Curfew Law Updated by I. P. City Council

PARENTAL RESPONSIBILITY

An Ordinance of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, to Declare a Necessity of This Ordinance of Parental Responsibility for the Conduct of Minor Children and to Prescribe Penalties for Violations of the Provisions of This Ordinance.

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas:

Section I. Finding of Necessity.

The City Council finds that offenses against the laws of the United States, the statutes of the State of Texas, and the Ordinances of the City of Iowa Park by minors under the age of eighteen (18) years are increasing at an alarming rate; that in a great many of the cases a lack of proper supervision and control of the minor child by his parents or guardian is evident; that the increasing problem of criminal offenses by children will not be solved by sanctions imposed upon the children alone but that it is necessary that sanctions be imposed upon parents whose neglect of their duty to properly supervise and control their children is a proximate cause of the delinquency of those children.

Section II. Contributing to Neglect or Delinquency of Children.

Any parent, legal guardian or other person having the care or custody of a minor child under the age of eighteen (18) years who shall by any act, or by lack of supervision and control over said minor child, encourage, contribute toward, cause or tend to cause said minor to become neglected or to commit any delinquent or criminal act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

Section III. Curfew for Any Minor Person Under the Age of Eighteen (18)

No minor under the age of eighteen (18) years shall loiter, idle or congregate in or on any public street, highway, alley, park, school, or other public place, or other place normally open to the public, including but not limited to shopping centers, places of amusement, private recreation areas or similar places, between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 5:00 a.m. Sunday through Thursday, and 12:30 a.m. and 5:00 a.m. Saturday and Sunday mornings, unless the minor is accompanied by the parent or guardian, or some adult over the age of 21 years delegated by the parent or guardian to accompany the minor child, or where the minor child is upon an errand or other legitimate business directed by his parent or guardian.

Section IV. Violation of Curfew Hours

Any parent, legal guardian or other person having the control or custody of any minor child under the age of eighteen (18) years who shall assist, aid, abet, allow, permit or encourage said minor to violate the provisions of Section III of this Ordinance, either by overt act, by failing to act or by lack of supervision and control over said minor child, is guilty of a misdemeanor. The fact that a child under the age of eighteen (18) years is apprehended while on the public street, highway, alley, park, school or other public place, or other place normally open to the public during the hours defined in the above Section III, shall be prima-facie evidence of a violation of this Section on the part of the parents, legal guardian or other person having the care of custody of said minor child.

Section V. Penalty

Any person found guilty of a misdemeanor under the terms of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be subject to a fine

of not more than Two Hundred (200.00) Dollars.

Section VI. Separability

If any section, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be unconstitutional or otherwise unenforceable by a Court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining sections, sentences, clauses or phrases of this ordinance as an entirety, it being the legislative intent that the provisions of this ordinance are separable and that the ordinance shall continue in effect notwithstanding the invalidity of such section, sentence, clause or phrase.

Passed and approved on this the 13th day of September, A.D. 1971, to be read on the next meeting of the City Council at which time shall become effective on the 27th day of September, A.D. 1971.

Students Lose Sheep to Killer

Tragedy struck Sunday morning, so far as the Future Farmers of America of IPHS are concerned.

When the boys went to the barn on Ruby street at noon Sunday to feed their lambs, only three were able to stand. Four were dead and the others were critically maimed. They noted the presence of a large dog on the project grounds.

The veterinarian was called. He worked all afternoon repairing some of the damage. The ailing animals are being hand-fed and all will need to be vaccinated.

The lambs were bought in the latter part of May and early June and the boys paid \$20 for each animal.

The fear is now that the criminal will return for further killing, since he has had a taste of victory in attacking the sheep. A whole year's work for the class has been greatly hampered by the disaster.

If the injured animals live they will not be suitable to keep as project lambs.

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



Soil Conservationist K. C. Willis recommends the use of winter cover crops on land because they not only save the soil but also increase earnings.

Cover crops prevent leaching of important plant nutrients of the soil: nitrogen and potassium. The cover crops reduce compaction and increase permeability, which make more water available for plant use. Good cover reduces erosion caused by water and wind.

During the recent flood here, lack of cover was part of the cause of much land's being washed away.

Winter peas, sweet clovers and small grains can also qualify as green manure crops. They can be turned under to increase the tilth and fertility of the soil. Both cover and manure crops may be grazed before tilling the soil.

Winter cover crops are usually planted in late summer or early fall, Willis said.

Within another two minutes the Hawks' James Frazier gathered in a punt and carried 67 yards to paydirt. The ensuing kickoff was fumbled, giving the Green possession only 27 yards away from the Tiger goaline.

Five plays later, Steve Webb had his second TD of the season. The Hawks slacked off during the 2nd quarter and went to the half-time rest leading only 18-0.

Members of the Association for Retarded Children were functioning successfully in two areas of endeavor Tuesday evening, with enthusiasm an outstanding characteristic in each meeting.

First regular meeting of the Association for the school year was conducted in Mrs. Frank Rauschuber's classroom with Mrs. John Reynolds presiding.

Discussion revealed that the local Association for Special Education group will likely become known as there are 60 students enrolled in that area in the school.

It is likely that Plan A will be functioning by 1975, when all types of special children will be ministered to, including slow readers, the hyperactive, those with hearing and seeing difficulties, etc. At that time there may be 20 units in this area, including several towns around us, with one person as supervisor, or as diagnostician, and one as vocational co-ordinator.

Eight of the nine Iowa Park teachers were present: Miss Beverly Cuba, Mmes. Pat Davis, Betty Cesh, Edith Hamilton, Joyce Allen, Rena Otten, Rauschuber; and Earleen Davis, teacher aid.

Mmes. Ed Dove, A. C. Miller and A. C. Balli were named as the telephone committee. Mrs. Tommy Jares is head of the refreshment committee, and will be assisted by Mrs. Dove.

While this was taking place another group was running the concession stand at the junior high football field. The school board has given the Association that project in order to raise funds to pay for equipment and supplies for the special education department. The state pays salaries of teachers.

Joe Baxter and Floyd Browning are chairmen of the concession and were very pleased with returns Tuesday evening.

Going like hotcakes were popcorn, corny dogs, frito pies, candy, gum, soda pop, coffee — being dispensed by Ed Navratil, Frank Rauschuber, A. C. Balli, Floyd Browning; Mr. and Mrs. Buddy McLemore; Mmes. Young and Baxter.

School Board

School officials and board members attending the September meeting followed an agenda covering many varied items Tuesday evening.

Mayor E. F. Soell reported engineers are working on the best plan for widening the street at Kidwell, and perhaps opening up Coleman street between Third and Fourth streets.

It was voted to sell several pieces of property and bids are now being sought for a house and several lots at Valley View and four lots in the 700 block on East Park here.

Faris Nowell announced enrollment as of Tuesday was 2222, with the freshman class being largest — 232 pupils. The two smallest classes are first grade and 12th.

Plans were made to sod the escarp at the football stadium and set it with ivy, since that plant is green the year around. It is used by the highway department on expressways where needed to keep the sod from washing. A retaining wall had been dreamed about, but that is too expensive for the present, and the need is now.

Kidwell and Bradford PTA's were granted use of the high school cafeteria for free when they are hosts to the area organization.

A chart was displayed showing parking possibilities for football games, and a plan will be worked out soon with the city police as to the most practical and feasible method.

A track and field budget totaling \$2,363 submitted by Jerry McWilliams was allowed. His list of supplies needed included such things as vaulting poles, shoes, string blocks, nets for high-jump pit, hurdles and crossbars. The board commended his business-like method of request.

On recommendation of Harold Cowley, it was voted that a paper cutter and electronic copy machine be purchased for the classes in vocational office education.

AN ACT relating to the recording and re-recording of livestock brands and marks.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. (a) This Act shall apply to every county in this state. In all the counties each owner of any livestock mentioned in Chapter 1 of Title 121 of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925 shall within six months after this Act takes effect have his mark and brand for such stock recorded in the office of the county clerk of the county. These owners shall record the marks and brands whether the brands and marks have been previously recorded or not.

(b) The owner shall have the right to have his mark and brand recorded in his name who according to the present records of the county first recorded the brand and mark in the county, or in event it can not be ascertained from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name.

(c) After the expiration of six months from the taking effect of this Act all records of marks and brands now in existence in the county shall no longer have any

force or effect and after the expiration of six months only the records made after this Act takes effect shall be examined or considered in recording marks and brands in the county.

Sec. 3. All brands and marks registered under the provisions of this Act shall be re-registered every 10 years in the manner prescribed in Section 1 of this Act. (Sept. 1971)

Punitive Damages

Mrs. Olson was at home alone when two husky men came to her door. "We're from the appliance store," they said, "and we are going to repossess your stove."

Despite her protests, they came into the house, seized the stove, and carried it away—leaving soot stains all over the rug.

Mrs. Olson sued the store for damages. In court, the proprietor told the judge: "Maybe my boys did get a little careless. I am willing to pay for cleaning her rug. But aside from that, she suffered no harm. After all, she was behind in her payments."

The judge held him liable not only for the rug but also for "punitive damages"—that is, extra damages imposed to teach him a lesson.

The law takes a stern view of "rough stuff" by creditors in the repossession of merchandise. To discourage such tactics, most of the court will award punitive damages over and above an actual harm done.

This is especially true when the repossessor resorts to personal violence. Thus, a court awarded punitive damages to a housewife after her sewing machine was repossessed at point of a pistol.

In another case, a furniture dealer told a widow she could have extra time to pay for her purchases, because she had to have an operation. While she was in the hospital he broke into her house and decamped with the furniture. The court found ample grounds for awarding punitive damages.

The law does not frown on the basic idea of repossession. By giving the creditor a simple and speedy remedy against the delinquent debtor, it can keep down the cost of credit for other buyers.

Courts have found nothing improper when a repossessor towed away a car parked in front of a debtor's house or even in his driveway. One court pointed out the seller is merely taking back — "without force, threats or even stealth"—what is rightfully his.

Dove hunters are advised by officials of Texas Parks and Wildlife Department to have their shotguns permanently plugged to hold three shells. This applies on hunting of all migratory birds such as ducks, geese, brant, coots, gallinules, rails, jacksnipes, woodcock and sandhill cranes. Non-migratory birds such as quail and turkey may be hunted with unplugged guns.
