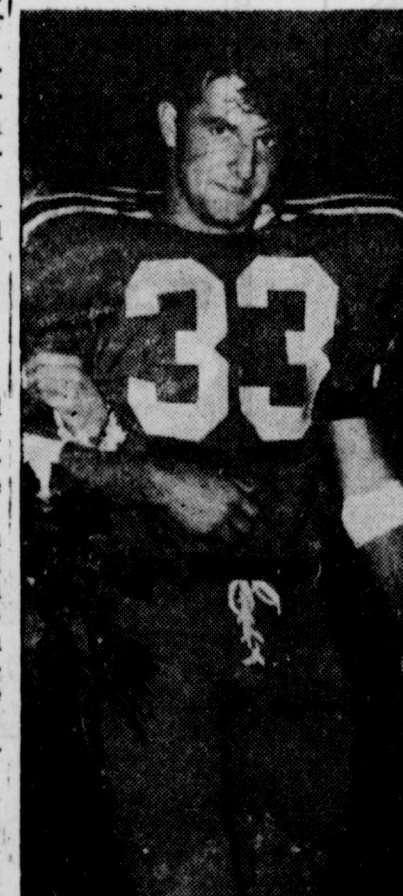

Wilks to Leave IP

Come Sept. 1, there will be an opening on the staff at City Hall for a responsible and efficient person to assume the duties of City Secretary. K. G. Wilks, who has served in that capacity since Oct. 1, 1968, has resigned and is moving to Ferris, where he has accepted the position of City Administrator.

There he will work in cooperation with the mayor and city council but with a different set up as to the functioning of departments of service that prevails in Iowa Park.

A rather unusual aspect of his getting the new job was that the emphasis was on age and experience and that being 65 was an asset, not a liability. This he was told when he met the Ferris mayor and city council in an interview last Saturday. That council, too, has a doctor as a member; and it has a woman member. Also, the City of Ferris is paying his moving expenses.

The city secretary of Iowa Park must be a versatile person to assume the responsibility and multiple tasks if he continues to function as have his predecessors.

Karl has not only kept the minutes of the council, the planning commission, the zoning commission, but records the ordinances and sees that they are enforced. He is secretary of the board of equalization; and kept books on three-quarters of a million dollars in receipts for the fiscal year ended June 30; with disbursements of \$747,335.86.

The secretary also keeps a register of bonds and bills issued by the city and all evidence of debts due and payable to it.

His being purchasing agent for all departments is of no little consequence. At the end of no month or no period of reporting have the books been out of balance, even one penny; though corrections have been made from day to day, at times.

Mr. Wilks commends the assistants in the office at City Hall for their efficiency and co-operation in making possible the good record of the city secretary. He especially commends Miss Dosia Smith for her continued proficiency in bookkeeping and interest in city affairs, and thinks her valuable as a consultant and adviser.

Previous to his coming to Iowa Park, Wilks was purchasing agent for the City of Wichita Falls for six years. He holds a rarely owned Purchasing Officer's Certificate. He is a member of the Texas Association of Assessing Officers and of the Association of City Clerks and Secretaries.

G & E Factory Will Make Exercise Equip't

Iowa Park will be the site of a new industry soon. It will be the G & E Manufacturing Co. Inc., and will specialize in construction of exercise equipment.

A. F. Evans is president of the company; G. W. Green is vice-president; Cathryn Evans is secretary and manager.

The new industry will be located on Kamay Road in the building formerly occupied by Watercrafters. The factory is expected to go into production here by the week of Aug. 15.

The products will be sold both wholesale and retail.

Work performed in production of the exercise equipment will require the labor of seamstresses, upholsterers, silk screen printers, and workers with fiber board and pipe.

Rural Areas Discussed

A beginning is being made to reverse the trend that saw 5,000,000 persons leave the farms and ranches in the decade of the '60's, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White said in the keynote address he delivered in Wichita Falls, Monday.

Speaking to Texas County Agricultural Agents attending their annual meeting, White said that money has been appropriated by the federal government for a campaign to stop the emigration from rural areas, and the Texas Department of Agriculture is also trying to find a solution to rural problems.

"The congestion in which 75 percent of the people live on 2 percent of the land has created problems for the cities too," White pointed out. "Billions of dollars will be needed for the program to save both forms of society. Rural communities must be attractive enough and offer opportunities enough to stop emigration, stabilize population and allow them to grow and prosper," he declared.

John praised the county agents as a professional class of people who have provided a valuable service to citizens of the state and the nation.

An Order calling an election within Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District Number 3 to determine whether the Board of Directors of said District shall be empowered to issue bonds for additional improvements and making provisions for the said election.

Whereas, the Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District Number 3 was heretofore created and established under the provisions of Article 16, Section 59 of the Constitution of Texas pursuant to Chapter 3A, Title 128, R.C.S. of Texas, 1925 as amended and has heretofore authorized the issuance and delivery of bonds which are now outstanding, such bonds being known as the "Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District Number 3 Re-

funding and Construction Bonds, Series 1964," dated February 1, 1964; and

Whereas, it has come to pass that the work, improvements and facilities set forth in the plan adopted by the District have been found not to be adequate to accomplish the purposes of the District and additional funds are required in order for the District to supply water to the City of Iowa Park, Texas, the cost of the improvements required (being set forth in the Engineers' Report) is in summary as follows:

Construction of pipeline 57,000 linear feet, 16-inch transmission line	\$72,150.00
500,000 gallon elevated tank	30,000.00
Land and rights-of-way	115,000.00
500,000 gallon ground storage and pump station	109,000.00
Engineering	80,000.00
Furnish, legal, fiscal and interest during construction	50,000.00
Total	\$275,000.00

And, whereas, it has been determined with representatives of the District will supply and provide a City of Iowa Park that the District on the left of the improvement and the City of Iowa Park will provide the remainder thereof, so that the entire obligation of the District shall not exceed \$400,000; now therefore,

It is ordered by the Board of Directors of the Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District Number 3:

Section 1: That an election shall be held in said District on the 4th day of September, 1971, at which election there shall be submitted the following proposition:

PROPOSITION

"Shall the Board of Directors of the Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District Number 3 be authorized to issue the general obligation bonds of the District in the amount of \$400,000 to mature serially or otherwise over a period of years not to exceed Thirty-Five (35) years from their date for the purpose of paying the cost of additions to the Districts water supply and transmission facilities and all facilities and appurtenances incidental thereto and shall such Board be authorized and empowered to provide for the payment of the principal of and interest on such bonds by the levy of a sufficient ad valorem tax upon all taxable property within said District, such bonds to be sold at such price or prices and to bear interest at such rate or rates as shall be determined within the discretion of the governing body of such District in accordance with the provisions of Section 2 of Article 71K-2, V.A.C.S., provided that no bond shall bear interest at a rate in excess of ten per centum per annum?"

Section 2: The said election shall be held on election day between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. at the following polling places, and with the following election officials:

Wilks is hereby appointed as clerk for absentee voting for the election herein ordered, and absentee voting shall be conducted at City Hall, Iowa Park, Texas, within the boundaries of said District between the hours of 8:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. each day that is not a Saturday, a Sunday or official State holiday in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 4, V.A.C.S. Election Code, Section 3. That said election shall be held under and in accordance with the provisions of the General Election Laws of the State of Texas, as modified by the provisions of Chapter 3A, Title 128, V.A.C.S.

Section 4: That the ballots of said election shall be prepared in accordance with the V.A.C.S. Election Code so as to permit the electors to vote "For" or "Against" the aforesaid proposition which shall be placed in a substantially the following form:

"The Issuance of Bonds and the Levy of Taxes in Payment Thereof"

The word "For" and beneath it the word "Against" shall be made to appear on the left of the proposition. A square shall be printed on the left of each of the words "For" and "Against," and each elector shall place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way he wishes to vote.

Section 5: All resident qualified electors shall be permitted to vote in person at the election. In one box only resident qualified electors who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be allowed to vote. In another box all resident qualified electors (who are otherwise qualified but do not own taxable property which has been duly rendered for taxation) shall be allowed to vote. The votes cast in each of said boxes shall be recorded, returned and canvassed in such manner as will reflect separately the votes cast by the qualified electors and all facilities, including those who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation.

Section 6: A substantial copy of this order shall serve as a proper notice of said election and the Secretary of this Board shall cause notice of such election to be published once a week for four consecutive weeks in a newspaper having general circulation in the County in which the District is situated, the first publication to be at least 28 days before the date of such election; and further orders are reserved until the returns of said election have been made by the duly authorized election officials and received by the Board.

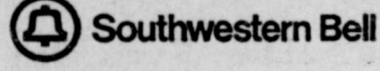
Notice to Long Distance Telephone Users

- Rates will be increased on all person-to-person and station-to-station calls requiring operator assistance in any way, except as noted below.*

*Where direct dialing is not available, the customer dialed rate will be charged for station-to-station calls from non-coin phones, on which the caller furnishes the area code and number, and the call is charged to the telephone from which it is made.

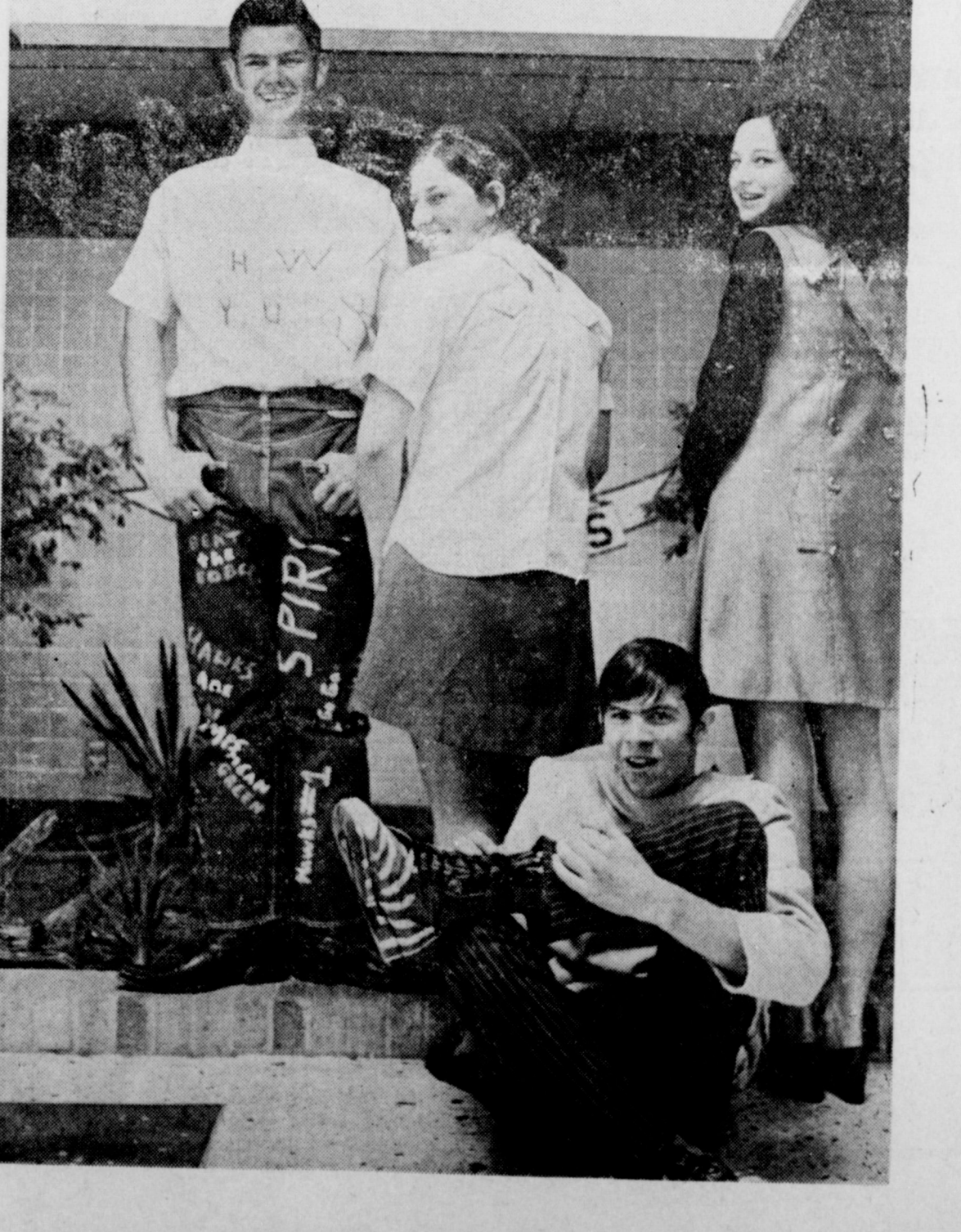

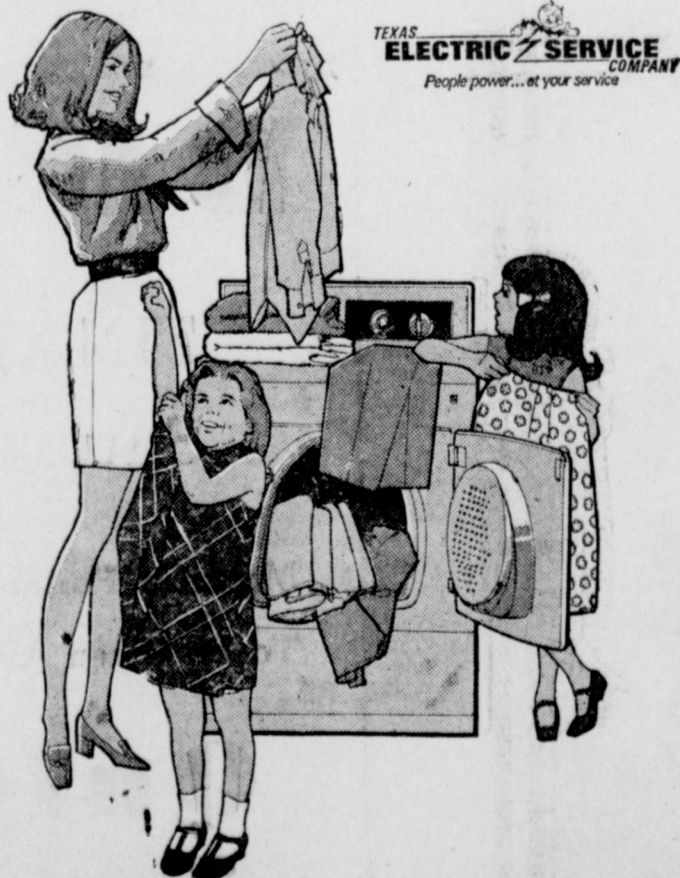
