Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce and Industrial Commission will join in the Labor Survey being conducted in a nine-county area of southern Oklahoma and North Texas.

Materials gathered will be given immediately to an industry which will need approximately 500 workers. Also interested is a possible industry which will require 250 persons.

The survey will embrace Archer, Baylor, Clay, Montague, Wichita and Wilbarger counties in Texas; Cotton, Jefferson, Tillman counties in Oklahoma.

All counties and cities will get detailed breakdowns of the result of the survey. Questionnaires will be available at banks, shopping centers, retail stores, chambers of commerce and civic groups.

## 61 Years of Oil Production Here

Production of Texas crude oil last year hit an all-time high while additions to reserves continued to lag, according to latest compilations of Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

State oilfields produced 1.2 billion barrels of crude, bringing the total for the past 81 years of recorded production to 34.1 billion barrels.

Association Pres. Kenneth E. Montague says, "Economic benefits from the production was felt throughout the state, as 205 of our 254 counties had producing oil wells. It is unfortunate that more oil was produced than was found in Texas — pulling the reserves down for the third straight year."

Wichita county, which has had recorded production since 1910 had a total crude oil output of 673,602,732 barrels up to the beginning of 1971. County production in 1970 was 5,412,953 barrels at the rate of 23,049 barrels daily.

Fifteen counties produced more than 25 million barrels with Andrews topping the list with 71,680,656 barrels, followed by Ector with 69,562,247 and Scurry with 58,985,376.

Wichita county remained all-time champion with a cumulative production of 2.2 billion barrels. Ector county is second with 1.7 billion barrels.

## Utah Mission Afterthoughts

The beginning of our first endeavor in the mission field found us in a state of apprehension and excitement, an excitement which was to propel us through five challenge-packed days and leave us physically exhausted and spiritually refreshed and uplifted.

We were apprehensive because it was the first time a group had "gone out" from the Iowa Park congregation even though we had long been a mission-minded church; and really, we did not know exactly what to expect from the Navajo children.

The Knoxes did their job well in preparing us for our classes. We were told to have something prepared for each child to take home each day and even though we were to know our lessons "perfectly," we were to be prepared to change our technique completely.

We were also prepared to "play ball"—an kind. This, plus the cookies and kool-aid, was the one way of gaining their attention and eventually their love. Their love, by the way, more than compensated for the winds.

The first three cars of us had been in the Lions Club park only a couple of hours when the first winds came. There was no warning—just extreme winds, taking three of our four tents down. After weighting the tents so they could not blow away, the men slept in the remaining one; sending the ladies to the church building for the remainder of the night.

That Saturday was spent reinforcing the braces and securing every corner to available trees, trailers, cars or another tent. The time was well spent because another wind, not quite as strong as the first, came during the night—and our gospel meeting and Vacation Bible School had not even begun!

Would you believe that not one word was said about "giving up" and coming home? This devoted group had come to Montezuma Creek to do a job for the Lord and they put their hearts into it.

Those of us who were privileged to be a part of this great effort enjoyed the fellowship of brethren whom we met for the first time in our lives and yet the love and fellowship that existed among us was unbelievable. We were Christians, brothers and sisters in one great universal family—the family of God.

Though some were Navajo and some Anglo, we were one family dedicated to one ideal, and that ideal was to be faithful Christians upholding the cause of Christ regardless of the circumstances.

There was not a dry eye among us as we broke camp on Friday, following our last day of VBS. We were all more conscious that mission points need more than our money. We went to Montezuma Creek to share Christ—to learn the people and leave something of value with them; and to bring home the burden, that having seen the need, we never can be the same again. Even now we are making plans for next year!

Trammell Named City Secretary

Election of a city secretary to succeed K. G. Wilks, resigned, was a major item of business at City Council meeting Monday evening. George Trammell, resident here since 1952, was named to the job.

Trammell retired recently as an instructor at SAFB. He is presently an instructor of accounting, business machines and business mathematics at Draughon's business college in Wichita Falls.

Mr. Wilks will become city administrator of Farris on Sept. 1, after serving three years here.

The secretary's report showed Iowa Park's revenues advanced from \$324,000 in 1967 to \$775,000 at the present time.

Mayor Soell stated that progress on the water line from Wichita Falls will depend on results of the bond election Sept. 4, a \$600,000 venture.

Other items of business included a request for bids on a new police car; approval of building a sidewalk south from Kidwell school to Vogel street and widening of Third street in the school zone; and declaration of intent to pass a parental authority ordinance with reference to observance of curfew hours for the youth of the city.

An "appreciation service" concluded the meeting when plaques were presented to Wilks and Gene Lowrey, who recently resigned; and Wilks presented one to Miss Dossie Smith and clerks for their loyal support.

Trammell and his wife Hazel moved here July 4, 1952, where he has been civilian instructor at Sheppard until a few months ago. He resigned to enjoy retirement years while young enough to pursue activities that appealed to him through the years. Hazel also retired from the teaching profession at the close of the 1971 term.

George was born in Bristol, Tenn. He and Hazel were married 28 years ago at Hays, Kans. They have a daughter Georgia Kay (Mrs. Charles Bryan). She and Charles live in Austin and are parents of little Silas Wade Bryan—an exceptional child according to the grandparents.

Mr. and Mrs. Trammell spent two years as teachers in Pine Ridge Reservation school in South Dakota. He was transferred from the Indian Service at Lawrence, Kans., to his work at Sheppard.

For six years previous to his teaching, George was an aircraft mechanic in the army air corps, before there was a USAF, and served in Puerto Rico, Panama, Ecuador, and at the base in Alamogordo, N.M. His college degree is from the University of Denver.

Mrs. Trammell has been secretary at the Methodist church, with the Rexall drug store for a time, and for the past 16 years has taught elementary students in the Wichita Falls school system. After more than 30 years in the teaching profession, Hazel is enjoying being a housewife and homemaker.

## No Increase in School Tax Rate

Adopting the amended budget report for 1970-71 and accepting the estimated budget for 1971-72 occupied the major part of the time when Iowa Park school board met Tuesday evening.

The tax rate will be the same \$1.75—even though there is an extended program through the vocational department and a new vocational building. \$1.39 will be for maintenance and \$0.36 for debt service, interest and sinking fund.

The audit shows a balance of \$19,845 at the beginning of this school year.

Assessed evaluation for the district totals \$30,450,000, up a bit from last year.

The board designated the State National Bank as depository for the school system.

It was voted that FFA boys may keep the profits from concession stands at the high school stadium to apply on expenses of that department.

Psalms will be the study and Mrs. S. B. Keeter will teach.

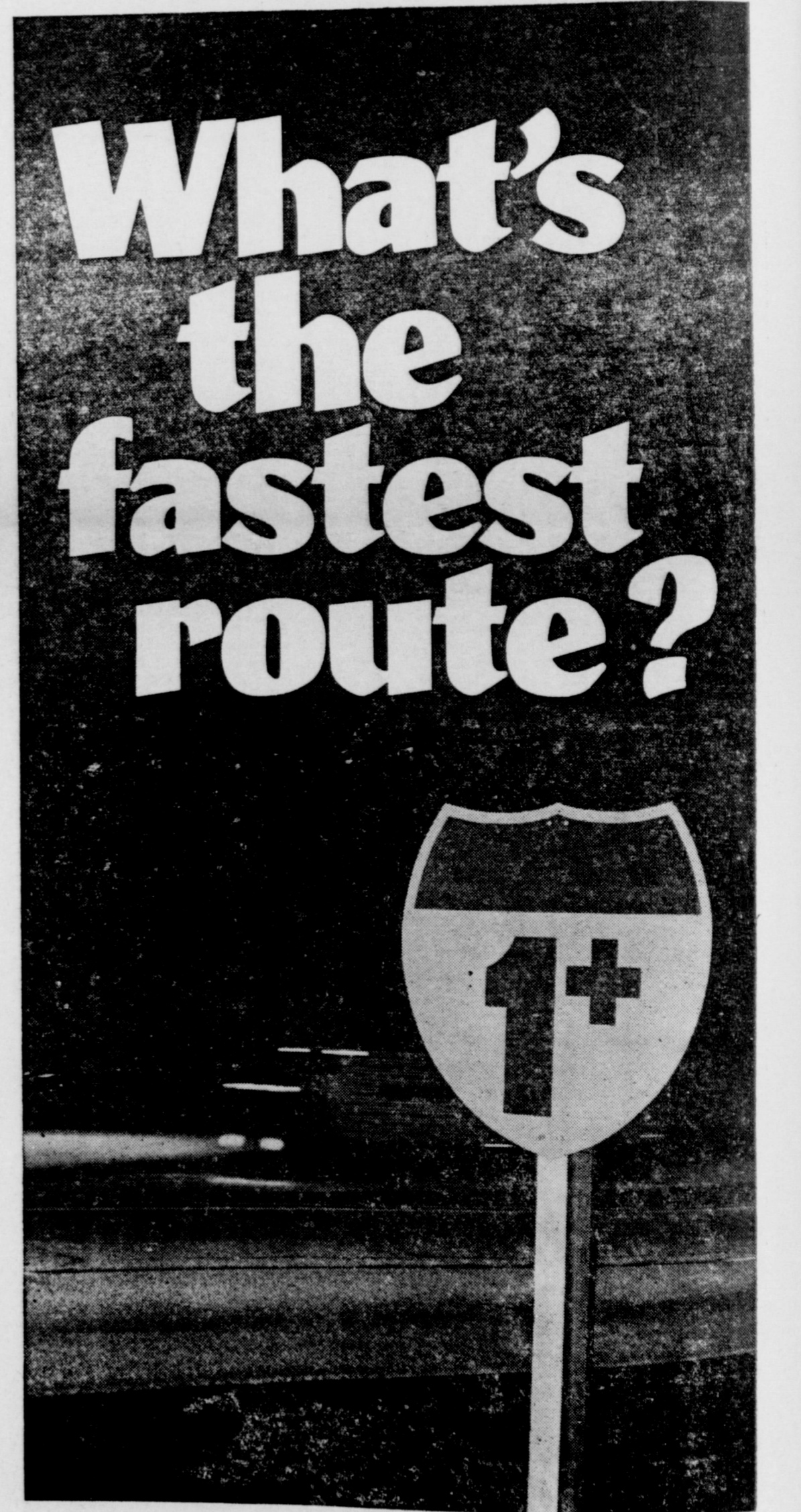

## Water Board Sets Election

### NOTICE OF BOND ELECTION

The State of Texas, County of Wichita, Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District Number 3. To the Resident Qualified Electors of Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District Number 3, including those who own taxable property in said District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:

Take notice that an election will be held on the 4th day of September, 1971, within said District, in obedience to an order duly entered by the Board of Supervisors of said District, on the 3rd day of August, 1971, and which said order is attached hereto and made a component part of this Notice for all intents and purposes.

An Order calling an election within Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District Number 3 to determine whether the Board of Directors of said District shall be empowered to issue bonds for additional improvements and making provisions for the said election.

Whereas, the Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District Number 3 was heretofore created and established under the provisions of Article 16, Section 59 of the Constitution of Texas pursuant to Chapter 3A, Title 128, R.C.S. of Texas, 1925 as amended and has heretofore authorized the issuance and delivery of bonds which are now outstanding, such bonds being known as the "Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District Number 3 Refunding and Construction Bonds, Series 1964," dated February 1, 1964; and

Whereas, it has come to pass that the works, improvements and facilities set forth in the plan adopted by the District have been found not to be adequate to accomplish the purposes of the District and additional funds are required in order for the District to supply water to the City of Iowa Park, Texas, the cost of the improvements required (being set forth in the Engineers' Report) is in summary as follows:

Construction of pipeline 57,000	
18-inch line	\$572,150.00
500,000.00 gallon ground storage tank	30,000.00
500,000.00 gallon ground storage and pump station	100,000.00
Engineering	80,000.00
Permits, legal, fiscal and contingencies	50,000.00
Interest during construction	21,850.00
Total	\$975,000.00

And, whereas, it has been determined with representatives of the City of Iowa Park that the District will supply and provide a portion of the cost of the improvements and the City of Iowa Park will provide the remainder thereof, so that the entire obligation of the District shall not exceed \$400,000; now therefore,

Be it ordered by the Board of Directors of the Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District Number 3:

Section 1: That an election shall be held in said District on the 4th day of September, 1971, at which election there shall be submitted the following proposition:

**PROPOSITION**

"Shall the Board of Directors of the Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District Number 3 be authorized to issue the general obligation bonds of the District in the amount of \$400,000 to mature serially or otherwise, over a period of years not to exceed Thirty-Five (35) years from their date for the purpose of paying the cost of additions to the Districts water supply and transmission facilities, and all facilities and appurtenances incidental thereto; and shall such Board be authorized and empowered to provide for the payment of the principal of and interest on such bonds by the levy of a sufficient ad valorem tax upon all taxable property within said District, such bonds to be sold at such price or prices and to bear interest at such rate or rates as shall be determined with in the discretion of the governing body of such District in accordance with the provisions of Section 2 of Article 77K-2, V.A.T.C.S., provided that no bond shall bear interest at a rate in excess of ten per centum per annum?"

Section 2: The said election shall be held on election day between the hours of 7:00 a'clock A.M. and

7:00 P.M. at the following polling places and with the following election officials:

33 Bradford Elementary School Ruth Gard, Presiding Judge; Mrs. Eldon Thompson, Assistant Judge; Mrs. E. E. Wallis, Clerk; Mrs. Lee Smith, Clerk; Mrs. J. Louis Quirk, Clerk.

K. G. Wilks is hereby appointed as clerk for absentee voting for the election herein ordered, and absentee voting shall be conducted of City Hall, Iowa Park, Texas, within the boundaries of said District not between the hours of 8:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. each day that is not a Saturday, a Sunday or official State holiday in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 5, V.A.T.S., Election Code.

Section 3: That said election shall be held under and in accordance with the provisions of the General Election Laws of the State of Texas, as modified by the provisions of Chapter 3A, Title 128, V.A.T.C.S.

Section 4: That the ballots of said election shall be prepared in accordance with the V.A.T.S. Election Code so as to permit the electors to vote "For" or "Against" the aforesaid proposition which shall be set forth in substantially the following form:

"The Issuance of Bonds and the Levy of Taxes in Payment Thereof"

The word "For" and beneath it the word "Against" shall be made to appear on the left of the proposition. A square shall be printed on the left of each of the words "For" and "Against," and each elector shall place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way he wishes to vote.

Section 5: All resident qualified electors of the District, including those who own taxable property in said District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be permitted to vote at said election. That at said election two separate ballot boxes shall be provided at each polling place. In one box only resident qualified electors who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be allowed to vote. The votes cast in each of said boxes shall be recorded, returned and canvassed in such manner as will reflect separately the votes cast by the qualified electors who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation from the votes cast by all qualified electors (including those who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation).

Section 6: A substantial copy of this order shall serve as a proper notice of said election and the Secretary of this Board shall cause notice of such election to be published once a week for four consecutive weeks in a newspaper having general circulation in the County in which the District is situated, the first publication to be at least 28 days before the date of such election; and further orders are reserved until the returns of said election have been made by the duly authorized election officials and received by the Board.

## Flood Damage Being Surveyed

Recent flooding and resulting damage have revived interest in the Wichita Valley - Pond Creek watershed project, according to district conservationist Gary Batte of the SCS in Iowa Park.

Application for a flood control project was sent to the Department of Agriculture six years ago. Since then the project has been stalled due to the large expense involved in irrigation improvements that would be needed as part of the project.

Local sponsors hope that information from Sunday's flood will help get the project going again.

All persons who sustained flood damage are asked to report the

nature, extent and cost of damage to their property. Information is to be sent to Soil Conservation Service, P.O. Box 818, Iowa Park, Texas 76367, or phone 592-4176.

A flood damage report will be made to the SCS state office in Temple.

Mr. Maier is well known in the Southwest as a speaker on U.S. customs affairs and related subjects. He is a hometown product, having finished W. F. George high school here while his parents Mr. and Mrs. John Maier were operating a bakery in Iowa Park.

His wife, the former Jo Nelle Acuff, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Acuff, is a graduate of IPHS also. They reside at 4211 Queensloch, Houston. They have three daughters. Constance Ann, Mrs. James Cox and Mrs. James Williams.
