Sixth Grade Bus

As an accommodation for the Sixth Graders going to Valley View—but not for Sixth Graders only—the school board has approved the following routes in the City of Iowa Park:

Bus No. 9 will make pick-ups along Mary Drive and Karen Lane in Country Hills, Edgehill and Park Plaza, and at the corners of Glenda and Louisa, Van Horn and Lincoln, to the front of Kidwell school; and at the corners of Cornelia and Second, Rebecca and North Pacific, Aldine and N. Yosemite; Yosemite at Cash, and go on to Valley View.

Bus No. 3 will pick up Sixth Graders at the corners of Washington and Victoria; Magnolia and Bond; Wall and Washington; Washington and Penn; and on to Cash and Junior High.

Bus No. 4 will pick up at Bradford school, at Junior High, and along Wall Street and to Diamond and Jackson intersection, then on to Valley View.

Bus No. 2 will proceed along this route in Garden Valley with pick-ups at the corner of James and Garden; Garden and Wall; Wall and Diamond; to the front of Bradford; then to Ruby at Texoma; Texoma to Junior High; Junior High to Lafayette at Yosemite; then to Valley View.

The elementary students in grades 1 to 5 who volunteered to go to Valley View last year will have the first option to go there this year if they desire. The policy adopted last year for grades 1 to 5 in Wichita Valley Farms will be continued for this year.

Generally speaking, **Bus 9** will serve the Kidwell area; Busses 2 and 4 will serve the Bradford area with Bus 2 especially responsible for Garden Valley. Bus 3 will be primarily for the Junior High area.

Football Tickets

Season football tickets for 10-Year Option Holders (those who contributed money, materials and labor) are on sale until 5:00 p.m. Friday, Aug. 20. They can be obtained in the high school principal's office.

Seats will not be changed by the high school and cannot be traded through the high school.

Option holders have the same seats, which they selected, for 10 years if they wish to keep them. Only those option holders in whose name the seats are listed may purchase the tickets.

All tickets not claimed by 5:00 p.m. Aug. 20 will go on sale at the concession stand at 7:00 p.m. on Aug. 23.

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



OUR SOIL ★ OUR STRENGTH

Livestock men are seeing the bottoms of ponds that haven't been dry for 20 years or longer, reports Gary Batte of SCS in Iowa Park. Wichita county farmers and stockmen are taking advantage of the drought to clean out silted-up stock ponds or build new ones. This is a good indication of what's happening in all North Texas, as land owners prepare for the rains that are sure to come.

Soil and Water Conservation officials estimate that over 75 per cent of the ponds here have gone dry. Water levels in remaining ponds are dangerously low.

Others are finding the dry soil conditions ideal for controlling mesquite by basal treatment. The SCS recommends spraying a mixture of 2 gallons 2,4,5-T material and 100 gallons of diesel fuel or kerosene around the lower 12 inches of the tree trunk until it penetrates the bud zone, located just below the surface. Pure diesel oil or kerosene can also be used.

Both stock ponds and brush control practices can be planned to improve the environment, Batte advised.

Ponds can be built in such a way as to beautify the landscape and provide homes for fish, waterfowl and wildlife. When spraying mesquite, leave a few larger trees for shade and to make the landscape more attractive.

School Plans

Hoyt Watson directed a meeting of Iowa Park Consolidated Independent School District Board Tuesday evening when a 15-item agenda challenged the thinking of the group for six hours.

Other members and officials in the session were Jesse McCullough, T. C. Berry, Stanley Williamson, Robert Wilcox, Cecil Streich, Harold Cowley, Bill Steger and Faris Nowell.

Resignations of nine teachers and election of 14 new teachers, and the policy and routes of the eight buses were voted on. Stories of these transactions will be found as separate articles.

They accepted the policy of the National School Lunch Program for the free and reduced price lunches, based on \$3,914 income, family of four.

Larry Kingsley, director, made a report of band activities and needs and submitted a budget. In classes last year were 69 beginners, 97 junior highs and 87 high school students. There were 120 in the performing band. An inventory revealed there are 59 instruments on hand besides the drums, etc. He may have two student-teacher assistants next year. A budget of \$6,635 was approved.

Harold Cowley gave a many-faceted summary and request re-

port for the vocational program to be carried out in the 13 units. Duckworth Chevrolet will furnish a pick-up for the department. The local school system will pay as its part for teachers for 12 units, \$3,190, with one teacher yet to be hired. The state assumes a large part of the teacher salary in this area. It is estimated 456 students will be enrolled.

Based on the average daily attendance of last year, the board voted to pay \$1 per student, or \$2,132 to participate in the audio-visual educational program of Region IX.

Vocational students are now required to have two years in physical education instead of three as formerly.

It was voted to enter into contract with Otha R. Eddins for semi-annual checking and service of all heating and air-conditioning facilities in the system.

Mead's bread will be used in the cafeterias; Goble's milk will be bought; and Swift will provide ice cream (no melleorine).

It was decided that janitors will be under the supervision of the principals in each building during school months; under direction of the head janitor during the summer, when all will be in one pool.

An Order calling an election within Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District Number 3 to determine whether the Board of Directors of said District shall be empowered to issue bonds for additional improvements and making provisions for the said election.

Whereas, the Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District Number 3 was heretofore created and established under the provisions of Article 16, Section 59 of the Constitution of Texas pursuant to Chapter 3A, Title 128, R.C.S. of Texas, 1925 as amended and has heretofore authorized the issuance and delivery of bonds which are now outstanding, such bonds being known as the "Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District Number 3 Refunding and Construction Bonds, Series 1964," dated February 1, 1964; and

Whereas, it has come to pass that the works, improvements and facilities set forth in the plan adopted by the District have been found not to be adequate to accomplish the purposes of the District and additional funds are required in order for the District to supply water to the City of Iowa Park, Texas, the cost of the improvements required (being set forth in the Engineers' Report) is in summary as follows:
Construction of pipeline 57,000 lineal feet 16-inch transmission line \$572,150.00
500,000.00 gallon ground storage tank and rights-of-way 30,000.00
500,000.00 gallon ground storage tank 115,000.00
500,000.00 gallon ground storage tank and pump station 109,000.00
Engineering 80,000.00
Permits, legal, fiscal and contingencies 50,000.00
Interest during construction 21,850.00
Total \$975,000.00
And, whereas, it has been determined with representatives of the City of Iowa Park that the District will supply and provide a portion of the cost of the improvements and the City of Iowa Park will provide the remainder thereof,

so that the entire obligation of the District shall not exceed \$400,000; now therefore,

Be it ordered by the Board of Directors of the Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District Number 3:

Section 1: That an election shall be held in said District, on the 4th day of September, 1971, at which election there shall be submitted the following proposition:

PROPOSITION
"Shall the Board of Directors of the Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District Number 3 be authorized to issue the general obligation bonds of the District in the amount of \$400,000 to mature serially or otherwise, over a period of years not to exceed Thirty-five (35) years from their date for the purpose of paying the cost of additions to the Districts water supply and transmission facilities, and all facilities and appurtenances incidental thereto; and shall such Board be authorized and empowered to provide for the payment of the principal of and interest on such bonds by the levy of a sufficient ad valorem tax upon all taxable property within said District, such bonds to be sold at such price or prices and rates as shall be determined within the discretion of the governing body of such District in accordance with the provisions of Section 2 of Article 171K-2, V.A.T.C.S., provided that no bond shall bear interest at a rate in excess of ten per centum per annum?"

Section 2: The said election shall be held on election day between the hours of 7:00 a'clock A.M. and 7:00 P.M. at the following polling places, and with the following election officials:

Wilks is hereby appointed as clerk for absentee voting for the election herein ordered, and absentee voting shall be conducted at City Hall, Iowa Park, Texas, within the boundaries of said District between the hours of 8:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. each day that is not a Saturday, a Sunday or official State holiday in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 5, V.A.T.S., Election Code.

Section 3: That said election shall be held under and in accordance with the provisions of the General Election Laws of the State of Texas, as modified by the provisions of Chapter 3A, Title 128, V.A.T.C.S.

Section 4: That the ballots of said election shall be prepared in accordance with the V.A.T.S. Election Code so as to permit the electors to vote "For" or "Against" the aforesaid proposition, which shall be set forth in substantially the following form:

"The Issuance of Bonds and the Levy of Taxes in Payment Thereof"
The word "For" and beneath it the word "Against" shall be made to appear on the left of the proposition. A square shall be printed on the left of each of the words "For" and "Against," and each elector shall place an "X" in the square beside the statement indi-

cating the way he wishes to vote.
Section 5: All resident qualified electors of the District, including those who own taxable property in said District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be permitted to vote at said election. That at said election two separate ballot boxes shall be provided at each polling place. In one box only resident qualified electors who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be allowed to vote. In another box all resident qualified electors but do not own taxable property which has been duly rendered for taxation shall be allowed to vote. The votes cast in each of said boxes shall be recorded, returned and canvassed in such manner as will reflect separately the votes cast by the qualified electors who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation from the votes cast by all qualified electors (including those who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation).
Section 6: A substantial copy of this order shall serve as a proper notice of said election and the Secretary of this Board shall cause notice of such election to be published once a week for four consecutive weeks in a newspaper having general circulation in the County in which the District is situated, the first publication to be at least 28 days before the date of such election; and further orders are reserved until the returns of said election have been made by the duly authorized election officials and received by the Board.

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Our Vacation Trip

A Four of the West . . . Mrs. M. J. McDonald, in company with Bob and Joy McDonald of Odessa.

Though we had visited the Bad Lands before, we could not resist another view. They are beautiful in a bizarre kind of way.

The Passion Play at Spearfish, S.D., an excellent portrayal of Christ's last days on earth, his death and resurrection, held the attention of thousands for hours. The setting was a beautiful spot chosen because there are no flies nor mosquitos in that part of the Black Hills. The costumes and acting were marvelous. It was well worth the trip just to see this performance again.

It was interesting to visit the scene of Custer's last stand and see a ranger, dressed in the costume of Custer's day, demonstrate the weapons of that time and describe as much as is known of the events that took place. The museum was worth seeing.

Glacier National Park was definitely another highlight. The scenery is exceptionally beautiful . . . and so nice and cool. Had been a week earlier we could not have made the drive as the roads were closed because of snow. At the time we were there snow was piled higher than our heads by the side of the highway. We spent the night at Viking Lodge at Whitefish, just outside the park — a lovely rustic building on the edge of the lake.

In Seattle we stayed at Edgewater Inn, really on the edge of the water. The service and food were excellent. We enjoyed visiting the former grounds of the World's Fair and the next day took a boat to magnificent Victoria in British Columbia and made a tour of that area, including the Butchart Gardens. At the time of Mr. Hearst's death many treasures were still in warehouses and were bought by Mr. Madonna, who built an inn which houses many of them at San Luis Obispo. This is one of the most beautiful places in California, truly a Hearst Mansion and a place where people may eat and sleep as well.

The next stop was one of which I had not previously read but one that I believe I enjoyed most of all. It is Solvang, a re-created Danish village just off the highway between San Luis Obispo and Los Angeles. It is just like stepping into a European country.

Windmills were in abundance as were buildings characteristic of Denmark. We ate at the Danish Inn which had a smorgasbord from which one could partake of both Danish and American foods. We could not resist buying some of the pastries from one of the many shops. The people dress in costumes of their native land and proudly invite tourists to visit their village which extends some distance from the area set up for tourist attraction. Anyone who visits California would be well repaid for a visit in Solvang.

Our next major stop was at Disneyland. There I enjoyed most the programs dedicated to the memory of Lincoln, the Bell Telephone Company exhibit of "America the Beautiful," General Electric's program depicting the development of electricity from its infancy to a projection into the future, and their scientific program.

On our return trip we came by Boulder Dam, Great Meteor Cavern, Painted Desert and Petrified Forest, all beautiful and interesting.

To add to the pleasure of the trip I enjoyed being with Bob and Joy, and having short visits with Gene and Betsy Holderby in Duncan, Okla.; with Fritz and Mabel in Nemo, S.D.; with my late husband's brother and family in Riverside, Calif.; and with Bob and Joy's son Cluck and his wife, who are students at Tech in Lubbock.
