Facts About the Bond Elections

1. The citizens of Iowa Park are water line which could in future a water line from the Cypress Water Plant in Wichita Falls to Iowa Park.

2. The cost of such a 16-inch water line which could in future years supply over 5,000,000 gallons of water a day, would be slightly in excess of \$600,000.

3. Bonds have previously been voted in the amount of \$375,000 for water improvements within the city such as elevated water storage and underground storage as well as larger distribution lines. These projects will need to be carried out along with the laying of the transmission line from Wichita Falls.

The voters will also need to approve the transfer of Sewer Revenue Bonds already sold and not needed because of an increase in grant funds, to water purposes for completion of this project.

4. The citizens of Iowa Park and Water District No. 3 are asked to vote \$600,000 tax bonds, the city voting \$200,000, the water district voting \$400,000 to finance this transmission line.

5. The cost to the average family in Iowa Park for this improvement will be approximately \$89 per year the first few years. Later costs will be less. This increased cost will be the result of an increase in water district tax from the present \$50 per \$100 valuation to about \$1.00 to \$1.10 and for the cost of water from a cost for the average user of about \$5 presently during winter months to \$7.50, and from \$9.56 for the average user during the summer months to about \$13.50.

6. The minimum cost for water would be \$3 for the first 1,000 gallons with the cost being \$1 for each additional 1,000 gallons up to 5,000 gallons. This would mean that family units who are now using less than 1,000 gallons per month will have no increase in their water rates.

What Will We Get For Our Money?

1. We will be able to get 1,000,000 or more gallons of water a day from Wichita Falls for up to 30 years.

2. We may purchase any amount less than 1,000,000 gallons a day.

3. We will be able to negotiate yearly for increased amounts of water if this becomes necessary for Iowa Park.

4. We will be provided with the same water the citizens of Wichita Falls receive in their water system. They are not now using any Lake Kemp water and they do not presently foresee using any Lake Kemp water in the future. The water in Lakes Kickapoo and Arrowhead have a lower mineral content than the water from our lakes and therefore would be softer water than we have in our lakes.

5. The cost of water purchased from Wichita Falls would be negotiable at 5-year intervals and could be increased only as they show an increase in their operational costs.

6. The City of Iowa Park is desperately in need of a dependable water supply to achieve any hope of growth in the future or the attraction of any industry.

7. If these bonds are voted and a satisfactory water supply is obtained, growth will occur which

Hot Fire Totals White's

Work is progress to re-establish White's Store in Iowa Park following the crippling fire which broke out early Sunday morning. Don and Judy Schram have acquired use of the two spaces at Park West Shopping Center formerly occupied by Helen's and Joy Togs. None of the damaged stock from the fire will be moved to the temporary location. Only brand new merchandise from White's gigantic supply of quality goods will be brought to Iowa Park.

The fire was discovered early Sunday morning. In fact the fire "discovered" itself by exploding in the furniture department, with a large bang as glass flew into the street.

Tremendous heat and almost poisonous gasses & smoke welled out of the furniture department and the front doors for more than two hours before the fire could be brought under control. Two fire trucks from Wichita were delayed by flood conditions and arrived in time to see the last belches of black smoke.

Insurance adjusters are busy this week determining the loss, not only to White's Store, but to the building itself. The latter suffered severe structural damage which will have to be repaired before the building can be used again.

Firemen and other volunteers deserve much praise for the workmanlike manner in which they handled what could have been a major disaster to downtown Iowa Park.

will in turn decrease per unit cost for this water.

8. The laying of a transmission line to Wichita Falls would assure Iowa Park of an adequate water supply for the next 20-30 years.

Problems We Have and Will Continue to Have If Bonds Are Not Voted

1. The water district is now paying 7 1/2¢ per 1000 gallons for Lake Kemp water via the irrigation ditch. If we are forced to continue to buy this water instead of being able to purchase good drinkable water from Wichita Falls, the water district will still need to increase its tax from about 50¢ per \$100 to about \$1 per \$100 valuation to make up for its expense for the purchase of this water.

2. The salinity of the water we are now using is very injurious to our entire water distribution system as well as to the individual's plumbing system in his home so that there will be a marked increase in repair bills both by the city and by the individuals if we are forced to continue using this water.

3. If we do not pass the bond issue and assure ourselves of an adequate good water supply, it is almost certain that our town will cease to grow and as a result property values will diminish tremendously causing a loss to anyone who will be selling property in the coming years.

4. The high salt content in our present water is very destructive to such appliances as dishwashers, water heaters and washing machines.

5. The cost of maintaining and operating evaporative coolers is much more expensive with the present water supply requiring frequent changes of pads and again causing actual deterioration of the appliance itself, so that probably this one item alone in the homes of many people who have evaporative coolers leads to a higher operational cost than would be the cost of water if the bonds were approved for the water line.

Drouth Broken -- Lakes Missed

Saturday and Sunday downpours in Iowa Park and surrounding areas were scattered and sketchy, but the main flood damage came about two to three miles east of Our Town. Cars and trucks were stalled and even floated off the road. For a short space, even the railroad bed was washed away. A few homes in the lowest places were invaded by flood.

Irony of the whole proposition is that the watershed of Iowa Park's two large lake sites was almost completely missed. Rainfall up to 10 1/2 inches was recorded east and south of Iowa Park, while west and north was limited to 1 to 3 inches, yielding practically no runoff into Lake Iowa Park and Puffalo Creek Reservoir.

The lake in the north portion of Our Town received the benefit of reasonably heavy precipitation and the level almost reached the overflow stage.

It is safe to say that most of Iowa Park received in excess of seven inches during the weekend, with at least six inches on Sunday.

PreSchool


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Brother Dies

TADA Director Senior Citizens

Luther Shaw of Shaw Motor Co., Iowa Park, has been appointed area director of the statewide Texas Automobile Dealers association. "The position of area director is of ever-increasing importance," stated TADA President Finley Ewing. "Mr. Shaw will work closely with Federal, State and Local officials in the study of pollution, safety and law enforcement problems."

Flood Damage

Damage in excess of \$250,000 was caused to agricultural interests in the Wichita Valley - Pond Creek watershed during the flood, according to Gary Batte. He reported light to extensive damage to irrigation ditches, terraces, waterways, fences, drainage ditches and cropland fields.

Flood waters damaged a newly-leveled field on the LeRoy Link farm about six miles east of Iowa Park.

The Faris Nowell farm two miles south of town sustained damage to drainage ditches, road crossings and a waterway.

Harrel Sullivan reported washed out irrigation borders and damage to drainage ditches and concrete irrigation ditches on his place.

Experiment station had damage in excess of \$2,000, according to Virgil Woodfin, superintendent. In the estimate were a washed-out dam, and gullies caused by fast-moving water on the east side of the farm.

Several miles of fences were damaged or destroyed. Replacing a mile of fence costs about \$700.

The SCS survey found evidence of sheet erosion, especially on bare sloping cropland fields. It is difficult to estimate the exact amount of soil lost.

Some county farmers are faced with crop losses due to the flood. Many crops were drowned out, while others were washed away.

"Another result of the flood was the sediment which was washed into lakes, ponds, streams and drainage ditches," Batte said.

Helping with the survey early this week were Wayne Chapman, area conservationist, and John Adams, engineer from Vernon.
